

Dear Parishioner.

I am delighted we have managed to produce another newsletter. Mrs. Corder very kindly came to our rescue. My thanks to Mr. John Hickley for the front page. This explicit drawing is a vivid reminder of the January storms.

I am sorry to report the loss of two valuable members of the Parish Council - Mr. Doolan and Mr. Goodman. Our best wishes and thanks are extended to both of them.

March is of course, the month of our Annual Parish Meeting, when the electorate have their voices heard and can challenge the Parish Council on its activities.

The precept was fixed in January as laid down by Woodspring District Council, and we are endeavouring in this issue to explain the responsibilities which face the Parish Council and how the costs are spread across them. The actual figure is £ 8.22 - not £15 as has been quoted.

In order for the Parish Council to run efficiently, it is necessary to employ a Clerk and the salary for 1990/91 is £850. This is a fixed rate per capita as laid down by the Aven Local Councils Association. Administration costs fluctuate - telephone, postage, stationery and travelling - add another £500. The Chairman receives anomula allowance of £60, but other Councillors who are entitled to claim expenses, are generally out of pocket.

The cost of helping maintain your village hall is £1,200 with another £400 for insurance. Our village handyman's wages for looking after the Churchyard and play area so well will increase to £1,000. a small price to pay, but repairing the north wall in the Churchyard is a much bigger item. This is likely to cost £3 - 4,000 sproad over the next two years.

The recreation area will add further expense in fencing and general maintenance. To give you some idea of outlays, the present fencing cost £1,750!

The cost of by-elections have to be met by the Parish. These cost approximately £500 a time, and it may be that we are called upon to hold two next month to fill our Council vacancies.

The work of a Parish Councillor is not easy. It would be foolish to pretend otherwise. Those who wish to serve the community should be prepared to do more than attend the monthly meetings since the majority of the work takes place behind the scenes.

I hope this report has been enlightening, but should you have any queries, please do not hesitate to place them before the Council.

OPEN SPACES COMMITTEE

This committee is responsible for maintaining wide areas of our village, and I am sure you would all like to know where the hidden costs lie in keeping Bleadon looking neat and tidy.

Mr. Brown, our faithful handyman, earns less than £2 per hour keeping the grass cut in the children's playground, the pump area and the challenging work in the Churchyard. He also keeps the car park free from litter and copes with numerous annual jobs. The Parish Council has to purchase and maintain the equipment used i.e. lawn mower, strimmer petrol etc.

If you are wondering why the Churchyard is the Parish Council's responsibility, it is because it ceased to be a burial ground many years ago except for cremations and instances where provisions had already been made. This means that the crumbling boundary walls and gravestones require a great deal of funding. We can only afford to undertake the minimum repairs annually to prevent total collapse.

Equipment in the children's playground has to meet an inspector's standards. The Parish Council is obligated to carry out any work necessary to meet those standards.

There are five seats and two bus shelters which need preserving regularly, and to date, we have managed to provide (principally because the Parish Councillors undertook the work themselves), a floral display in twenty three tubs, twenty one hanging baskets, the Jubilee Garden and other small areas dotted round the village.

The Parish Council is obliged to provide allotments. We have 18, half of which lie idle. The income does not begin to meet the rent paid to the landlords, the Church Commissioners. Surrounding hedges require regular cutting. Annually, the allotments are rotavated. Due to the recent gales, extra expenditure was incurred in a clearing up operation.

Currently, Councillor Strode is looking into the possibilities of establishing a 4 acre playing field which has been offered to the Parish Council on a 20 year lease at an annual rate of £1,000. At present, provisional funds stand at £800.

It was decided this year to deploy Britain in Bloom funds to the installation of some lighting within the village with the intention of adding further lights at a later stage.

Parish Councillors act as custodians for the old quarry opposite the Anchor Inn, the village pond in Facum Lane, and Wonderstone Quarry given to the Parishioners in 1843. In the case of the latter, a boundary dispute has arisen, and the Parish Council is pursuing the matter through legal channels.

Leases, agreements etc. are drawn up by a solicitor.

Incidents of vandalism are, fortunately rare in Bleadon, but damage still has to be rectified and paid for.

We are of course, indebted to Councillor Mrs. Sheppard and Councillor Wall for the use of their machinery on numerous occasions, and to the latter for providing spotlights which illuminate the Church tower at Christmas time. For this, Mr. Masters very kindly allows us access to his electricity supply.

Alas, the Parish Council's expenditure does not end with open spaces.

Church Clock

This was given by the people of Bleadon to commemorate Queen Victoria's jubilee in 1897.

For years, the Parish Council undertook responsibility for the winding and maintenance, but for insurance purposes, it was handed to the Parochial Church Council. The Parish Council however, is still duty bound to finance its maintenance.

Atmospheric pressure changes the valuable wooden mechanism, thus many steps are taken weekly for our benefit. If it were not for the punctilious services of Mr. Arthur Cullen, time would stand still.

We must add a note of thanks to Mr. Cullen who, for a miniscule fee, tends the Village Cross area, and uses the fee to provide those beautiful floral displays. He also provides the lighting for the Christmas tree.

For instance - local protests about night flights have resulted in a reduction of these at Bristol Airport, the Department of the Environment has been lobbied to take more notice of local opinion on planning matters and the battle to retain village Sub-Post offices is an ongoing campaign of the A.L.C.A.

A.L.C.A. has also been in the forefront of the argument with Woodspring about reduced fares for pensioners and disabled people. Outside bodies, such as the Police and British Telecom have their monitoring committees - in short, A.L.C.A. keeps its beady eye on everything that concerns YOU, so if anyone has anything they would like to refer to the Parish Council, don't keep quiet about it. Let a Council member know. Our affiliation fee to this useful organisation only costs £70p.a.

PUBLIC FOOTPATHS


There is no news as yet on the proposed diversion at Southill Farm 6/12.

SUNDAY SOUNDS



Teacher and schoolgirl; civil servant and small businessman; engineer and language student; old and young; male and female; Catholic and Protestant. What can all these people have in common? Well-they know their 'tail-ends' from their 'sallies'. They are bell-ringers.

Bells ringing out to call the faithful to worship is a sound that epitomizes Sunday for many people. But have you ever wondered what, or rather who is at the other end of the rope?

Bellringing is a peculiarly British activity developed over the past three to four hundred years. It can take anything from 2 to 6 months to learn to handle a bell rope competently and a lifetime to master the intracies of the mathematical patterns which make up the sound of a peal of bells. A ringer will normally attend a weekly evening practice and ring for Sunday services, special feasts and weddings. It requires a degree of commitment to the tower, but this is insignificant compared with the enjoyment and friendship to be found.

BLEADON YOUTH CLUB PLAYGROUP

Bleadon playgroup is still running with approximately 18 children 3 mornings each week. It is run by Mrs. Cynthia Richardson with a team of 5 part-time helpers. Mrs. Richardson also helps to run the playgroups in Lympsham and East Brent. A busy lady!

At Christmas time, the children visited Father Christmas at Cadbury's Garden Centre. In January, a Road Safety Officer visited the children and showed them an R.S. video and gave a talk.

Over the next month or two, we plan a visit by a dental hygienist who will show the children how to look after their teeth; a return visit by the Fire Brigade with their fire engine which was VERY successful last year - all the flowerbeds were well watered!; a sponsored brick-stack to raise much needed funds, and a visit to a local farm to see the spring lambs.

The aim of the playgroups run through the Pre-School Playgroups Association, is to provide a happy atmosphere where, through play, pre-school children from the age of 3, can learn to care, share and co-operate; to provide an environment that encourages language development, imagination and concentration. When the children leave playgroup, they are well prepared for starting school.
