The four year term of this Parish Council ends in early May. On May 7th National, District and Parish Council elections take place across the country.

Many members of the parish council are standing down this year, including myself after 13 years as chairman. Unfortunately, only four candidates have put their names forward for the parish council. This means that the new parish council will need to co-opt members on to the council. This is a chance to serve your community and join the Bleadon Parish Council team. Perhaps you have a 'wish' list, perhaps you would have done things differently. Democracy reigns, ignore the pessimists, I'm sure there will always be a parish council.

It was lovely to see so many of you at the **Annual Parish Meeting** in the Coronation Hall on **April 13th.** This is often the most important meeting of the year. Our District Councillors were be there to field your questions and concerns about the threat of more housing development and bus services.

Unfortunately the new defibrillator wasn't yet in place for the Annual Meeting. By the time you read this it should be installed on the wall of the Coronation Hall. Sponsorship funding is being sought for this invaluable asset to our community.

The Parish Precept has been set at the same rate as last year. Just £73.66 for the average Band D household in Bleadon. This is in spite of increasing costs being passed to the Parish as a result of continued budget cutting by central government and district council.

As many of you will know an outline planning application for housing on Bleadon Hill has again been submitted to North Somerset Council. Considerable and lengthy deliberations were discussed by the Parish Council and concerned members of the public. We now await the outcome from North Somerset.

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Elections

On Thursday 7 May we shall all be going to the polls to elect our two District Councillors and our Member of Parliament.

There will be no parish council election in Bleadon on 7 May because just four candidates have stood for the nine available seats on Bleadon Parish Council. This means that the election is uncontested.

The four candidates are automatically elected to the parish council after 7 May without any further ado.

Following the first meeting of the parish council on Monday 11 May the four elected coucillors must try and co-opt five other residents to join them on the parish council.

a Bankrupt or a convicted criminal.

If you really care about the community you live in and want to see it thrive and prosper.

If you want to get things done to ensure that our village continues as a wonderful place to live in.

If you want to see progress and improvement, but not at any cost to our semi-rural idyl.

If you want to have a say in what the council spends taxpayers' money on and are willing to work towards ensuring that the council delivers the best value services.

If you have ideas that you are willing to argue for and turn into action. Working as part of the team delivering those on ideas.

Still interested in being co-opted on to the parish council?

You need to be willing to give up some of your time. How much time depends on you and your committment to work for your community without being paid.

The parish council meets once a month, usually on the second Monday of the month. These meetings generally last up to two hours.

As a councillor you will also sit on some of the committees that manage the council's resources and deliver the services. These include:

Planning Committee - meets once a month plus visits to planning application sites as required

Finance & Personnel - meets 2 or 3 times a year

Open Spaces - meets 2 or 3 times a year

Whenever possible the committee meetings take place just prior to the Monday evening council meetings.

No increase in Bleadon Parish Precept for 2015/16

In January the parish council voted to keep the Parish Precept at its current level of £38,000. This is the part of the annual Council Tax bill householders pay towards running the parish council and providing its services.

Bleadon households in an average D Band property are paying £73.66 annually towards the cost of services provided by the parish council.

At a time when costs and responsibilities for the parish are increasing year-on-year it is clear that there will be an increasing call on the council's financial reserves. The actual budget spend for 2015/16 is predicted at over £48,000, which means taking almost £10,000 from bank reserves unless substantial savings can be made over the coming months.

These are challenging times for the new parish council which are likely to continue for some years to come as responsibility for services is devolved from central government and the district council. They are both seeking to make massive savings. The result will be a loss of services or finding other ways of funding them.

In recent years we've seen responsibility for public toilets, youth service provision, dog bin emptying and footpath maintenance transferred to the parish council. What will be next - bus services, verge cutting, litter bin emptying, pot holes, care of the elderly and infirm, library services, policing?

Challenging times and difficult decisions ahead!

Goodbye green fields?

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A pre-planning enquiry for up to 24 dwellings has been submitted to North Somerset Council by the owners of the fields to the north of Amesbury Drive.

Under established arrangements for pre-application this enquiry will be dealt with internally by North Somerset officers and councillors. Hopefully, by the end of April.

Formal consultation with third parties (residents and parish council) will be undertaken if a formal planning application is subsequently made.





The fields that link Purn Way with Rectory Drive lie outside the Bleadon Development (Settlement) Boundary. North Somerset Council will take this and the greenfield importance of the site into consideration when looking at this enquiry.

Hopefully, we shall see this pre-application enquiry dismissed. But I have to declare an interest. Our home overlooks these fields! *Editor*



Barn proposal refused

An application to erect a large agricultural storage barn on the field south of Bleadon Road opposite Chestnut Lane has been refused by North Somerset Council. They concluded that the design (including size and massing) and siting of the proposed agricultural building would result in an incongruous and utilitarian structure in an open landscape which would be harmful to this open rural landscape.

Development proposals for 79 houses on Bleadon Hill

There was a packed house of concerned residents and councillors at the February meeting of the Bleadon Planning Committee when proposals for new housing on Bleadon Hill were discussed.

The new development would effectively link Weston and Bleadon.

The proposed development on the two fields west of Bleadon Hill Road opposite Hillcote would bridge the current green and open rural space that separates Bleadon from Weston.

The proposed housing development was unanimously opposed and rejected by Bleadon Parish Council. Let us hope that North Somerset Council Planning officers and councillors are of a like mind and will wish to refuse the Planning Application when it agrees before the North Somerset Blanning.

wish to refuse the Planning Application when it comes before the North Somerset Planning Committee in the coming months. Similar, but smaller, applications have met with refusal in the past. However, these are changing times and more relaxed planning guidelines from central government can mean that local strategies, opinion and desires can count for little against the big guns of developers.



Welcome sewage pipe improvements on Bleadon Road have meant some traffic disruption throughout March and April



Wessex Water are installing a new sewer pipe from the Bridge Road junction along Bleadon Road towards Purn to the pumping station. This is to alleviate occasional problems with sewage flooding to properties in the area of the Barton and Coronation Road. The new pipe with help remove excess flows in the area.

Rolling road dosure

Wessex Water contractors are carrying out the works utilising a rolling road closure commencing from outside the sewage pumping station and progressing in an easterly direction from the sewage pumping station along Bleadon Road to the junction with Bridge Road. Disruptions to property access will be minimised by the rolling roadblock, and contractors are liaising with local residents

when they cannot provide vehicular access to their property for a small period of time.

Completion 24 April

Wessex are planning to complete the works by 24th April if all goes well. If they are still occupying the

highway on May Day, 4th May, they will make provisions to ensure the road is open in some capacity (traffic lights etc) but are aiming to complete the works before this time.

Hopefully, this major improvement to the sewage system will help alleviate the problems of flooding that have plagued residents in the Coronation Road and Barton area during recent years of extraordinary rainfall.

A day packed with live entertainment and fun-filled activities is promised. Some traditional favourites like the Chalice Morris Men will be kicking up their bells and wacking their sticks. In celebration of their long association with the Bleadon May Day Fayre the Chalice Men will be performing a new dance specially created for our Bleadon May Fayre.

The children's fancy dress parade will be led from the church to the Coronation car park at 11:30 by Disney Frozen characters Elsa and Olaf. Prizes for everyone who enters and lots of photo opportunities for mums, dads and proud grandparents.

Smokestax Blues Band will be providing the background notes throughout the day. So get your dancing shoes on for later in the day when the Butcombe and Thatchers liberates those inhibitions.

New this year will be a choral performance by our very own **Bleadon Belles**. Fresh from their winning **performance** at the National Federation of Women's Institutes centenary choir competition and soon to be performing for Her Majesty the Queen and the **Princess Royal at the Albert Hall.**

In the play area a host of games and stalls will keep the kids happy (bring plenty of 20p and 50p), while mums and dads can enjoy some tasty home-made food and a refreshing glass of Butcombe or Thatchers.

Bleadon Art Group will be exhibiting some very fine art in the Jubilee Room. After 2pm you can also enjoy a relaxed **cream tea** amongst the artworks.



New bus shelter on A370

In the last issue of *Bleadon Village News* we reported that a new (recycled) bus shelter was to be installed on the A370 outside Purn Holiday Park opposite Fork (Fiat) Services.

We are happy to report that the shelter was installed earlier this year. However, the hoped for respite from the prevailing westerly winds and rain has not been forthcoming. The shelter has been installed with its back to the road so that advertisers get full value from the prime location on the main road while waiting passengers get a frequently windy view across the Bleadon Levels.

This has also meant that the pavement has been obstructed and disabled access from the raised curb is no longer possible. A rather silly state of affairs that has been drawn to the attention of North Somerset Council.

Fortunately, North Someset Council is also unhappy with the insensitive location of the shelter and have demanded that the installers put things right as quickly as possible.

With the current changes to our 83 service through Bleadon the Nos. 21,76 and 102 bus routes along the A370 have become vital in providing a faster and more frequent service into Weston, Taunton and Bridgwater.

Meanwhile, back in the village there's some confusion

The new Crosville bus service started running at the end of March. The long established 83 service through Bleadon has been replaced by the hourly* 4A bus on its way from Weston, via Bleadon to **Hutton**.

Unfortunately, the Crosville timetable for the 4A fails to tell us that this new service goes through Bleadon village on its way to Hutton and then to Weston.

No mention of Bleadon

The Anchor Inn A370 stop is mentioned, and Burnham Drive on Bleadon Hill. From this we are to deduce that the service runs through Bleadon, but we have to guess a bit at exact times.

It appears that the 4A bus arrives at the Coronation Road stop at around 40 minutes past the hour, starting at 08:40 and finishing at 17:40.

Now via Hutton to Weston.

The new route takes the bus via Bleadon Hill, along Oldmixon Road to **Hutton**. At Hutton the bus turns around and heads for Weston's Regent Street via Broadway, Uphill Hospital, Uphill and Drove/ Devonshire Roads. Arriving at Regent Street some 40 minutes after leaving Bleadon.

The return from Weston is less tortuous and takes a more reasonable 20 minutes. Leaving the Regent Street stop for **Hutton** at 22 minutes past the hour. The route from Regent Street takes in Drove/ Devonshire Roads, Uphill and the hospital. Then along Bridgwater Road to the Anchor and into Bleadon.

Limited afternoon service into Weston

*During school term time the 4A service will not run from Bleadon to Weston during mid afternoons, with no service past Hutton after 13:40 until 16:40. The more popular afternoon return service from Weston isn't so bad with just the 15:22 missing from the hourly schedule during termtime.



Neighbourhood Watch

The *Police News* that used to be delivered four time a year to all NHW members has been axed, no doubt due to cost cutting. However, be assured that even if nothing comes through your door, you are still all registered with the scheme and entitled to home insurance discounts.

Regrettably, our envied status of 100% neighbourhood watch coverage within the village is also at risk. At present, the western half of Shiplate Road, including Old School Lane, and the majority of Celtic Way have no coordinator and are therefore not covered by the scheme. Volunteers required please for Celtic Way and the western end of Shiplate Road and Old School Lane.

It is now nearly a year since Bleadon became a 'No Doorstep Trading' village and it would seem to be working well. Don't forget, if you do get any unwanted callers, call 101 and the Police will respond.

There has been little serious crime in the Parish but unfortunately there have

been several major accidents on the A370. The Road Policing Unit is monitoring driving standards on this road and is carrying out random speed checks from time to time.

Unfortunately, the Community Speedwatch in Bleadon has folded as, although we have all the necessary equipment and sites that have been approved, there seems to be no one who is willing to run it. If there are any volunteers willing to carry out periodical checks on vehicles speeding through the village, please contact the Parish Council.


group.

Lifesaver for the village

A high energy electric shock, given to the heart in some types of cardiac arrest, may restore a more stable rhythm.

This is called defibrillation, and it's an essential lifesaving step in the chain of survival.

After months of debate and procrastination the parish council has invested around £2000 in a lifesaving public access defibrillator to be installed on the outside wall of the Coronation Hall.

In the event of an emergency anyone can access the lifesaver by dialling 999 and requesting the four number code to access the locked cabinet. Then while an ambulance is on its way the untrained rescuer can begin to save a life by following the simple instructions that the machine automatically gives the user.

Designed for the untrained and infrequent rescuer, it is easy to use and understand in a cardiac emergency, where time is of the essence. The defibrillator is a fully automatic model. If the patient has a shock able heart rhythm the defibrillator automatically delivers a shock without any other user intervention required.

The unit combines real-time CPR feedback, fully automatic shock delivery, variable escalating energy and fast shock times. First time users are able to perform each critical step through the help of feedback via voice and text prompts, as well as real time instructions. The machine tells the rescuer what to do and when. The user will even be guided through correct CPR, telling you all the time if

you are doing it right. Thanks to Ian Findlay our village ranger for persevering in his pursuit of obtaining this for the village.

Looking back.....to the 1920s

Tony James has kindly loaned Village News some notes his father Vic James started writing before he died in 2005. Vic lived all his life in one of the brick Church Commission cottages in Purn Way. These random memories of village life in the 1920s and 30s portray a more rural village, where families knew each other from cradle to grave. The pace was slower, life and work were harder. The editor has done nothing to tidy up these jottings of a villager who clearly loved Betjemin. Enjoy them as they are.

Bleadon was like most villages, everyone was very friendly, there was always someone around to have a chat. A lot were related through marriage. In the village we had the Methodist Church in Shiplate Road. We had the school. Mr Watson was headmaster, ably assisted by Miss Miles later to become Mrs Ian Parker and Mrs Bennet. At the foot of the hill the Queens Arms mine host Earnie George. At the foot of Shiplate Road Mabel Nipper opened a general shop. Newbay stores across the road. Roy Goodall had a garage repair and haulage business. Roy once told me when he started selling petrol it was one shilling (5 New Pence) per gallon sold in two gallon cans. I can remember petrol at 1s/4d a gallon. Across the road there was the old Rectory. There lived Rev Powys

David and Mrs David and Mrs Warner. A lovely old rectory but needed a lot of hard work to keep it clean. Very large lawns and gardens.

Now across the road to the village cross which has stood the test of time very well, we come to our lovely old church. Years ago

the organ was situated between the knave and the vestry - not too good as the organ was one end of the church and the choir the other end. I can well remember Frank Sellabear playing the organ and Ron Goodman pumping. Ron would stop

pumping and the organ would go dead. Ron would sometimes before the service play hymns and carols on the bells chiming from ropes in the vestry at the foot of the steps leading to the Tower.

In the later years when Rev Tom Fairchild was Rector the organ chamber was built as we know it today which proved a lot better. A lot of the older folk are resting peacefully in the churchyard.

> Gone are the Banwells, Richards, Goulds, Boleys and Walls, to name but a few. Now we come to the Post Office ably managed by Tom Carter. A little down on the corner of Mulberry Lane lived retired Blacksmith Ernest Parker, Nibble Parker, as he was known. Daughter Rose looked after Nibble.

In the corner below the churchyard was the Blacksmith's shop ably managed by Ernest and brother Charlie. Very busy place shoeing horses, not any tractors about, it was all horses. Next to the smithy at the foot of the Churchyard was Ted Purnell's coal yard, stables and cart sheds. Beside Ted was Gilbert



Purnell's sheds for four wheel bread and and two wheeled bread van. Further up the lane at Mulberry House was the Bakery about 6pm Gilbert, Ted's father, would be seen going to the Victoria Inn for a drink and a chat but at 7pm Gilbert would be going back and about 8pm would be in bed, but about 4 am Mr and Mrs Purnell and son Sid and daughter Maud would be up baking bread. Lovely crusty cottage loaf or a split tin. I can smell it now. No sell by date on their bread. As Fred Purnell got older he sold the coal business to Walter Binding as Ted milked cows it was getting too much for him. Now we come to the village Pump. We all fetched our drinking water from the pump. Everyone had a rainwater tank we used to catch all the rain water possible for general use.

Across to the Parish Room (Coronation Hall) over the years it has been altered a lot but we used to have very enjoyable evenings of all sorts.

Whist drives and dances. 1/6 dance only 1/- No trouble to get prizes for whist. Only had to mention whist and prizes were forthcoming. Now we come to





Victoria Inn. Mine host Miss Payne. Just a beer and cider house but very popular with the villagers. Next the Quarry employing local labour. They used to burn stone into lime and stone and gravel for the roads. No lorries in them days horses and two wheeled cart with a tilting body. The drivers had to walk with the horses when they were loaded and ride home empty. But then came the old Ford lorries that put an end to the horses. Now we come to the Poplars the house of PC Garland the village policeman. Adjoining was Mrs Luscombe's Grocery shop. In early days it was only from her sitting room turned into shop but as business grew the shop was extended to the road as you see it today.

Further down the road where the garage is now was Jock Vinson. Jock sold everything except groceries. Sweets and tobacco, boots, leggings (no wellington boots in those days), clothing all kinds of tools rakes, hay forks, garden tools you name it Jock had it. Galvanised buckets and bowls. Also he used to recharge our accumulators for our wireless sets. Anyone remember the crystal sets? We had a lump of crystal and cats whisker and a pair of headphones. Down the lane at the back of lock was the Mission Hall. Then across the road by the river was Edwin Gilson, carpenter, wheelwright

and village undertaker. When Edwin retired his nephew Reg Gilson took over.

Now we come to Whitegate Farm but no houses until you got to Manor House on the corner of Chestnut Lane. That part Bleadon has always been known as Purn.

Here we have Fairview Farm.
Manor Farm and Purn House
Farm a little along the road was
Catherine's Farm now Catherine's
Inn. Now we come to the Anchor
Inn (host Charlie Hart). We had
many good singalongs in the
Anchor on a Saturday night.
Always someone ready for a
game of cards or dominoes. Now
we come to Purn Farm Dairy the
home of the Boley family for
years until the late Fred Wall
married Jenny Boley, then Fred
took over.

Charlie Parker the Blacksmith married Miss Miles.

The road alright for horses and cart but of course no pavements one had to miss the puddles. After a time the Council came along with the tar spray - a horse drawn sprayer. One man leading the horse another pumping the tar and another spraying the hot tar on the road. A fire under the tar kept it boiling. Then two men would spread sand on the tarred road. A good surface for horses but as more cars and lorries came on the roads the surface became slippery after rain. Roy Goodall recovered many a car that has skidded into the rhyne. Later the

Council used gravel and rolled the gravel into the hot tar for a lot better surface. No buses, years ago a lot of people rode cycles. The first buses came from Weston to Bleadon Corner (6d return) solid tyres and wooden slats for seats the driver had no windscreen.

As a teenager I am told by older generations that once upon a time the sea came up to Purn Hill along the Weston facing side of the hill. I can well believe it as opposite Purn Farm there is an old Quarry where tenants of the Church Commissioners were allowed to take fillings for their Farm gateways. That quarry consisted of layers of sand shingle with fossils, seashells and a layer of clay. Sometimes when we were busy with pick and shovel some of the surface would collapse then you could see distinct layers. No rock was visible. The rock surface you see now was exposed in the road widening. There was shingle right along to Undercliff House it being used in road making.

The Old Wall as it has always been known was no doubt built as a sea defence from Accommodation Road near the caravan park, in a right hand bend to the Railway and road that continues around Bleadon Level to where the sewerage works are being built, joins the road beside the Toll House.

Our open spaces

Cllr Mrs.ID Clarke, Chairman of the Open Spaces Committee reviews the past 12 months in Bleadon's open spaces

As always I am able to begin my report by saying that I am pleased to say that it has been another good year for our Village and its Open Spaces. I hope you agree with me that the village has looked good throughout the year.

Having said this I will dispose of **the negative issues first.**

Sadly I am forced to begin by mentioning the two issues that are now regular opening features of my reports - litter and dog mess.

Litter around the village – As mentioned last year I do not think we villagers are litter throwers but that rubbish is both blown out of our bins or dropped by the collectors. To help overcome this please may we ask that bins are not place out for collection before the night prior to collection – and if rubbish is scattered by the animals or dropped by the collectors at the 'multi collection points' please can it be picked up – both would be a great help and a benefit to all.

The viewing points and the lay-bys in Roman Road are frequently strewn with general litter and takeaway food packaging. This is particularly difficult to understand as presumably the people have driven there as they appreciate the outstanding views – so why spoil it? Sadly we have seen an increase in fly tipping – we can only presume it is linked to the increased cost of disposing of such waste at the local re-cycling centres.

Dog mess – What more can be said - In the past years when writing this report both Penny Robinson and myself have pleaded for cooperation in picking up and using the bins which are strategically placed around the village So on behalf of those of us with dogs, those without and our dogs themselves – please help us to keep our environment clean. If you know of or see an irresponsible owner please inform our Parish Clerk – be assured confidentiality will be respected.



Moving on to the positives:

The shrub and plant areas as well as the general area around the Village Hall, Youth Club, and Play Park have all been well maintained by our Village Ranger. He also maintains the tidiness around the village and the outlying areas – Purn Quarry, Accommodation and Roman Roads as well as Hillcote.

The village tubs have once again provided us with splashes of colour throughout the seasons alongside the lovely displays that have been planted or have just appeared on the verges and in the hedgerows. We are also lucky to have so many well-tended gardens with their seasonal changes around the village.

The general remedial work of trimming, tidying and cutting back the undergrowth around the churchyard has been ongoing through the year. The Church Yard / Mulberry Lane wall has undergone major repair and the area running along the wall within the churchyard has been cleared of tree stumps and been given a general tidy up.

We are aware of the need for remedial work to be carried out on the boundary wall of the Play Area and our Finance and Personnel Committee have agreed to make funding available. We are presently seeking quotations to carry out the repair work. We are also presently pursuing the contractors who recently white-lined the Coronation Hall car park - you will have noticed that the job is of very poor quality – in many areas the new paint has not bonded with the old.

We rely on many people to help in keeping our village looking good and in good repair, our grateful thanks to:

The volunteers who help at 'plant up' times and to the residents who kindly take it upon themselves to plant up and tend their own containers.

Our Village Ranger – Tony Derrick who resigned earlier in the year and to Ian Findlay who has since taken on the task since June 2014.

To Mark Howe and his team who continue to maintain the various grassed areas and verges around the village and churchyard as well as undertaking various other jobs that need attention.

To those who when coming across litter pick it up.

And finally to those who take the time to report / share their concern/s, suggestions and compliments with us.

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






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
