

BLEADON VILLAGE NEWS No: 29 April '96 FROM OUR DISTRICT COUNCILLOR

North Somerset took over from Avon County Council and Woodspring District Council on 1st April. Although the new council is still called a District Council, it is a very different beast to Woodspring. Woodspring had a budget of £15 million, compared with the £120 million budget of North Somerset. Woodspring employed about 500 whereas North Somerset employs about 7,000. This huge increase in resources and costs is mostly explained in just four words: Education and Social Services. These two services will account for about two thirds of North Somerset's expenditure, £60 million on Education and £17 million on Social Services. Both of these services were provided by Avon, thus emphasising that North Somerset is more than 'Woodspring with knobs on.'

The major advantage North Somerset will have over the previous authorities is that it is responsible for all locally provided services. I remember in the winter of 1986 Shiplate Road was closed, due to heavy drifting snow, which resulted in Wonderstone being cut off for three days. Whilst my wife and I enjoyed the peace and quiet (at least at first) I remember a neighbour being 'bounced' between Avon and Woodspring in his attempts to get the road re-opened. That situation should not recur, since North Somerset Planning, Highways and Transportation directorate will be responsible for all 'Street Management'; if it ever recurred I expect I would be grateful to be 'cut off' at Wonderstone, safe from the wrath of the rest of Bleadon!

Finally, one large BUT, a hole in the road in Bleadon (or in the A370) will be the responsibility of North Somerset, BUT if the hole is in the M5 then it is the responsibility of the Motorways Agency. Similarly the provision of health and benefits is not in the remit of the new authority. North Somerset will not be responsible for all services provided to Bleadon residents, but it will be a good place to start asking who is responsible.



STREET LIGHTING

The Parish Council proposes to extend street lighting in the Village, and the next phase will be the installation of a Victorian type lantern on a matching standard, at the narrow end of Shiplate Road where it meets the junction with Celtic Way and Coronation Road, this particular area being extremely hazardous to pedestrians and motorists alike.

Another lantern will be fitted to an existing electricity pole, at the start of Celtic Way, by the Queens Arms.

The Parish Council is committed to the gradual extension of lighting in the main areas of the village, and, if we can eventually get North Somerset Authority to press for a speed limit and a weight restriction on heavy goods vehicles, Bleadon roads will be much safer for everyone.

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BLEADON CORONATION HALL

By the time you receive this edition of Village News we shall be at the end of our management and financial year. Our new management year will start with our Annual General Meeting. This will be held on Thursday 11th April 1996 at 7.30 pm. This meeting is open to all residents of Bleadon. it is your opportunity to raise any issues concerning the operation of your village hall. We should like to see some of you, so please feel free to attend.

Many residents, particularly those new to the village, may be unaware of the status of the Coronation Hall. The hall became the property of the village and a trust in 1937. It also has a registered charity status. The trustee body is your Parish Council. The dayto-day management of the hall is the responsibility of an independent Management Committee, the structure of which is specified in the trust deed. This committee has to be elected at the AGM. It comprises representatives nominated by the Parish Council and by each of the village organisations who are regular users of the hall. It also has independent village representatives. The elected committee also has the power to co-opt additional members. So it is your hall and, if you so wish, your opportunity to participate in its management.

SUMMER WALKS FROM BLEADON

The countryside surrounding Bleadon Village is most beautiful and for the rambler it offers a variety of contrasting scenery.

To the west the Bleadon Levels lead to the River Axe and views over Brean Down, a western outlier of the Mendip Hills. Its exceptional natural history make it a site of special scientific interest.

North and East of the village sit Hellenge and Bleadon hillsides, traversed by the area's premier long distance footpath "The West Mendip Way". From the hillside splendid views unfold. In the foreground stands Brent Knoll topped by its Iron-age Hillfort, while on the horizon Glastonbury Tor, the Polden Hills and the Exmoor coastline are all visible given a clear day.

South of the village we cross the River Axe onto the land of the fascinating Somerset Levels, the rhynes and rivers that drain the Levels providing a unique environment for plants and wildlife.

Looking back, North and East of the village the grandeur of the Limestone mass which is the Mendip Hills can be fully appreciated, stretching for some 30 miles across the northern boundary of Somerset.

This summer the Ramblers Association Woodspring Group are organising a series of three Friday evening walks to explore the footpaths and lanes through the areas described. Each walk will start from the village Car Park at 6.30 pm, last approximately two to two and a half hours and finish at the "Queens Arms" public house. The dates of the walks are 7th JUNE, 5th JULY and 2nd AUGUST.
