Firstly I must thank those who have undertaken to take on the task of producing this first edition following the May elections. Not forgetting to thank Keith for his support in producing and editing the Village News for the previous five years.

Whether the parish council will be able to continue producing a magazine format Village News is in some doubt unless we can get the support and contribution of villagers to produce it. Quite possibly we will have to turn to a simpler newsletter format if we wish to continue with a regular publication.

The result of the Parish Council elections came as a surprise, with all but three of the existing Councillors not seeking re-election. We are seeking to remedy this situation as soon as possible, and have co-opted new Councillors, Claire Gutsell and Steven Hartree.

To further compound the situation, our long serving Clerk to the Parish Council, Bruce Poole, announced his intention to resign. We are indeed fortunate to announce that his replacement Hazel Brinton has taken up her post on 1st October 2015.

We welcome Hazel to Bleadon and wish her a long and happy stay with us.



Bleadon Rights of Way Group

BROW is a voluntary organisation which aims to keep the footpaths in the Bleadon Parish clear and accessible for all. There are no specific times or weeks that they meet, it is on an ad hoc arrangement as needs arise. Sadly Andy Eddy has had to step down this year as the organiser and driving force behind the group. He is a great loss. Ian Findlay our Village Ranger has taken on the role and has organised two path clearances recently. The footpath running along the river Axe from the A370 was recut after several months of closure due to high river levels. Before and after pictures are shown below.

The group have petrol strimmers, hedge cutters and other gardening tools to use in clearing the footpaths. Some of our volunteers have attended a Council run course on the use of the strimmer in public places. All work undertaken is risk assessed and a copy kept on file. The group have also replaced styles with kissing gates, resurfaced footpaths and repaired steps used on the footpaths.

It is stressed that this is a voluntary group, thus there is no obligation to undertake the work, however those who have taken part have experienced a real feeling of satisfaction when a job is completed. By the very nature of the work undertaken a certain amount of walking and carrying equipment is required, and anybody is welcome to come and help. Thanks to Chris Butler the dates of BROW projects are usually found on the Bleadon Bob web site. If attending a path clearance suitable footwear and clothing should be worn for the weather conditions, rough terrain and brambles.

Your Bleadon Ranger is Ian Findlay



Ian is often to be seen around the village, in fact normally you cannot miss him in his bright orange Hi Vis clothing. Ian has a number of tasks to complete each week within a set amount of hours including litter picking, playground inspection and maintenance, notice boards, signs and bins. Ian also undertakes the strimming of the Quarry and Roman Road beauty spots and general maintenance around the village, for example, this summer the crash barrier was repainted in the Halls car park. It is not always possible to complete all the tasks every week as other demands on his time and other issues need to be addressed.

Recently Ian has had to spend time repairing damage caused by vandals, for instance, making secure buildings where an attempted burglary took place at the Jubilee Hall. The vandalism has included arson, broken crockery, broken glass, eggs and other petty acts proliferated in and around the village centre.

Ian would urge anyone who sees or knows about these incidents to contact the police and the Parish Council as this is the only way we will put a stop to it.

The village notice boards are usually updated on a Monday morning. Ian asks that any posters or notices for the village notice boards please be left at the post office prior to Monday as anything arriving after he has collected from the post office on Monday will not be put up until the following week. Please allow sufficient time for your posters to be displayed, i.e. handing them in on Tuesday for an event that weekend is too late and likely to cause disappointment!

Ian is always available for a chat while on his rounds and he is partial to a cup of coffee, white with one sugar!

Police and Community Safety

There has been a recent escalation in crime on our beautiful village, particularly in the centre of the village around the halls and car park. The Jubilee Hall was victim to an attempted break in, various attempts at setting fire to things such as notice boards, criminal damage to vehicles parked in the car park, drugs being offered to young children and a serious assault on a young boy.

Please ensure that all crimes, even attempted crimes, are reported to police so that police resources can be targeted where they are needed most. Crimes can be reported by calling the police on 101 (999 if a crime is in progress) or via the Avon & Somerset website using the contact us tab.

To help ensure villagers safety and prevent crime we now have good quality CCTV cameras monitoring the area around the halls, car park and playground. If any further crimes are committed this will ensure those committing such crimes can be identified and prosecuted.

We have also been asked by the Community Response Team to inform you that local villages are being targeted by unscrupulous groups of criminals claiming to be offering to do various jobs around properties such as painting & decorating, roofing, driveways and handyman work.

Bleadon has a no cold calling policy, so these people shouldn't be knocking on your door. Advice is to send them away, or even

better don't even open the door to them, and call the police on 101 to inform them. If you can supply a description and vehicle index number even better.

The village still has a dog fouling problem on footpaths around the village. We know that most of you are meticulous about picking up your dog's poo, but unfortunately there are still one or two people who think this rule doesn't apply to them. Please be assured if we see those responsible for leaving this unsightly mess they will be prosecuted. I'd like to say hung drawn and quartered but sadly that's not legal nowadays!

Please ensure your poo bags are either taken home or deposited in the dog poo bins provided. Please note, the bin by the bus shelter is not for dog poo, there is a proper bin provided just a few yards along Bleadon Road.

To end on a high note the village tubs were planted up on 31st October, with a record number of helpers turning up on the day to help with planting. Thank you to everyone who came along and to Keith Pyke for organising the plants and the weather! The tubs in and around the village should provide a welcome dash of colour through to next Spring.



New CCTV cameras installed in car park

In a bid to ensure that any criminal or anti-social activity is brought to justice new hi-resolution cameras have been installed in the car park and community space at the heart of our village.

The deterrent factor of being captured on CCTV seems to have worked, as the spate of anti-social behaviour appears to have ceased for now. 
