


DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORT

TRAFFIC CALMING

The present situation is that Bleadon is missing out on funding for traffic calming. Funding for transport improvements is currently directed to the Bristol to Weston corridor. Obviously we miss out here. The other source is Junction Improvements For Vulnerable Road Users (JIFVRU). Under this scheme the junction of Bridge Road and Bridgwater Road (A370) could be improved. An outline scheme exists, but in order to get funding the scheme must qualify via a calculated 'rate of return'. In the last year a new scheme for Waterloo Street in Weston has overtaken the Bleadon scheme. We are in a 'catch 22' situation. We do not qualify due to our position and then again because the A370 junction is not dangerous! Apart from waiting for more serious accidents at the A370 junction, I believe that Central Government lobbying is required in order to change the priorities imposed on North Somerset by the Government Office of the South West (GOSW). Hence my next item.

M.P. SURGERY

Brian Cotter has agreed to hold a surgery in Bleadon on 16th May between 10.00 and 12.00 at the Coronation Hall. It will be just over one year since Brian became M.P. for Weston-super-Mare. You will be able to tell him your concerns and comment on his performance as our M.P. I shall be pressing him to lobby GOSW over the traffic calming for the A370. If you agree with me, please do the same.

PLANNING ISSUES

Wessex Water Sewage Sludge Drier

The original planning consent given to Wessex Water envisaged the storage of sludge, which would then be tankered to farms for recycling to fields as fertiliser. This would have involved 9552 tanker and HGV movements to the site each year. The new scheme involves building an additional plant that will dry the sludge to a granule form, similar to garden fertiliser. The new building will be higher than the currently approved building by 5.9 metres, making it visually prominent. However there will be some compensating gains from the Sludge Drier:

- · Reduction in vehicle movements to 2288:
- Air will be treated to a standard that does not create a nuisance at the site boundary:
- The noise levels generated will not give rise to nuisance at the boundary to recreational visitors.
 There will be no impact at residential properties.

The above points are taken from Wessex Water's Environment Supporting Statement, which forms part of the planning permission (by way of a Section 106 Agreement). Since some of the statements made by Wessex Water are a bit 'woolly', additional conditions have been placed on the noise levels permitted and air quality.

I believe Bleadon residents will not know the Sewage Plant is there, apart from the visual impact of the entire site, including the dryer which will be the tallest building. Although I have a shareholding in Wessex Water, I do believe the improved quality of bathing water this plant will bring is of benefit to all North Somerset residents.

Golf Course, Roman Road

At long last this application has been determined. I remain opposed to a building of this size being built on a greenfield site on the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). The original permission dates from 1990. The permission eventually granted in January this year moves the club house from the Weston side of Bleadon Hill to our side of the hill. The club house is smaller than originally proposed which suggests conversion to residential use should the Golf Course fail. The planning permission contains a note that reads as follows:

'This site lies within the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and outside the defined development limits of any settlement. Proposals for residential development in this location would be contrary to Local Authority policy.'

I hope the commitment to Planning Policy on this site is never tested.

The club house will stand behind the copse, which has been subject to considerable thinning first by forestry activity and later by the January storms. The copse is the subject of a group Tree Protection Order (TPO), which now requires the planting of twenty-six trees, consisting oaks, ash and birch trees, to replace the trees previously lost. Some additional tree surgery will be carried out where trees overhang the power cables along Roman Road.

Dumping on Roman Road

A resident of Roman Road has complained to me about residents dumping their garden rubbish on the grass verge. The verge immediately adjacent to the highway is the property of North Somerset and I can assure everybody that it takes a dim view of anybody tipping on its property.

PERIODIC ELECTORAL REVIEW

The Local Government Commission for England have delivered their final recommendations. The Commission proposes to merge Hutton Ward which consists of the parishes of Hutton and Bleadon, with Locking Ward in a two member Ward. I would still prefer the current arrangement of two single member wards. However, I believe this is an improvement on the draft proposal of merger with Winscombe Ward in a three member ward.

PLANNING

Since my last report the Parish Council has received two new applications, three amendments and one appeal:

- 98/0143. Demolish existing bungalow and resite a new four-bedroom dwelling at Roman Road together with a stable block and hay shed.
 The Committee felt that the proposal was an overdevelopment in an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB) and that no access facilities to the stables at the southern end of the property were shown.
 Recommendation: Refusal.
- 98/0480. Erection of an agricultural implement shed at Hillfield Farm, Shiplate Road.
 Although a major tree-planting scheme was to be implemented, the size of the building would be intrusive on the landscape; again an AONB. The house has already been extended by some 30% and it is not a working farm and therefore there was not a need for agricultural activities. Recommendation: Refusal.
- 3. Two amendments received relate to Wessex Water the Sewage Drying Plant and Storage Barn together with landscaping for wildlife and leisure activities. Although the drying plant is intrusive on the open countryside, the Council could not refuse this application on the grounds of environmental necessity. However, it was felt that once the landscaping had become established over several years, the site would blend in with the surrounding area, thus enabling the general public to walk and relax at leisure within a new landscape.
- 4. The other amendment was at Whitegate Farm where a retrospective application was submitted to reposition the house on Plot 5, and to move the north/south boundary line westwards. <u>Recommendation</u>: Refusal, since the Council does not condone retrospective applications and moving the boundary line would be invasive to its neighbours and involve the realignment of the public footpath.
- 5. The long saga of the Golf Course on Roman Road has finally been approved by North Somerset and is subject to a detailed Section 106 Agreement. This involves the felling of the marked trees and replanting with 20 new ones, species being Ash, Beech and Oak, during the next planting season.

 6. 97/1954 OSPIot 570-0 Replacement of haybarn and stables at Shiplate Road, North Somerset Recommended Approval subject to landscaping and hedge planting around the site.



BLEADON CORONATION HALL

THE NEW HALL

Since I last reported, overhead electric radiant heating has been installed in the new hall extension. It has so far found approval by the various scouting groups using the hall. Two large pine storage cupboards have been specially made and installed for storage of each of the scouting groups equipment. This is supplemented by the completion of a large roof storage area, to be used for the scouts bulkier equipment.

The fitting out of the small kitchen is almost complete and we were able to stock it with a substantial amount of redundant but otherwise good usable crockery, courtesy of Pontins at Brean.

At the time of writing we are about to instal picture rail on three of the main walls. This will initially be used for the art exhibition during the May Day Fayre. The rails will provide safer and more secure display than that offered by the display panels used in former years. This day will also, therefore, offer all local residents an opportunity to see the new hall and the art exhibition.

THE MAIN CORONATION HALL

We have made substantial progress with the construction of the new entrance foyer and toilets. The plumbing is now completed in the new Ladies' toilet area and decorative tiling almost finished. It is our intention to bring this into the earliest possible use. In the meantime, the hall management committee regret the inconvenience caused by a necessary reduction in the facilities currently available for ladies in the old toilet area. We shall shortly be cutting a new way through the rear wall of this room to the new area. Please bear with us during this change.

We shall, within the next few weeks, also be cutting through the wall from the main hall to the new entrance foyer. We shall do our best to minimise the effect on all hall users but again please be prepared to accept some inconvenience.

YOU CAN DO YOUR BIT (IF YOU WANT)

The declining number of village post offices was recently featured at length in the Western Daily Press. Reassuringly, the examples given of the villages which had lost their post office/shop all referred to places with much smaller populations than that of Bleadon but it seems an appropriate time to spell out, for those who care, just what makes sub-post offices viable (or not).

Subpostmasters are self-employed and their remuneration is geared strictly to turnover. It follows that the more business residents transact at their local post office, the more likely it will be there for their convenience, and I have found that not everyone realises the range of services on offer:

- The sale of stamps is obvious, but in particular bulk sales to local businesses boost turnover, and I
 am very grateful to all those who help in this way.
- Girobank provides all the services of any other bank. I am always amazed at customers dashing off to town to the bank or a cashpoint when they could be drawing cash right where they stand. (Co-op Bank customers can also use Post Office facilities).

- For those who prefer fewer formalities, National Savings Bank accounts are a very simple way of saving and having easily accessible cash.
- 4. Telephone and gas bills are payable at post offices with no charge (not even a stamp!)
- 5. Television licenses can also be purchased at post offices.
- Saving stamps for television licences, BT bills, British Gas bills and car tax can all be bought at post offices.
- 7. A range of investments, e.g. National Savings Certificates, Premium Bonds, Children's Bonus Bonds, can be made.
- 8. Pensions and allowances drawn at the post office can provide an instantly available source of cash.
- 9. Foreign currency and travel insurance can both be purchased.
- 10. Fishing rod licences are only available from post offices.
- 11. Tax bills are payable without charge.

Believe me, every little helps, and you might find that you meet or make friends in the process! (But of course, not everyone wants to do so.)
