

BROADOAK SCHOOL - Our District Councillor's View

Bleadon residents will no doubt be aware that North Somerset Council are going out to consultation on the site to be used for the new building for Broadoak School. I don't think anybody can disagree with the need for a new building for the school: the only question is where should it be built.

To rebuild on the present site would be a nightmare for the students, who would have to endure spending eighteen months on a building site. It is likely that building next to the sixth form centre would be delayed by the planning process, I also believe it is better kept as a green field site. The most viable site would appear to be on the football pitches next to Hutton Moor Leisure Centre.

This would result in a community school, i.e. a school with facilities available to the public: this already occurs at Churchill and Backwell, with great success. The loss of sports facilities will eventually be by releasing the playing fields at the current site of Broadoak and the use of public open space in Locking Castle: there will be no overall loss of sports facilities for the general public.

The main problem I can foresee, for Bleadon students, is the increase in their commute distance, but I believe most, if not all students would qualify for free school transport, which I believe will result in an improvement in road safety and pollution control. At the moment I am in favour of situating the new Broadoak School building at Hutton Moor. However, if you can see problems with this arrangement, please let me know soon before the plans are finalized.

The biggest problem we face is obtaining the funds, from central government!

BROADOAK SCHOOL - 2 - The Editor's View

Most people seem to accept that a primary school is a great asset - even vital -- to a village. Hence the closure of Bleadon's school over thirty years ago is still much lamented. Surely the same arguments apply to a secondary school serving a wider area -- yet planners in North Somerset appear to be ignoring these in favour of a grandiose scheme that may benefit numerous people elsewhere to the detriment of the residents of the southern side of the town.

They suggest a "community school" at Hutton Moor to replace Broadoak School. How can you possibly have a "community school" a mile outside its catchment area? Such a school needs to be sited centrally, making access as easy as possible for as many people as possible. It can then provide educational, recreational and sporting facilities for pupils and public, daytime and evening, seven days a week. I suspect that somebody on North Somerset Council has various (undisclosed) reasons for wanting a school built at Hutton Moor and is therefore trying to find reasons why the Broadoak site must be ruled out.

One such reason advanced is that the rebuilding at Broadoak would cause impossible disruption, which my own experience tells me is plainly wrong. I worked at a school where major extensions took place, huts were demolished and replaced and so on. Of course there was disruption, but we all - staff and pupils - just got on with our job and put up with the nuisance because we understood the necessity for it, and I do not recall any nosedive in examination results. Certainly a couple of years' disruption is vastly preferable to forty years' costly, inconvenient and dangerous travel to Hutton Moor, particularly if the work results in a first-rate facility for the south side of the town.

I have read the Planning Department's report on the various sites, and it makes clear that any technical problems with the Broadoak site can be overcome. The Council obviously do not wish to overcome them, so it is up to the local people to make them change their minds - starting with their own District Councillor.

BLEADON CORONATION HALL

The Management Committee's prime concern is to ensure that there is enough money to finish the work and to this end we shall welcome contributions from any source.




We have had three new cubs since Easter. Welcome to Alexander Carter, Matthew Sexton and Jack Barker.
