

Regarding our proposed application to the National Charities Lotteries Board for a substantial grant towards a new pitched and tiled roof to replace the existing ageing corrugated structure, we are awaiting reports from our building surveyors and structural engineers, and eventually, quotes from contractors and the necessary planning consents.

All these steps have to be completed before we can submit the actual application, and we will shortly be circulating all village residents with a brief questionnaire requesting views on the services provided, participation (if any) in the various activities, and hopefully, your full support for our endeavours to improve facilities and the general structure of <u>YOUR</u> Village Hall.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT


The Parish Council will soon be considering quotations for the resurfacing of the car park between the youth club and the new hall and this project will, we hope, be completed before the end of the year. A pavement has replaced the grass verge at the Coronation Road/Shiplate Road corner and the junction of Celtic Way with Shiplate Road will shortly be resurfaced. This will mean some disruption for a day. Kerbing has already been put in place at the Hutton Garage end of Bleadon Road and this has improved the approach to the Village from the Bridgwater Road

direction. I shall be suggesting to the Parish Council at the next meeting that planting of daffodil bulbs around parts of the Village would improve the visual aspect next spring. If it is agreed, maybe we can organise a Charlie's Army of bulb planters in early October.



On 30 August I attended the meeting of the North Somerset Planning Committee

when the redevelopment of problem seems to lie in the junction with Accommodation although the Parish Council proviso that the junction upgrading of sewerage and press North to measures at this particular



speed limit of 50 miles per hour would still appear to be too fast. We hope that we can urge North Somerset to give priority to this matter, although we note that the Council budget may not extend to this.

The closure of the A370 to facilitate the rebuilding of the railway bridge is scheduled for 15 February - 6 April 2001; consultative meetings between highway authorities, police and Parish Council will commence in November and residents will be kept fully informed of the traffic arrangements.

Anyone out there who would like to attend meetings of the Parish Council are most welcome and your input is of great importance to all of us who represent you.


SCOUTS: CAMPING IN CHRISTCHURCH

The day was saved by a suggestion that we all simply spend the day together at the beach, and at the time, in mid June, we were sure that a scorching summer lay ahead of us. The suggestion

With hindsight our big mistake was not defining 'bad weather' and our big misfortune was that on the day the weather was neither good nor bad. It was windy, but not raining, although it looked like it might and maybe it was too cold for the beach? In the end about thirteen of us turned

up at Kidscove and about ten went to the beach. The former group, at least, had a wonderful morning. The main benefit was that the children knew many adults on the frames and were therefore confident to run about freely and explore. For the adults, it meant we could take turns to sit and rest; soft play can be hard work!

We have started up after our Summer break and at our first session it was good to see each other again and to welcome a few new faces. If you haven't come along yet make sure you do. You and your children will be made welcome!

MORE BLEADON REMEMBERED

Stan Nipper was born in Bleadon in 1923, and, apart from when he served in the Royal Navy, has lived here all his life. These are the reminiscences of a true 'villager', in his own words.

I was born in Hillside House, opposite the Queen's in 1923, and went to the local school in Shiplate Road until I was 14 years old. If I misbehaved or did not pay attention I was sent outside, whereupon I just went home! The same rules applied to Chapel, situated just up the road from the school.

On Saturdays the local lads and I would take our wooden trucks to the top of Celtic Way and, sitting on them, would come down at a great rate. No fear of the traffic then that now gives us, the elderly residents, such concern.

We were also able, without parental consent or knowledge, to buy five Woodbine cigarettes for twopence and a box of matches for a penny, and taking a few large potatoes we would go up onto Hellenge Hill, light a fire, bake the spuds, smoke the Woodbines and then be sick! Not much sympathy there!

We enjoyed our childhood days. There was no really bad behaviour, just mischief, like knocking on doors and running off! It was a shame when the old Rectory was knocked down, as that door was a particular favourite! Certainly there were no drugs to worry about, only the cigs!

In the Old Village Hall there were whist drives and dances on Saturday nights, all for 2s/6d. The elderly played cards whilst some of the tables were pushed back for the young to dance; the Palais Glide, St Bernard Waltz, Military Two Step and, of course, the usual quick-step, waltz and foxtrot. Real dancing - none of your disco, standing on the spot, head-banging, wiggling hips and whatever else!

In August there were the Harvest home celebrations, held in the corner ground opposite the old 'Victoria Inn' (kept by the two Miss Paynes). In those days cider was 2p and beer 1p a pint! My late father told us of one man (who shall remain nameless as his family are still around), who walked straight from the 'Vic' into the rain-filled ditch opposite, he was so drunk! Luckily, mates were there to pull him out.

I remember also the 'big bus' that went from Weston to Glastonbury several times a day in the 50's and 60's. It came through Bleadon round the corner by the Queen's into Shiplate road without damaging the walls. How times have changed.

There are many more houses now, and lots of people but I have found that the attitudes of the village folk have changed little over the years. They are still welcoming and helpful, and Bleadon is <u>still</u> a good place in which to live. I should know, having lived here almost all my life.

Why should it when their usual needs are met by the likes of Tesco, Asda etc?
