


BLEADON CORONATION HALL Management Committee

At the time of writing, we are preparing for our annual Christmas Fayre, always a popular event. But this year, on <u>Saturday 9 December</u>, there is the added attraction of the opening display of the Replica Head of 'Bleadon Man', as featured in the BBC2 programme "Meet the Ancestors". The cost of the Head was generously met by Marshall's Concrete Products, and is now on permanent display in the Coronation Hall.

I have mentioned, in previous issues, our intention of applying to the National Lottery Charities Board for a substantial grant in order to replace the existing roof and extend the area behind the stage. This will provide improved facilities for the Bleadon Players and other organisations who might wish to use our stage in the future. One of the many requirements for the grant application is to obtain the views of residents as regards Hall facilities at present, and how they can be improved upon.

In order to do this a copy of the questionnaire will be delivered, early January, to every household in the village. Names and addresses will not be recorded but your views are really important, even if you do not currently use the many facilities of the Hall. If your completed form is not collected you may hand it in at the Post Office.

Please spend a few minutes on this important matter - it will be greatly appreciated!

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Over the past two months we have experienced extremely wet weather and high volumes of water draining off the hills surrounding Bleadon. Two areas have been particularly effected, namely Shiplate Road and Purn Way, where the water table has remained high and the drainage systems have been unable to cope. The Parish Council has been in constant communication with North Somerset Highways Department asking them to treat both these areas as a priority. At the beginning of November there was some flooding in Coronation Road and to improve the water drainage we cleared the gullies and roadside of six barrow loads of leaves.

North Somerset empty gullies in the village twice a year and sweep the roads four times a year. They cannot clear gullies often enough, particularly in the Autumn and Winter seasons, to keep them clear of falling leaves and agricultural waste. At my request a number of residents have agreed to "Adopt A Gully". It takes very little effort to keep gullies clear of rubbish if done regularly and has immediate effect on the clearance of storm water. So if there is a gully near you please help us all to avoid floods in the future.

Bulbs have been planted around the village, in Bleadon Road, The Veale, Celtic Way and by the Village Pump. We look forward to a colourful and cheerful Spring.

The Village Hall Car Park has been tarmaced and to further increase the number of parking places we are having white lines painted in the area.

Finally, may I wish you all, on behalf of the Bleadon Parish Council, a very Happy Christmas and a Contented New Year!


CHRISTIAN UNITY

We have two Cubs "Trying Out" Scouts: Luke Wilson and Ben Smithers. We wish them both well.





BLEADON BRIDGE RECONSTRUCTION MEANS

A NOTE FROM THE CHAIRMAN ...

Following the article on the above in the Weston Mercury on Friday 24 November I wish to inform you of the correct facts regarding the closure of the A370 for six weeks commencing 15 February.

A meeting was held at the Town Hall upon Friday 10 November between representatives of North Somerset Council, Weston Town Council, Bleadon Parish Council, the Police, Ambulance and Fire Services, and Badgerline, regarding the closure of the A370 to facilitate the demolition and rebuilding of the railway bridge.



Closing the road is bound to cause serious disruption to normal traffic flows and we are keen to minimise the inpact on local roads. Signed diversions will therefore be put in place directing traffic away from the Bleadon area and onto more suitable routes including the A38 and M5. Pedestrians and cyclists will still be able to cross the railway via a temporary footbridge that will be installed for the duration of the roadworks.

To discourage non local traffic from using roads in the Bleadon and Bleadon Hill area manned barriers will be installed on the following roads:
Bleadon Hill · Bridgwater Road junction ·

Totterdown Lane · Bridge Road/Bridgwater Road junction

Unmanned barriers will be erected at Canada Coombe and on the A370 Bridgwater Road south of the railway bridge with LOCAL ACCESS ONLY signs erected at cross.

A temporary Traffic Regulation Order will be invoked that would make it an offence to use Bleadon as an alternative route should local roads become congested.

Everything will be done to help maintain a clear route for the Emergency Services and



to protect local residents from the effect of extra traffic on the narrow roads through our village and over Bleadon Hill. However, we will deliver a letter, together with a windscreen pass, to all homes in the area of Bleadon and Bleadon Hill to aid access past the manned barriers. If extra passes are required, for example two car families, please contact:-

TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF THE BUSY A370

A NOTE FROM THE COUNCILLORS ...

With this issue of Bleadon News you should receive a circular from North Somerset Council regarding the closure of the Uphill Bridge for Reconstruction.

Controversial it may be, but rest assured that there was no viable option other than months of single-lane traffic and delays. We have done our very best to reduce the impact on the village and its residents, and to ensure that the emergency services enjoy a priority access route.



However, the final result rests with you to ensure that the 'passes' provided are distributed wisely amongst family and regular visitors, so that the village and Bleadon Hill does not become clogged with unnecessary traffic. And please, have patience and a word of kindness for those manning the barriers. Someone has to do it!

The recent verge clearance work along the A370, part of the 'Gateway Improvements' being implemented on the major approach to towns in North Somerset, may seem drastic to some but will result in a better wildlife and plant habitat for the future. It should also lead to better maintenance, as random wild-sown bushes and common saplings have been removed as part of the process. Some of the latter may be replaced by a more formal tree planting scheme being proposed by your Parish Council.

Finally, as ever, we are always available to answer and help with your queries and problems where they relate to North Somerset Council and are always contactable through the numbers printed below. If you get the voice mail, then please leave your name and number and we will come back to you. Don't just put the phone down! We find this way of keeping contact far better than sitting in the village hall on the occasional Saturday morning waiting for someone to call in with a problem, and we hope you do as well.

To further help you, Ian is specialising in trouble-shooting Housing and Social Service issues and Elfan looks after Planning, Transport and Highway matters.

Christmas 1914

Christmas Day they all played football, in the mud of No-Mans-Land Tommy has some British Christmas Pudding, Fritz some German beer, So, after football, when they rested, they shared this festive cheer, And Fritz brought out a faded photo of his family in Berlin.

Four days passed and no one fought, no shot fired day or night, Poor old Fritz and Tommy Atkins, they'd both lost the will to fight, So they withdrew them from the trenches, removed them from the War, Put fresh troops in their places and prepared the guns once more.

The next day 1914, flares were burning, burning bright, When a message came, "Prepare offensive, over the top we go tonight," Men stood ready in the trenches, in the cold and in the dark And all along the Western Front, the Christmas guns began to bark.

COMMUNITY - WHO CARES?

Mrs Thatcher famously said there is no such thing as "society", pursuing policies designed to prove her statement. I suspect she felt the same way about community, particularly as, for the most part, communities can oppose a Government more effectively than individuals can. Nevertheless, many people seem to think that a) community spirit is a "good thing" b) there is less of it about nowadays c) it is more likely to be found in villages than in towns. I agree with all three points. As the first is purely a matter of personal belief I simply beg to differ from the curmudgeons, recluses and gung-ho "look after Number One" types. The others are, possibly, matter of fact, well worth close examination.

I contend that community spirit has declined more or less everywhere directly because of the decline in the number of things that people do locally in groups, including the most important thing, work. Many towns grew up round a particular factory. In mining areas the pit was often the sole raison d'être of a village. A century ago most of those who lived in Bleadon worked here, too. Men worked on farms or at the quarry. Instead of commuting in a car they walked to work, something you can do in groups. Women also worked on the farms. There were several shops, a blacksmith, a laundry and even an undertakers. All this meant that most adults in Bleadon worked or dealt with each other on a regular basis, especially at harvest time. Steam driven machinery was brought in for this and all the workers moved from farm to farm in order to finish the job as quickly as possible. It is no wonder that Harvest Home became such a major celebration in most villages!

Working together led naturally to socialising together, but not elaborately arranged affairs like today's office parties, everyone travelling to distant homes afterwards. Workmates lived next door or round the corner; socialising did not need to be organised. A chat over the wall or at the garden gate, in the pub or one of the shops - this informal socialising meant that people kept in touch. A formal, regular social occasion was, of course, the weekly Church service. In those days churchgoing was the rule, rather than the exception, for all classes and ages, reinforced by the closeness of the village school. Old photographs reveal what a big occasion the church fêtes used to be, held on the lawns of the Old Rectory.


