

## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

As we bid farewell to 2005, Bleadon continues with optimism and enthusiasm for the future. The New Year will bring changes, but I wish to assure you that the well being of the community will remain paramount.

The Bleadon Youth Club, with its new leaders and volunteers, has the full support of the Parish Council for the invaluable and worthwhile service which they are providing for our young. Their commitment, plans and forward thinking over the last year, and the changes they have made, are to be commended.

Roman Road fly-tipping has been a major problem, and although the Council is not apportioning blame, we must all value this part of the Mendip Hills. The AONB services look to enhance the 'view point' area at the end of Roman Road by working with the Wild Life Trust and the Council to rebuild a few metres of the dry stone walling. Enhancement of the area will hopefully encourage all users to take better care of our local environment. In addition, difficult planning issues have arisen recently; these have been tackled with vigour by the Council and our part within the overall planning process has been completed.

The Village Plan is approaching fruition and almost within our own tight timetable. In the New Year, the four Action Groups will present the main points from the analysis to the Steering Group. Thereafter, the Steering Group will present the plan to the Parish Council. At this stage, the opportunity will be given for further comment from village residents. By early spring, the Parish Council hopes to adopt the Village Plan and, at the Parish Council Annual Meeting in May, the Plan will be launched.

Finally, may I wish you all a very Happy Christmas and a joyful New Year?

A peaceful Christmas to all gardeners and a successful growing season in 2006.



### EXPAND YOUR WORLD THROUGH PHOTOGRAPHY



All most all of us these days, possess a camera of one sort or another. In recent years the trend has been towards digital and I guess 80% of all cameras are used for social recording. That is picture of family events such as birthdays, days out, Christmas gatherings, Weddings and christenings. And did you know that 85% of all pictures taken never get printed and that 70% -75% of those printed are looked at once, put away and never seen again. But photography is more than a means of recording social history, important though it is, it is an art form and a means of looking at the world in a totally

different way. To give an obvious example. How many of us are overawed by a spectacular sunset and it is the colour and quality of light that inspire our emotions, yet we never give a thought to the fact that the same light and colour is all around us most of the time.

I have been a photographer for the past 60 odd years and I look at things in a very different way because of it. I see sunlight passing through high clouds and falling onto a landscape and producing a dapple effect or rain falling and forming globules of water on a beautiful flower. I see a difference in the quality of sunlight during a hot period when the air is full of dust particles compared with that same sunlight after rain and wind when our vision is less impaired due to the absence of dust in the atmosphere. Subjects are then clearer and more defined as a result. I see the effect of sunlight falling from different angles onto a subject. Front lighting will give a flat effect, side lighting will produce more defined texture and back lighting will bring about a halo around the subject. Yet how many people using a camera actually see and use the prevailing lighting conditions to their advantage and so improve the ultimate image. You don't have to be an artist or photographer to appreciate these things, you need to look at the world around us in a different way and admire and enjoy the elements which go to make the whole. Too many things in life are taken for granted but nature is an ever changing phenomenon that should never be brushed aside. When next you are out for a walk, try looking at things in this different way and then apply it to your photography and you will not only improve the images you produce but you will expand your understanding and appreciation of our world. So I recommend you "Expand your World through Photography"

On a hard-nosed, strictly commercial basis they would have concluded that after a gap of sixteen months all the post office business would have been taken up by other offices so there was no need for any action. Instead, they stuck to their policy of supporting rural communities, just as they did at Lympsham in the late nineties.

The completed questionnaires are being analysed by Vision ICT in Exeter. This secures the anonymity of people's responses. It also means that the database of answers being created can provide the three Action Groups and the Steering Committee with sound information for developing a parish plan.

We hope to have the data back from Exeter before Christmas. This will be passed to the three Action Groups for them to formulate their draft ideas on the future of the parish. These ideas will become the basis of the Draft Parish Plan.

In February we hope to present these Draft ideas to the residents of the parish. We expect to hold another meeting in the Coronation Hall and perhaps hold some workshops to look at particular themes. This will be your opportunity to express your views and contribute further to the Parish Plan. In May the finished Plan will be published and made available to all.

### Fresh lease of life for Bleadon Youth Club

Thanks to the efforts of the new leadership we have seen a remarkable transformation in Bleadon's youth club. Thursday nights regularly attract over 20 local young people. This is a five-fold increase over the past year. Overall membership now exceeds 40 made up of around 40% boys and 60% girls.

#### **Quality leadership**

Clearly, the leaders are doing something right to attract such enthusiastic support from our youngsters. Anne Fortune and Stephen Down are the permanent members of the youth work team. Stephen's energy and enthusiasm has been key in the support of Anne's experience and creative skills. Sara Matty has been enhancing the work of the team since April. With so many youngsters now attending the club the team will need the support of additional skilled leaders over the coming months. Let's hope that North Somerset Council continues to provide that support.

#### Girls and Young Women's Group

Sara and Anne ran a special project for girls and young women over the summer holiday. Working within a themed curriculum specifically covering "Be healthy" and "Stay safe". There were activities and workshops to explore wellbeing, exercise and sport.

North Somerset Council were so impressed with the achievements of the Group's six week summer project that they have agreed funding for a further six months. The Tuesday evening sessions run exclusively for girls and young women and are proving to be very popular.

#### Improvements to the building

The Youth Club Management Team is determined to support this new-found enthusiasm at the youth club if every way. We have poured considerable resources into physical improvements to the building. You may have noticed the new UPVC windows and kitchen door. Kim and Malcolm Herival have worked really hard with other family members to fit a brand new kitchen.

Soon you will see additional exterior lighting to brighten the car park. The fascias, bargeboards and gutters are being replaced.

We are grateful to the Community and Probation Service who are helping us to decorate the club inside and out. So look out soon for a much brighter and more welcoming youth club.

### SYLVIA REMEMBERS WHEN ......

The only drinking water available to the Villagers came from the many wells and was obtained either by pump or a bucket on a rope. There were bucket toilets and septic tanks but when in the 1950's main drainage and water came to Bleadon, better utilities meant more houses and life changed forever.

In those pre-war days there were many businesses in Bleadon; as well as the village Post Office run by Mr Carter, there were two other grocery shops managed by Mrs Luscombe and Mrs Francis and ironmongery run by Mr Vinson, and there was another shop at Hillcote on Bleadon Hill. The postman Mr Ling delivered mail twice a day on his bike and there were regular deliveries of milk and bread from 'Birds Bakery' of Winscombe; several butchers delivered meat in the area and wet fish was supplied by Mr Dommet. There was a village policeman, who knew everyone by name, an insurance man collected his payments weekly on his bike and there was even a village undertaker by the name of Edwin Gilson. We have heard previously that there was also a blacksmith, so the farming community of Bleadon was well served by its trade's people. Of course we already know about the thriving school which looked after the educational needs of the children until they were eleven years old.

The souls of Bleadon were also well catered for, as well as the Church of St Peter and St Paul there was a Methodist Chapel which was run by the Misses Poole and Taylor, and John Bathe was in charge of the Mission.

Another vital enterprise was the Quarry, owned by the Young family; this was a valuable source of local stone, and is now the site of Marshall's concrete works. (We shall talk of the quarry at length in a forthcoming issue).

Alas now most of these old businesses are gone ... but we do have a new Post Office and farm shop. Hopefully it will thrive.

We used to walk a lot ... sometimes as far as the Station where we could get on a train to Weston; then Burn ells' Motors started to run their brown and cream coaches and later the Bristol Tramways provided bus services through the Village, the number 42 via Bleadon Hill to Burnham -on -Sea, the 91 to Brean, the 151 to Bridgwater via Bleadon Road and Bridge Road and the 94 via Bleadon Road and Shiplate Road to Glastonbury. All the buses had conductors and the fare was 6d for adults and 3d for children.

What we have now is the number 83 a heavily subsidised service that doesn't run evenings!

Even the pubs have changed, the Queen's Arms and the Anchor Inn are still in existence but the 'Victoria' has ceased to exist in Bridge Road, now in addition however we do have the 'Catherines' ... a 'Hungry Horse' where once there was a farm!

The Parish Room was enlarged and became the Coronation Hall, but the skittle alley which was behind is no more; now we have a Jubilee Room, a youth Club, a playground and a church room... all valuable village amenities.

There were many thriving farms and smallholdings many of which have been sold, amalgamated and/or developed. but the old family names such as Vowles, Wall, Amesbury, Boone, House, Poole, and Diment still. come to mind and it is interesting to think of the connections through marriage - Caple/Banwell/Scotchmer/Tucker/Richards/ Purcell - then Wall/ Boley/Day/Hart/Gilson. 

### FESTIVE FUSILIER - A Short Story

"Goodnight. Merry Christmas!" He called.

Miss Markham looked up with a brief glance at the clock, sniffing disapprovingly. "Another paid holiday, be the ruin of us," she muttered.

Edward thought the stories of Mr Dickens, lately doing much to promote the festival, conveyed more the romance of Christmas past than the reality of Christmas present but outside a Dickensian world greeted him. Stretched awnings and bright-lit windows backed the thronged pavements of Wine Street. Shop doorways bustled, bedecked with seasonal greenery, the aroma of pastry and pudding, the sniff of sweet and spice enlivening the sharp evening air. Edward paid three shillings and redeemed the silver thimble - Fanny's thimble and once their Mother's. The need for his sister to pawn it grieved him but tomorrow he'd restore it to her. The snow was gathering in gutters and misting the roadways as he continued his journey upwards and homeward to the villas of Redland. Passing a group of itinerant children singing their few verses from door to door, he paused, fumbling at his purse to give them a coin. In the streetlamps glimmer, light from their parlour splashed a surprising bright yellow oblong across the pavement, surprising that it shone at all. The garden gate creaked familiarly and before he could reach the step, the front door abruptly opened. Fanny stood in the hallway silhouetted against the flickering gas lamp.

"Edward my dear" she said, "we've a visitor."

Excitedly she helped remove his coat, brushing snowflakes from his beard as she ushered him into the parlour's unaccustomed warmth.

They raised their glasses in a Christmas toast to the memory and courage of Fusilier Samuel Harris.
