

CORONATION HALL

We pay tribute in this report to our colleague Mr Bob Woollan, whose recent passing away will leave a big gap in our enthusiastic committee. We hope that his wife Doreen, (another hard-working committee member) will soon feel able to rejoin us.

Since the last report the committee has been faced with two major expenditures. The hot water heating unit burned out and needed replacing at a cost of £650, followed quickly by an adverse report on the condition of the space heaters within the main hall. As public safety was involved, the committee has implemented the replacement of the two oldest heaters and repair of the third at a cost of £1000. Our reserve fund is now somewhat depleted!

The proposed Hall Extension/Guides and Scout Unit project suffered a blow following Woodspring being unable to provide any grant aid whatsoever. The Avon Community Council have been urgently pursued, and we are hopeful of a more favourable consideration. We wait with fingers crossed. (Maybe someone in the village will even win the lottery - your anonymity will be protected, and you could be chairman for ever!!)



meeting because of illnesses, but Mrs Pat Brent came to the rescue with entertaining anecdotes from her various holidays.



SPEED LIMITS

People often say that you can't halt progress and that you can't slow the world down. I am not so sure.

One area of life where there is fresh thinking on the notions of speed and progress is in the field of traffic management. Calming traffic and slowing down road vehicles is now very much




a part of the agenda of what communities are doing to improve road safety. There is today a much clearer acceptance of the dangers of fast moving traffic in built-up and residential areas and a recognition that there is a correlation between the speed of vehicles and the incidence of fatal or serious road accidents.

Throughout the district of Woodspring traffic calming measures and speed restrictions are being considered and it is time to pursue these issues once again in Bleadon and get something in place. Two separate aspects need to be looked at. First, there is the actual village itself, and second there is the problem of the main A370 which runs through the parish.

The village should have a 30mph speed limit like any other residential area. It has always been a nonsense that coming over Bleadon Hill and into Celtic Way you leave the 30mph limit just as you approach the village. Clearly, there is no reason why the residential parts of Bleadon should not be made more safe by having a speed restriction and there is probably now a good case for considering 25mph, or even 20mph, as appropriate limits on some of our roads.

The A370 needs restricting for rather different reasons. There are too many well used access points and exits on the stretch of road between The Anchor and Sanders. The road junctions at The Anchor are notoriously dangerous and the Bridge Road junction can be particularly alarming while you are waiting in the right-hand lane to turn if traffic is racing up behind you and in front of you. There are also three garages, two public houses, a restaurant and a supermarket along this stretch of road and the development at Bleadon Mill has added further traffic movements.

The time has come in this village to address the issue of road safety and traffic management and insist on speed limits. We must also, of course, as responsible



citizens, drive carefully ourselves in Bleadon and everywhere else. We must respect the speed restrictions of other towns and villages, leave ourselves more time for Journeys and be patient. All this is easier said than done but, as the slogan says, we should kill our speed, not kill people.

They can clean a wound, deal with a nose bleed and put an arm into a sling. Three Brownies, Nikki, Katie and Michelle, are in the Gang Show at the Playhouse in April. They have given up a lot of their time to practise for this and are involved in singing excerpts from Oliver and the Lion King, and many traditional favourites.

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

There have recently been renewed efforts, at both national and local levels, to reinforce the effectiveness of the Neighbourhood Watch schemes. This has led to the creation of a Woodspring Neighbourhood Watch Association. This and several similar organisations in Avon & Somerset have been welcomed by the police authorities.

The Woodspring Association has received initial funding, for the current year only, from the Woodspring District Council. This sum was £12,500 but this leaves a shortfall of at least £2,500 this year. Appeals for financial support have been made to all town and parish councils. Your own parish council has agreed to donate £50. This sum is well in line with our parish's current scheme membership.

The Woodspring Association will have a full time clerk based in Weston police station. Their equipment already includes an 'elderly' computer but they hope this will shortly be replaced by a more up-to-date model. They will be seeking to encourage and promote more schemes throughout Woodspring, to strengthen links with the police and improve the flow of information to and from scheme members.

Many people still seem to be unaware that membership of an approved neighbourhood watch scheme can bring savings on premiums for home contents insurance. Depending on the individual insurance company, these discounts can typically be from 5 to 10%.

I have statistics showing that there are still a significant number of homes in Bleadon that are not involved with a neighbourhood watch scheme. If you are

not a member of a scheme and wish to join one, or set up a new one in conjunction with near neighbours, you should make contact with the above association at Weston Police Station. The office telephone number is (01934) 638133 and this is a direct line.

Finally, a new community policeman is now responsible for our village. He is P.C. Dave Griffiths and is based at Banwell Police Station.

OUR PREHISTORIC PAST

The historic significance of Bleadon's road names may not have dawned on all our residents, particularly the more recently arrived. Perhaps the most evocative is Celtic Way, obviously referring to Bleadon's earliest known inhabitants and the site of the ancient woad mine, the entrance to which (now firmly sealed, of course) lies about a hundred yards above The Dell.

The woad supplied from these workings was of the highest quality and great variety. The lower grade, sold to Celts outside the district, was known as Commercial Woad, while the locals



reserved the best for themselves. Two favourite colours were a bright blood-red (Arterial Woad) and a rich cream (Yellow Brick Woad). For crowning the local chieftains they used a deep purple (Coronation Woad), while for religious ceremonies they preferred a medium grey (Abbey Woad). Strangers discovered wearing the local colours were ordered, on pain of death to remove them instantly, "Get out of the Bleadon Woad!".

As the workings developed, the mine owners had to draw plans of the many tunnels - the first Woad Maps -and the many underground intersections became the first Woad Junctions. In time the growth of the industry necessitated the passing of the Woad Traffic Act, establishing a code of Woad Safety for all Woad Users. The vast amount of woad sold elsewhere was transported by the Woad Haulage Association, often causing considerable congestion. Many a Celtic commuter attributed his lateness to the "Bleadon Woad Works!"

In due course most of the seams were exhausted, until the only colour left was white. There were calls for closure of the mine, but the determined locals organised a management buy-out, rallying support with their rousing anthem

(later purloined by Northern Celts), "We'll keep white on till the end of the woad!"

This was, however, merely the postponement of the mine's inevitable fate a winding-up order.



VE DAY 50TH ANNIVERSARY

Most readers already know that this year the May Day Bank Holiday has been moved from 1 May to 8 May to coincide with the 50th anniversary of VE Day (the day the war in Europe ended).

In Bleadon the occasion will be marked firstly by a Service of Commemoration at our Parish Church beginning at 10.00a.m. For the afternoon the scene of the action moves to Lympsham, where the British Legion are organising a Sports Afternoon for children aged 11 and below to which the children of Bleadon (and, of course, their



families) are cordially invited. This starts at 2.45 and is followed at 4.15 by TEA.

At 5.00 the gauntlet will be thrown down by the Lympsham tug-of-war team to their Bleadon counterparts. In anticipation of this challenge that vastly experienced tug-of-war coach Councillor George Wall has agreed to organise the Bleadon team, so all aspiring tuggers should apply to him.

In the evening we celebrate in Bleadon with an Anniversary Dance at the Coronation Hall (8-12). The aim is to appeal to a wide age-range, so there will be live music provided by a talented local duo Only After Dark (I know it is a weird name but they are very versatile and really can play), plus recordings of wartime originals such as Glenn Miller - courtesy of Matthew White. There will of course be a licensed bar, with light refreshments available. Tickets (£3.00) will be available from the Post Office.
