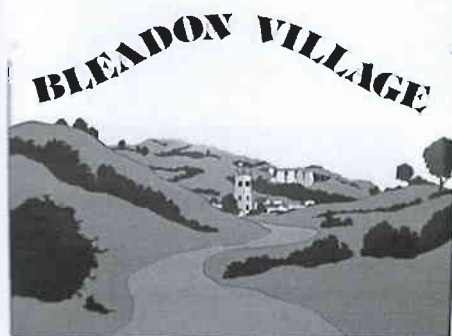
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Welcome to the Summer edition of Bleadon News

Did you know that 1,400 bell ringers lost their lives in The Great War of 1914 - 1918?

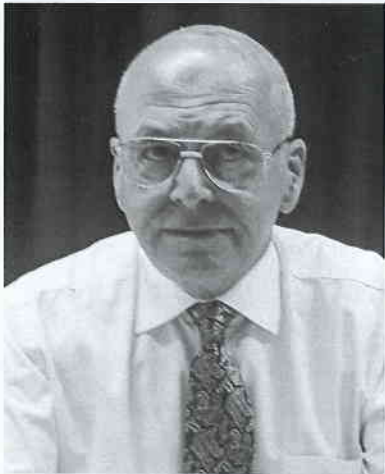
The aim is to recruit and teach at least 1,400 bell ringers nationally by 11th November 2018.

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Somewhere for our young people

On Thursday evenings from 7 'til 9 the youngsters of Bleadon and it's neighbouring villages have a safe place to call their own. Somewhere to chat, play and learn with friends. For many youngsters this is a first chance to begin growing up and becoming independent.



Most of the youngsters (between 10 and 17 years) just want somewhere safe and welcoming to hang out with their friends. Maybe play a game of table tennis, pool or dodge-ball. Or just chat over a soft drink and a chocolate bar.

The young YMCA staff that run the Thursday evening sessions like to offer a low key sociable atmosphere where the young members lead the agenda, but with skilled and qualified support from the YMCA youth workers.

If you have a son or daughter who wants to start standing on their own two feet pop along and see May (our YMCA youth leader) on a Thursday evening. For youngsters the drop-in youth club sessions are just £1.50 per week. The first trial session is usually free. It often helps if newcomers come with a friend or two to start.

PLUS somewhere for our young at heart

The youth centre building is available for hire for other activities too. We already have a couple of U3A groups running weekly activities, a consortium of childminders who use the building every Wednesday, plus a table tennis club twice weekly.

The building is simple, colourful and ideal for kid's parties and other celebrations.

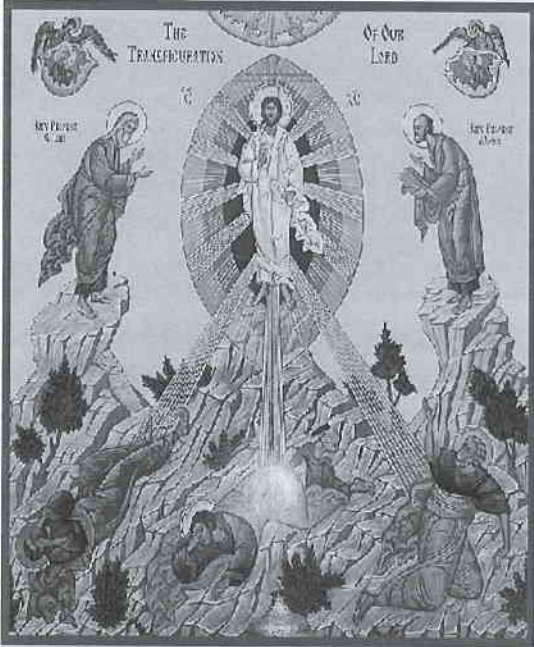

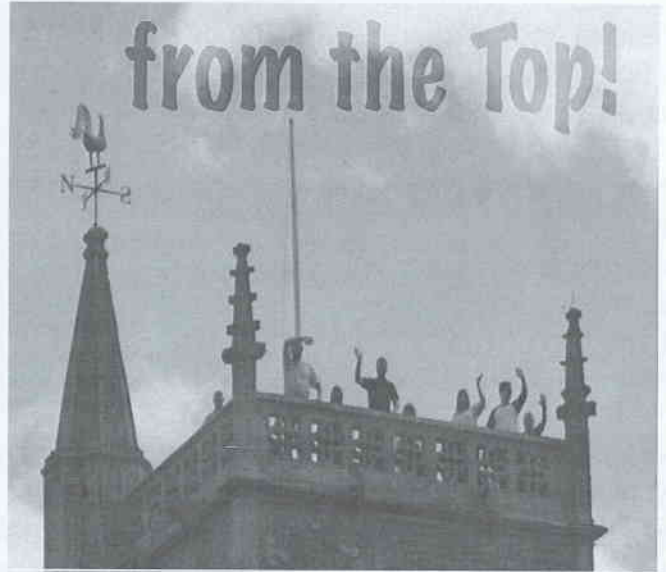

Bleadon Acting Together



Bleadon Acting Together started as a small group of people concerned about a planning application in Purn Way. Purn Way has a closed end and we are often seen in the road talking to each other about Bleadon issues.

Then we heard that there was going to be an application for 250 houses and a school on the fields at the front of the village. We didn't see anything being done except some people doing a survey and we forgot all about it. The group in Purn way concentrated on a housing development behind us. We got information from Bleadon BOB and from the campaigners who fought the application at the top of the hill. We also had a lot of local knowledge as some of the people had lived in the village all their lives.

In the next couple of weeks, the public meeting was advertised for the 200 houses and we went to find out more at the hall. Once again, we all met each other in Purn Way and swapped stories about who was doing what. We felt that there was an uncoordinated effort, so we formed Bleadon Action Group to bring our knowledge to support the fight and help the village decide what we needed to do to show solidarity against the developers. We arranged a public meeting of our own.

The issues became apparent at that meeting and we could see that there were some parts of Bleadon not working together. We had our own challenges in this regard and emotions were running high. Lots of people with excellent intentions were not pulling together.

Action was our intention, so we started to communicate and to gather a petition. We created a network around the village so that information could get to people quickly. Meetings were huge but done in houses and we all brought chairs. We thought seriously about what people would get from our communications and sought only to inform and help.

The planning application arrived, and we set to work with our network to alert people in the village to the application. Many of the people in the parish felt strongly that we needed some formal representation, so we collected a fighting fund and hired a specialist. This process took some time as we stuck to a formal procurement process where possible and looked at several options. We applied for an extension to the process and we were fortunate enough to get one. The Bleadon Objection was published on the North Somerset Council Planning site.

At the same time the Parish Council had been struggling for members and it became obvious that our best course of action was to bring the village together by joining the Parish Council. Jim Baines, Anne Selway, Joanne Richardson, Andy Scarisbrick and Kirsten Hemingway-Arnold all agreed to apply for co-option. Kirsten was initially rejected by the sitting parish council but was elected at the next meeting.

With five of the team now part of both organisations and with public opinion that our name implied we were rebels or activists we decided to change the name of Bleadon Action Group to Bleadon Acting Together. We went from BAG to BAT and added a beautiful new logo.

Large-Scale Planning Application



It is fair to say that the vast majority of planning proposals that the Parish Council is called to comment upon, whilst obviously of importance to the applicant (and perhaps to neighbours), have little impact upon the village as a whole. This is clearly not the case with the planning application submitted for the fields bounded by Bleadon Road, Bridge Road, and the A370 Bridgwater Road.

The application for outline planning permission for up to 200 dwellings, health centre/doctors surgery, retail outlets and office space clearly has the potential to radically change the character of Bleadon.

North Somerset Council has, through its 'Core Strategy' and the 'Joint Spatial Plan', set out its strategy for expansion of housing development in the area. The proposal for Bleadon runs contrary to these plans.

This large-scale development is inappropriate for an "infill" village. The rural character of the village will be submerged in an unsympathetic suburban development. There are many issues regarding the ecological, environmental, and drainage implications of such development. The potential damage to habitats of a wide variety of mammals and birds (including those protected by law) is a very real concern. The impact on the wider landscape is significant with Bleadon's close proximity to an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Deep concerns are held regarding the likely impact of a sizeable increase in traffic on already dangerous roads.

The Parish Council has, robustly, objected to the proposal on behalf of the village. It is also gratifying to note that a great many residents have taken the trouble to demonstrate their desire to protect their village from inappropriate development; through their on-line comments on the North Somerset planning portal, or through their letters. It is noted that of the 391 emailed and written responses made by individuals regarding the plans, to date, only 3 are in support of the development. The Bleadon Action Group (now Bleadon Acting Together) has also been active in its objections to the scheme; and has secured valuable local press coverage.

As the deadline for this article approaches, no decision has yet been reached by the planning authorities. It is to be hoped that North Somerset Council will remain true to its own planning policies; and furthermore, that it will take into account the very articulate and, in many cases, well-researched objections of the residents of Bleadon. We live in an attractive village, set within a beautiful landscape. It is hoped that the people of Bleadon will continue to fight to preserve this environment; and to ensure that their Parish Council has a full complement of councillors to represent them.

Neighbourhood Plan for Bleadon?

On 11th June the Parish Council resolved 'to facilitate the establishment of a Neighbourhood Plan Working Group to formulate a Neighbourhood Plan and to submit appropriate funding application(s). Parishioners supportive of a Neighbourhood Plan to be invited to apply to the Parish Council to be members of the Working Group.'

The process will bring out the aspirations and fears of residents as well as identifying the threats and opportunities for the village.

It is not a 'done deal' - a final draft of a plan has to be passed by a referendum of the electorate - but doing nothing will get us nowhere.

Councillors Gill Williams, Andy Scarisbrick and Anne Selway have agreed to co-ordinate the group and it is expected that the first meeting will be held by early September.

Hall News

One of Bleadon's anti-loneliness hubs, the Coronation Halls, continues to thrive, to the benefit of large numbers of people from the village and a good distance round. The halls are regularly used by a range of clubs and classes, the monthly markets provide a meeting place for many who do not belong to organisations, and the facility is frequently used for special occasions, happy or sad.

A recent one in the latter category was the wake for Len Chamberlain, who died in April. He had served on our committee for over thirty years, presiding over enormous changes while chairman, especially the construction of the Jubilee Room. It is hard now to imagine how the village made do with one hall for so many years, and those of us who were even slightly involved can testify to the scale of the achievement. Harry Chatterley and Barbara Snelgrove, the other main drivers of the enterprise, have their portraits in the Jubilee Room and we are going to place a photograph of Len alongside them. For all of them "Si monument requiris circumspice" is appropriate.

In my last report I explained that we were exploring the idea of somebody to fill a new role on the lines of a caretaker/premises supervisor, and it seems very likely we have found the right person in the shape of Bill Blacklock, a Bleadon Mill original. So far he has taken on the responsibility of letting in and showing round our many occasional hirers, he makes regular checks on the building, and he sees that the rubbish and recycling are disposed of. There are still details to be worked out, but the signs are that we shall soon have a very good team in place.

The maintenance of such a large building always needs attention and two significant items are planned for this summer. We intend to replace the fire doors near the stage in the main hall and those at the north end of the Jubilee Room. This will not be cheap, but the mechanisms on both sets are causing far too many problems for hall users and a radical solution is necessary. In addition we are having the walls and ceiling of the Jubilee Room repainted. A number of organisations take a break for the summer, especially in August, and we hope that when normal service is resumed in September the difference will be noticed.

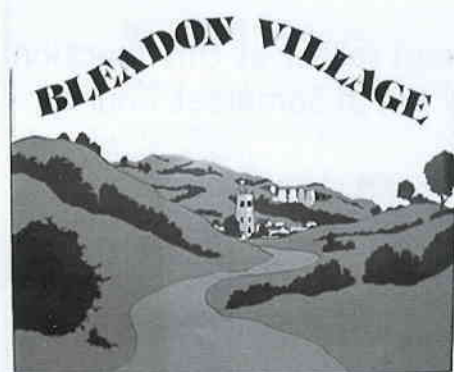
