



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

This report will hopefully not read to be too gloomy, grey or wintry. The primary New Year resolution of the Parish Council remains the well being of our community. The Precept is set to rise only with inflation and, with careful budgeting, our plans for improvements will continue. Where and how the money is spent will be laid out at the Annual Parish Meeting on 10th April 2006, and the initial outcome of the Village Plan will also be unveiled; the completed plan will be published later this year. We also hope that on this evening, short presentations will be given by all the clubs and societies presently running for the benefit and interest of all villagers. So do please come and join us and make the Annual Parish Meeting a get together for us all.

The Parish Council has now employed a Village Ranger, who will start work in March. The Ranger will be a great asset to the village in maintaining the cleanliness of Bleadon's open spaces, making regular inspections and safety checks of Council assets and will also act as a contact for residents, when problems are within his remit. Our environment continues to be more important each year so now Bleadon now has an "angel" of its own. Watch out 'Best Kept Village' Competition!

Another resolution was to banish the plague of litter and waste and at January's Parish Council meeting, the managers of "Streets and Open Spaces Areas" from North Somerset Council gave us a short talk. We already have the green boxes and a green bag for garden waste and cardboard. The plan is that these will be followed by a container for plastic bottles and perhaps bins on wheels later. May I please remind all villagers again to respect highways and byways and, in particular, for car owners to park with consideration. Our valued bus service has constantly to weave in and out on some of our roads in the village!

The Coronation Hall Car Park has been resurfaced and marked - this has certainly smartened the area for the Play Park, the new look Youth club and the Hall. The tubs will be planted up again in Spring. I wonder what is a good colour scheme for this season? Finally, two more dropped pavements are to be installed shortly and work on the Bleadon Road/Purn Way corner is under consideration by North Somerset Council.

We look forward to your support, interest and input for another good year for Bleadon.

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


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HOLY WEEK AND EASTER - special Services

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

YOUR FULLY LICENSED HALL

Twenty-four hour drinking was the subject of many a headline last year, obscuring the fact that such unsensational places as village halls, had to obtain fresh licenses under the terms of the 2003 Act, not just to sell alcohol but for every activity classed as licensable.

For the Coronation Hall this entailed a good deal of research, lengthy form-filling, detailed plans of the buildings (very professionally drawn by Peter Lindsay for his customary fee of £0.00p), and a few hundred pounds expenditure. As a result North Somerset has granted us a Premises License which includes the following:

- Public entertainment such as concerts, dances, films etc.
- Theatre (for some reason not included in the above).
- Sale of alcohol.

Len Chamberlain now rejoices in the title of Premises Licence Holder and has nominated me (Les Masters) as Designated Premises Supervisor. To make an analogy, at the Catherine's Inn, Greene King are the PLH and Steve Hughes hitherto thought of as the Licensee or Landlord is the DPS.

Under the new system, alcohol maybe sold at the Halls more or less all day but only by or through the DPS. Thus on the morning of the Christmas Market, with the DPS present, sherry was on offer with the mince pies. On the other hand the bar at the CLIC quiz (an event open to the public), was run by Reyn Badger authorised by the DPS, and that at the Inner Wheel Christmas Party (a private event) by John Taylor, likewise authorised.

These examples demonstrate that anyone hiring one of the Halls (or both), whether for a private or a public event, can arrange a bar without recourse to the magistrates or the need for a hefty outlay. The arrangements are a matter of negotiation with the DPS (and very simple for long-standing hirers such as Friends of the Church or The Bleadon Players), but the aim is that hirers are helped to enjoy the facility created as a result of the new rules.

WEATHER REPORT BLEADON HILL 2005

I have been recording and measuring precipitation from the skies in a rain gauge in my back garden since 1981. Technically this includes rain, sleet, hail, drizzle, and melted snow. To qualify for a 'rain day' there must be a minimum of 0.2mm in the gauge. I usually measure twice daily 8.00am and 8.00pm.

These recordings are in mm. As a guide 25.4mm = linch Therefore 958.4 mm = 37.7ins (just over 3ft of water!)

As contrast to last January only 31.5mm (1.2in) of rain were recorded this January along with 19 dry days. At the start of the year the sun didn't put in an appearance through the clouds until January 11th. There has only been one drier January between 1981 and now, that was in 1997 when only 10.6mm of rain were recorded.

The overnight temperatures dipped below freezing on 13 occasions in January (10 on the trot!)



READY FOR SPRING?

I'm sure that by now all of you keen gardeners out there have cleaned and sharpened your mowers, hedge clippers and secateurs ready for the new growing season. It seems to start earlier each year doesn't it?

The process of preparing the equipment is relatively easy, some of us will simply go to B&Q and purchase a new blade for the rotary or hover while others will have honed their existing blades , but whichever it is I've no doubt that most of us rely upon electricity to help us with actual chore of mowing the grass or clipping the hedge.

Not so a few decades ago ...

..... I am grateful to Jack Somerfield for finding this article in an old magazine, I think you'll agree that if we all had to follow this regime these days, except for perhaps the most dedicated 'green-keepers' amongst you, we would probably all opt for hard landscaping!

GO HANG YOUR SCYTHE

Mowing with a scythe can be carried on efficiently for long stretches without getting unduly tired or suffering aches and pains - but only if you go about it the right way and may sure the scythe is adjusted to suit your particular stature. This is called hanging it. A tall man using a short man's scythe would have to bend awkwardly and would soon have an aching back.

The two handles, called tacks, can be moved up or down the wooden shaft (or snaith) of the scythe and fixed in the best position. First (1) hold the scythe upside-down with the heel of the blade under your left armpit, and fix the first tack at arm's length; then (2) turn the scythe up the right way, place your right elbow on the first tack and with your right fist clenched, fix the second tack so that it meets your knuckles. To check that this is right, hold the scythe across you as in (3) and swing your left foot forward; it should just meet the point of the blade. Similarly, with the scythe across your shoulders (4) and the first tack against your cheek, the point should meet your outstretched hand.




1. Set the first inch

Once the tacks are properly set should be easy to keep up a steady mowing rhythm, with the whole scythe blade sweeping parallel to ground throughout each swing. This is the key to efficient mowing; too many mowers make a swipe which ends with the boint hooking skywards.

Sounds to me like it's all in the action and the follow through! I'm sure that in Bleadon there are still many of you who used scythes on the land in your youth and will remember the experience well, but to youngsters who may read this I think my advice has to be 'don't try this at home'!

Dark of Moon

"What time d'you call this?" Mother greeted my arrival downstairs. She'd returned from her Sunday cleaning job at the Royal Oak wearing her 'dangerous face' as Dad used to call it.

"You'd better be pulling your horns in my boy, now your Dad's gone," she thought I'd just got up, not knowing I'd spent the day down at the station. Dad, an army reservist, had been called up for Korea and been killed there two months before. My secret premonition of his death had been overwhelming, made worse by my helplessness to prevent it. Mother's grief had already hardened into resentment, most often directed at me. She was bristling for a row now so I left the house quietly and went back again to the railway.

In those days the Stogumber signal box closed on Sunday after the 4.13 local. When I arrived a fussily familiar 0-6-0 Prairie Tank drawing two carriages was leaving the cutting, belching smoke from its stack like a storm cloud, and Mr Rogers the signalman was already wheeling his bike up the roadway opposite. Return weekend excursions from the coast often came through in the evening and sat on the banking across from the deserted box I waited for some traffic. I was in luck; a King and a Grange came pounding through plus a couple of freight-hauling Black Fives. Time flew, in the twilight chill bats began wheeling about the bridge, but on the point of leaving I heard the throb of a distant diesel. A Deltic appeared drawing a long train of box wagons, its Napier engines thrusting twin columns of exhaust gasses into the dusk. Nimbus 55020 I read carefully, a rare bird on this line. Entering the details then closing my notebook with satisfaction I started for home. At school on Monday my friend and mentor in the train spotting game listened to my tales from the embankment and enviously checked my sightings in his record books.

"King Edward the First? Lucky devil!" His pencil paused above Nimbus 55020 and he deftly leafed through his guide. "Couldn't have been - see, scrapped August last year, shunting accident at Temple Meads." He grinned, "Wishful thinking there George."

The man next door was a rabbit trapper. He had a dozen or more ferrets caged in his overgrown garden and they fascinated me. Pink-eyed and sinuous, giving off a pungently

dangerous odour, they would clear a warren of rabbits in minutes; sending them terror-stricken headlong into his carefully staked nets. He also set gintraps in the runs that linked their fieldside burrows. I'd been bird watching along the wind-shaped trees that edged the moor when I came on a fox caught in one of his traps. As I drew near it cowered away, the trap jaws sawing at its foreleg. At a loss what to do, he'd appeared noiselessly at my elbow. Without a word he cut a forked stick from the hedge, pinned the creature to the ground by its



neck and released the trap with his boot. Hurriedly limping away and out through a gap, the fox lay down to lick its wound and roll in the sun-dappled bracken.

"Why not kill it?" I asked.

"'Cause 'e deserves a better end," then looking up from cleaning his knife, "sorry about yer Dad son. Us ull miss 'e in cricket team."

"I knew he wouldn't be back." Something I could never tell Mother but had no difficulty in disclosing to the trapper.

He shook his head, "'Tis true some's able to see things," he said. "I knowed that fox 'ud be caught up yer with you, now 'e's goin' to be caught agin next wik by the 'ounds. I 'ad to decide see."

A year or so later Mother remarried, a widower, a teacher she met at a school parents' evening and we moved to his town house in Minehead. He was as different as could be from Dad, but he certainly sorted me out. I would have ended up farm labouring for sure but thanks to him I made Grammar School and got a university place. He had a daughter, Rachel, who was older than I and had taken up the Hippy lifestyle thus causing him and Mother much grief.

"Gets right on my nerves that girl," Mother would say; "and don't go taking notice of that rubbish she talks."

But like our former neighbour's ferrets, Rachel, with her strange dress and exaggerated gestures, fascinated me and it was she who explained the 'dark of moon'. There's a time, she told me, when the veils between past, present and future become transparent and those blessed can see beyond. That time, from moon wane until its first silver sliver of new light, was 'dark of moon'. She'd recognised my 'inner awareness', my 'positive Karma' as she described it, and was keen I go with her to Glastonbury to meet her friends. No need for any cosmic doors to open to reveal what Mother thought of that.

My 'gift' saved me twice from harm during National Service, soldiering on the rocky barren volcano that is Aden's Steamer Point. Once, an acute sense of danger in the lethal back streets of Crater town prevented me leading a patrol into a terrorist ambush, and once on the way home for demob. Due to sail on the troopship Empire Windrush but knowing the voyage was ill fated I feigned sickness and my passage was cancelled; the vessel subsequently caught fire and sank in the Mediterranean. During our honeymoon, spent in Paris during the mid-sixties student riots, Margaret and I were in a restaurant when I had the overwhelming desire to change tables. Quickly grabbing my plate and dragging her with me, I moved. Within half a minute a brick came through the window showering our previous table with shards of glass. A similar portent returning from a family holiday, purposely caused me to delay our arrival at Zeebrugge and miss a crossing booked aboard the doomed ferry Herald of Free Enterprise. These events were certainly good fortune but, paradoxically, I've never had any luck with lotteries, race winners, football results or like situations where a spark of foreknowledge would bring material benefit. Also, when coming to a crossroad on life's highway it would have been nice to know which way to turn. But my glimpses into the future during those 'dark of moon' periods, always carefully marked in my diary, are generally perverse. Even so, given my unease about this trip, why are we here? Perhaps the Fates will be satisfied with the puncture on the way to Heathrow and the fuss over Kate's passport when we eventually booked in. Like the trapper years ago, I've had to decide. Come what may, we shall go to our son's wedding in New Zealand.

Margaret brings the girls back from the toilet and flops down beside our bags.

"What you looking so worried about? We're here, problems over."

"That must be our 'plane," pointing, taking the children's hands and moving to the window. Kate's hand is hot and clammy and I squeeze it with a reassurance I don't feel. The umbilical-like gangway from our departure point is connected to the wide body of a Singapore Airlines 777-300. Kate can't believe anything so big can ever fly and young Sadie demands an explanation of the weird bird pictured on the tail.

whilst the shirt-sleeved second pilot completes his external checks; absently kicking the tyres and peering into an engine

nacelle. After a brief word with the brightly jacketed ground crew, now busily reeling in serpentine pipes and wires, he makes his way back to the terminal; he looks very young. I read recently that there's more chance being kicked to death by a racehorse or of dying of shock at the cinema than being killed in an air crash but I know that carefully chosen statistics can show very odd things. However, the sight of aircrew and groundcrew going about their business is reassuring. Everything so in control it appears that nothing can go wrong. And yet-and yet?

"Boeing treble-seven," I report to Margaret, "just two engines - hell of a long way to go on two engines."

"I expect they'll cope," Margaret smiles, patting the seat, "come and sit down George, don't worry so. And don't fret the children, Kate's anxious enough as it is."

Looking around I estimate about four hundred passengers are waiting to board.

Anxious Kate is also counting, "Can all these people can't get on Dad?". A bustle begins at the lounge exit, 'bing-bong, bing-bong' the announcement tones sound, a ground stewardess calmly starts calling passengers for boarding. No avoiding it now. No turning back.

Astride the tyre-scarred runway with throttles pushed fully open , the 777 surges forward,

pressing us back into our seats. Margaret and I join hands with each other and the girls as the twin engines bellow accelerating the aircraft furiously in its headlong rush to be gone. The juddering rumble of speeding wheels on concrete fades and shortly the undercarriage thumps home, landing wheel doors groan shut, trim tabs and flaps magically disappear into wings;



flight SA 390 to Singapore is positively airborne. At full power, climbing through the cloud base, the Boeing points its radomed nose optimistically Eastwards.
