## Introduction

This is our draft plan for making Bleadon an excellent place to live and work. This draft Parish Plan is about how the parish council, together with residents proposes to develop a safe, sustainable and attractive community.

It sets out what has been done since the Parish Plan process was started and what remains to be done.

The parish council cannot work alone in making it right for residents in Bleadon. It requires action in partnership with North Somerset Council, Somerset County Council, Sedgemoor District Council, the Police, NHS, other agencies and residents.

#### The process

The Bleadon Parish Plan started in late 2004 when all households in the parish were invited to a public meeting to launch the process.

The leaflet that invited residents and businesses to the launch meeting in January 2005 was deliberately contentious. The intention was to stimulate debate and raise issues that would have to be faced in the future. It included a pictorial vision of how our community might be in years to come.

#### A packed house

Nearly 200 people packed the Coronation Hall on 15 January to hear about the parish plan. It was standing room only for many villagers at this inaugural event. For a while it looked like some would be locked out because of lack of space. But on a tide of community self-help tables were passed head-over-head to create more space.

#### The plan explained

A 20 minute on-screen presentation explained the reason for having a village plan. We heard how it could shape our future, what it might include and how the whole community could help in the production of the plan.

The government wants local communities to take more control of their own lives. Through Village Plans it is giving us the right to say what we want doing in our neighbourhood and the ability to engage with the powers that can help get it done.

Our Bleadon plan will help us deliver what our community needs in the future.

#### **Feedback**

At the launch event there was plenty of feedback on what **you most value** and most **want to improve** in the parish. We had hundreds of suggestions from those that attended.

You also told us what you disliked and had concerns about. See *Appendix 2 - Bleadon dislikes*.

You also told us what ideas you liked and disliked on the village plan leaflet.

Now that we had a good idea about your local concerns and aspirations we could focus our research.

## Four themes for action

To help decide what this community needs in the future, four volunteer action groups were set up to work on the key themes of the plan. We were very fortunate to get around 24 volunteers at the event to help with the action groups.

The four themes are:

#### **Economy and prosperity**, whose key priorities are:

- to increase local job opportunities and reduce the need to commute out of the area
- secure the prosperity of residents
- · encourage local enterprise

#### Well-being and safety, whose key priorities are:

- improve road safety
- · reduce crime and fear of crime
- reduce anti-social behaviour
- maximise opportunities for older people to live full and independent lives in the community
- improve access and choice of housing for all
- promote healthy and active lifestyles

#### Learning and leisure throughout life, whose key priorities are:

- develop and promote enjoyment of our environment
- improve opportunities for play
- · promote healthy and active lifestyles
- promote effective social inclusion
- widen participation in learning
- · improve existing and create new community learning facilities

#### **Environment,** whose main priorities are:

- protect and improve the quality of our natural and built environment
- improve traffic management
- improve footpaths and access to our countryside
- ensure that future building development is in character and sustainable
- meeting future housing needs

#### The big questionnaire

Before any Plan could be drawn up the Action Groups and the Steering Committee needed to gain a wider picture of what Bleadon residents thought of their parish. A comprehensive survey was required of all households and businesses.

From the action teams came suggestions for questions that should be included in the survey.

In September 2005 the survey forms were distributed and collected by the 20 volunteers. An impressive 60% of residents responded with completed questionnaires. With the feedback you gave us we were able to establish some key themes. These mirrored many of the themes addressed in the North Somerset Council's Community Strategy.

# Key themes linked to the North Somerset's Community Strategy

All statistics quoted here are the result of the household survey that was delivered to 475 Bleadon households in September 2005.

265 households responded, so it is a fair representation of the parish as a whole.

Where we say that we've already achieved something it is not necessarily the parish council that has done this. Often this success is down to individuals and community groups, as well as other local authorities.

#### **Transport**

#### Facts

- Only 8% of Bleadon households don't have a car
- 53% of households have two or more cars
- 89% use car as main means of transport
- only 6% use the bus service which is financially supported by North Somerset Council
- Even travelling to local village facilities 50% use their car
- 70% wouldn't want to share their car

#### We have already

- · fought to retain the local bus service
- encouraged the provision of a faster more direct bus service
- introduced Dial-a-Ride in the village
- provided cycle parking racks in the car park

#### We want to

- provide a bus shelter at Purn Way
- improve facilities for bus parking at Purn Way
- encourage a more frequent bus service to the Veale
- · encourage the provision of more safe cycle routes
- improve the provision of off-road car parking
- improve the availability and use of home to school transport

- promote and encourage use of the bus service
- promote and encourage use of the Dial-a-Ride service
- work to retain a regular bus service, particularly the connections to the hospital and Weston
- reduce use of private cars
- encourage car sharing
- look at providing better and safer vehicle access to the village from the A370

#### **Environment**

#### Facts

- 97% want to safeguard the green belt between Bleadon and Weston-super-Mare.
- Tranquility and openness within the parish are very highly valued
- Noise pollution, particularly from road traffic and increasingly from air traffic is considered significant
- Many are concerned about localised flooding at times of heavy rainfall
- · Dog fouling is anti-social and dangerous to human health
- · Litter is anti-social, unsightly and a danger to wildlife

#### We have already

- · employed a parish ranger
- have a regular weekly litter clean-up
- · installed dog bins
- had seasonal village plant-ups
- fought to conserve the space around the village cross
- · resurfaced the church footpath
- worked to improve access to footpath gateways
- surfaced the Whitegate Farm footpath
- argued to limit development of the Whitegate paddock

#### We want to

- limit noise pollution around the parish
- install energy efficient lighting in all our community buildings
- reduce light pollution through more appropriate lighting
- promote energy efficiency and reduce our carbon footprint
- enter the Britain in Bloom competition

- retain the green space between Weston and Bleadon
- conserve the rural character of the parish
- protect and improve the tranquil nature of the parish
- improve drainage
- conserve and encourage wildlife
- conserve and encourage woodland
- protect our historic buildings
- minimise the impact of development on our environment
- maintain good access to footpaths and work with the responsible authorities to keep them maintained

#### Communities and people

#### **Facts**

- the population of Bleadon is 1068 (2001 census)
- there are 874 registered electors
- people live in Bleadon because they love village life, want to be with family or close to work
- 90% of you disagree with having a travellers' site in the parish
- 38% are retired
- 32% go to church once a year
- 50% do not attend a church at all
- 50% use the Coronation Hall and 10% the church meeting room
- only 18% occasionally use the mobile library
- the NHS says it wants to deliver services more locally

#### We have already

- Supported the establishment of a new village PO, shop and café
- Installed a community computer with free internet access in the village café
- Installed three parish & community notice-boards around the village
- a very successful monthly village market in the Coronation Hall
- supported the Contactus community welcome group
- provided financial support for youth activities in the parish
- worked with NSC to install dropped kerbs in key locations to aid access for all
- published a village calendar

#### We want to

- improve the welcome pack for new residents
- encourage public participation at parish council meetings
- continue to support the various community groups
- build a network of mutual support for people in our community
- provide a memorial woodland / cemetery
- continue providing public toilets in the village
- work with the health authorities to provide more local health services from our community facilities
- help make it easier for people with long-term ill-health or disabilities to live in their own homes
- help the monthly village market to thrive

- retain an accessible community multi-functional building in the heart of the village
- retain the church and promote its use by the community
- improve the parish website and encourage public participation
- encourage young and new residents to join village organisations and become active members of our community
- support the Baby & Toddler Welfare Clinic
- provide support and care for the infirm in our community
- work with the health services to ensure that the best possible service is provided
- help and encourage residents to be active and healthy
- improve our communications with our community

#### Culture, leisure and recreation

#### **Facts**

- 78% think the Coronation Hall facilities are good or adequate
- 38% favour developing a recreation space adjacent to Bridge Road in conjunction with housing
- 22% use the play area
- over 19 activity/social groups use the Coronation Hall monthly

#### We have already

- seen the development of a croquet field at Purn Way
- replaced the children's slide with a multi-use climber and slide
- leased and improved the public space beside the youth club
- opened up and improved the public area around the youth club with seating and planters
- landscaped and planted the area between the Coronation/Jubilee Halls and the car park
- started landscaping the rear of the Jubilee Hall

#### We want to

- open negotiations with the landowners to progress the development of recreation and community facilities alongside Bridge Road
- develop an Axe river trail through to Loxton
- see the completion of the Tidal Trail from Uphill to Berrow
- have safer pedestrian/equestrian crossings on the A370 particularly where the Mendip Walk crosses it
- encourage guided walks around our parish trails
- create a wheelchair-friendly public route from Roman Road lay-by to summit of Hellenge Hill
- see the continued success of performing arts in the village
- install interpretation boards around the parish that explain our history, environment and recreation opportunities

- improve access and disabled facilities in the Coronation Halls and Youth Club
- support the mobile library service or develop alternatives
- provide safe play equipment in the Play Area that will fulfil the developing needs of children and young people
- provide a safe environment for our children that encourages them to play and learn
- provide social interaction facilities throughout the parish to encourage people of all ages to meet and talk

#### Community safety

#### Fact

- 87% consider there are traffic danger spots within the parish
- Locations of perceived danger are Shiplate Road, the junction by the Queens Arms, the junctions onto the A370 at Bridge Garage and the Anchor Inn
- The bend on Bleadon Road at junction with Purn Way experiences the most traffic accidents
- 74% think that speeding traffic is a problem in the parish, with Shiplate Road and Bleadon Road registering most concern (22% each)
- the majority of speeding drivers caught on police radar are local residents
- 33% of residents indicate that they have been victims of crime within the parish (mainly burglary and theft)
- our parish has one of the lowest reported crime figures in North Somerset
- people are fairly evenly split between wanting, not wanting or not caring about house numbering
- 75% think that current street lighting is adequate

#### We have already

- worked with North Somerset Council to improve road surfacing and markings at Purn Way/Bleadon Road junction
- worked with NSC to improve road safety and traffic management at the Anchor junction on the A370
- worked with NSC to provide safe pedestrian access to the bus stop opposite Purn Farm on the A370
- worked with the police to instigate periodic speed checks on the troublesome routes
- installed CCTV around the Coronation car park and play area
- improved lighting around the car park, Coronation Hall and youth club
- · introduced dog bins to reduce dog fouling
- encouraged the retention of regular police drop-in surgeries

#### We want to

- · further improve the junction of Purn Way and Bleadon Road for traffic and pedestrians
- work with NSC and Somerset County Council to reduce traffic speeds on the A370
- improve pedestrian safety, particularly in the areas of Bridge Road and Bleadon Road / Purn Way
- improve pedestrian access to the Coronation Halls site

- continue work with NSC to improve traffic management and safety at the junctions with the A370 at Bridge Road and the Anchor Inn
- work to keep traffic speeds safe throughout the parish
- promote Neighbourhood Watch throughout the parish
- allay fear of crime and safety by communicating the real facts
- · promote self/community-help actions to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour
- create an environment that discourages crime

#### Learning and skills

#### **Facts**

- 20% would like adult education classes in the village
- · the most common request was for personal computer classes
- 26% would like a village school if numbers permit
- we have a flourishing youth club with over 40 young members
- we have at least 19 local community groups regularly using the Coronation Hall

#### We have already

- established a Local History Group
- supported the continuation of the watercolour painting classes
- worked towards wirelessly linking the Coronation Hall to the youth club computer for internet access
- sought to clarify the position on school admissions and obtained reassurances from NSC and Somerset CC
- · seen the re-establishment of the Guides group
- provided a community computer and free internet access

#### We want to

- see the provision of a local primary school should the number of children in the parish justify it
- encourage the development of holiday and after-school clubs
- develop a computer literate and internet active community
- help develop more opportunities for young people
- have clear guidelines and assurances for Bleadon parents on the school admissions policies of North Somerset and Somerset councils
- encourage the development of adult learning in the community

- help develop more adult learning opportunities
- strive to retain a flourishing youth club
- strive to retain the Brownies and Guides and see them flourish
- provide community based learning facilities
- continue to support the wide range of local community groups

#### **Economy and employment**

## Facts ???????

#### We have already

- Held an open "get to know" evening with local businesses
- Supported the development of new commercial units at Purn House Farm
- Supported the improvement of commercial units at Purn Farm
- Supported the development of the village shop, post office and café
- Talked to Marshalls about the possible future development of the guarry site

#### We want to

- encourage local businesses to take on local youngsters for work experience
- encourage local businesses to take on more local employees
- support the growth and success of existing local business
- work to retain existing business
- encourage enterprise and creative business thinking in the parish
- see new business opportunities develop to replace the quarry
- see the development of high quality business premises
- · see the development of thriving and sustainable tourism in the area
- encourage diversity in agriculture

- support local employment for local people
- encourage diverse opportunities in employment
- support local business with local custom
- encourage successful new business start-ups
- encourage environmentally acceptable and sustainable business development
- encourage a thriving village shop
- retain the village post office
- retain our agricultural heritage

#### Housing

#### Facts

- 25% have lived here less than six years
- 90% are owner occupiers
- over 75% live in 3 or 4 bedroom properties
- 50% want no new housing
- any new housing is preferred as infill within the current village 'development fence'
- Weston-super-Mare is set by the Government to grow by 20,000 houses within 10 years

#### We have already

seen increasing loss of garden space to housing infill

#### We want to

· keep all housing development within the village settlement boundary

- encourage the provision of affordable housing for local people
- ensure that developments retain our small village character and scale
- discourage over-development of infill land and loss of garden space
- retain the village development boundary
- oppose development of Greenfield sites

## What next?

This draft plan addresses some of the issues that will face our community in the foreseeable future. It doesn't provide all the answers. How we achieve all of what is required of us is yet to be addressed.

The parish council will work with all the outside agencies to provide you with the best possible services.

The parish council can lead on many actions, but it will be down to all of you to contribute towards the solutions.
