

Chairman's Report

A beautiful summer has brought visitors, families and friends to Bleadon. Many have commented on our splendid village and the value and spirit of our community. So with compliments ringing in our ears, and nearly two years of 'quality status' under our belts, we progress with renewed vitality. Moreover, a great deal of knowledge will be gleaned for our future from the village plan, which will hopefully be presented by the end of the year.

Recently, the Parish Council was invited to a site visit and meeting at Marshalls in order to discuss village complaints over the past year and for the Parish Council to thank them for their ongoing support. We have established a good liaison with Marshalls and will remain in close contact with them. We also continue, in conjunction with the North Somerset Council Highways Department and the Bus Company, to consult over bus routes within the village. Further meetings are being arranged on this topic. At this stage, no decisions have been taken and I would only add that present bus routes will only be maintained provided the level of customers remains substantial.

Your support has been strong for our "multi-faceted entertainment complex", known as the Coronation Hall and Jubilee Room, where most of our social events, clubs, classes and societies are based. We have also seen great enthusiasm too for the Post Office, Tiffins and the Pubs, and hopefully similar support will be seen for the new small businesses and professional enterprises all springing into life in the village.

The Parish Council meets on the second Monday of each month at 7.30pm and attendance by the public is encouraged.

This month's contribution is being typed as our gardens continue to suffer from a continuing shortage of rain ,although no doubt by the time you read it, the heavens will have opened! North Somerset

Council is in a similar state as staff leave in August and a drought descends on its activities with fewer meetings in the calendar.

However that doesn't mean we have nothing to do. there is always something happening. A recent example has been fly tipping in Facum Lane, probably by block drive contractors although no evidence has come forward to prove it. North Somerset removed the material dumped quickly enough but to prevent a repeat of this and other rubbish dumping it always helps if witnesses can provide any information. 





The Bochmann Quartet

"Passion, drama and energy" – BBC Music Magazine describing the Bochmann Quartet. One of the finest quartets in the country, which has toured internationally and made numerous recordings and broadcasts will launch Churchill Music!'s sparkling new season in St. John the Baptist Church, Churchill on Saturday October 7th 7.30pm.

Michael Bochmann who partnered Yehudi Menuhin in Bach's Double Violin Concerto in a tour of eighteen concerts in the USA and Britain, was appointed concertmaster of the English String and Symphony Orchestras in 1988. His quartet, the Bochmann, whose performances are described by The Sunday Times as "exemplary" will perform a sumptuous programme of works by Mozart, Boccherini, Puccini and Schubert.

At the age of just 19, Mark Messenger, Violin, made his Wigmore Hall debut. Since then he has performed as a soloist and chamber musician in all of London's major concert halls and throughout the world. He has broadcast many times on television and radio, and has been recorded by no less than six labels. Mark is also leader of the European Chamber Opera,

Violist, Helen Roberts is equally impressive joining the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra at the age of 19. She joined Bochmann String Quartet and has performed and recorded a wide repertoire to critical acclaim. Helen is also a regular guest principal with the BBC National Orchestra of Wales and Welsh National Opera Orchestra and frequently appears with the CBSO.

Cellist Peter Adams was made principal 'cellist with the London String Orchestra and was the youngest ever professor at the Royal Academy of Music. Peter joined the Bochmann Quartet in 1996, and a year later he was appointed to the Principal Chair of the English String and Symphony Orchestras.

It is hardly believable that a quartet of this stature could be heading for a small village church in Churchill. But this is the norm for this unique organisation which aims not only to bring top quality musicians to local people at affordable prices but to local school children as well through their Churchill Music! Half a Century Ago

Gas nowadays is taken for granted as a source of heat, but how many of us have ever experienced gas lighting? I first came across it in about 1950 in my Grandmother's Victorian house in the middle of Chippenham, and coming from electrically-lit cottage in rural Hertfordshire I thought it decidedly primitive. Yet in Spring of 1946 the family that moved into the cottage at the foot Purn Lane welcomed gas light as a luxury; their old home in Burrowbridge was lit by oil lamps.

I learned about this and many other aspects of life in early post-war Bleadon from a fascinating autobiographical booklet (lent to me by Tony Moore) by Graham Baker, one of the family concerned. The booklet ends with Graham volunteering for the Parachute Regiment and passing the training course with ease — no mean feat, but no surprise either when you have read of his intensely active and often harsh upbringing.

Consider, for example, his four years (11-15) at Walliscote School, throughout which he helped on the late Fred Wall's milk round, being picked up at 6.40 each morning and finishing at the school gates at 8.50 – and early version of the school run. During school holidays this was supplemented by working on the local farms. A ten-hour day haymaking would be followed by a swim in the river Axe in order to cool off and clean up.

Thanks to a new farm owner home conditions improved – electricity, a bathroom and a flush toilet – though the family were still overcrowded. Corporal punishment (with a leather belt) was all too frequent, and to any readers who snort that it never did them any harm I would gently suggest that they might possibly have been even more perfect without it.

There is no mention of radio, television or a family car. Combine that with an overcrowded cottage and it is no wonder that spare time was spent mainly out of doors, or that Graham joined the newly- formed Scout troop.

Farming as a local livelihood loomed much larger in those days. At Purn alone there were no fewer than five farms, and there was not the massive modern machinery that has eliminated most of the modern workforce. The pitchfork had not been superseded by the fork-lift. Consequently there were plenty of farmers and workers to take part in the annual Hill Sports, where the boy Graham acted as runner between the events and the Judges tent.

The booklet (40pages) is packed with incidents and accidents, some amusing and some very serious, even upsetting. There is no self-pity in the accounts of hardship and unfairness but they certainly dispel any illusions that agricultural life was some kind of blissful rustic idyll. In his opening paragraph Graham states that he is writing for the benefit of his descendants. They have much to be grateful for.



Keeping Warm at Home

KEEPING WARM AT HOME AND BEING ENERGY EFFICIENT AT THE SAME TIME!

Are you cold at home? Are you worried about the next fuel bill? Do you want to be more energy efficient... and reduce your fuel bills?

Here are 6 ways to be warmer, save money, and do your bit for the environment!

- 1 Shut the curtains at dusk. This will ensure that the heat stays inside your home to heat you and not the outside. Do not hang them over the radiators as this will prevent the heat from going into the room. Either line the curtains or hang up an old pair behind them to increase their thickness. This will help to stop heat escaping.
- 2 Make sure your hot water tank is well insulated. You can buy a tank jacket from most DIY shops for about £10 15. You will recover the cost in reduced fuel bills in about a year. The recommended thickness of the jacket is at least 50 mm (approx. 2 inches).
- 3 Set your hot water tank thermostat to 60oC. Any higher than this and you are wasting energy and money. It should not be set lower than 55oC for health reasons.
- 4 Invest in low energy light bulbs especially for lights that are on for long periods of time. You will recover the cost by having lower electricity bills.
- 5 Don't leave the 'red' button (standby button) on your electrical appliances, this includes, TV's, stereos, computers etc, you are using almost as much electricity as you would if you were using the appliance.

A Short Story

The General

A stocky little man, his faded red hair peppered with grey and with curiously hot brown eyes under pale lashes that gave him an angry pop-eyed look. He often wore tweed jackets with leather inserts at the elbow, a thing I'd not seen before, and stout brown shoes with lots of holes in the uppers that Mum said were called brogues. He'd been a Brigadier General in the Royal Engineers.

"Had to come down-market Old Boy," the General admitted to Dad, shortly after he moved in, "getting that wretched son of mine through Sandhurst nearly bankrupted me." He also spoke of a 'blasted Cheltenham woman', apparently another drain on his meagre pension; a bounty deridingly described as 'the thanks of a grateful country after forty years service'.

It didn't take him long to get a grip of village affairs. Having a pronounced faith in his own abilities, within eighteen months the General was Chairman of every organisation in sight; the only escapees being the WI and the Over 60's Gentle Exercise Group. He also started a British Legion charity shop in town but by brusquely refusing to accept anything for sale that he broadly defined as 'rubbish' coupled with continual staff problems it soon closed. Turnover of committee members in his organisations became legendary. Dad, Company

Secretary for J S Fry at Keynsham, was recruited in typical military fashion.

"Ah! Matthews," the General called over the dividing fence, "you're a Secretary of sorts I believe?" Dad nodded. "Job for you on the Parish Council then," he continued, shaking his head in disgust, "our blasted fellow's resigned!"

"Taraa! Taraa!" Dad mimicked when he told us, "duty calls." Holding a finger to his head he pulled an imaginary trigger. Afterwards Mum declared that was an omen. As Dad often said, she was gifted with hindsight.



The General's personal life was a source of speculation in the village, he lived alone - we never saw the wretched son or the blasted woman from Cheltenham – the only female who ever crossed the threshold was old Mrs Arnold who 'did' for him two days a week. She said the place was spotless.

" 'Place for everythin' and everythin' in place' 'e ses," she recounted. "Do's 'is own washin' an' ironing. Mine 'e 'as some funny ways."

Dad said most retired senior army officers were potty about something and often took a keen interest in the welfare of fallen women; the latter remark prompting a 'not in front of the boy' look from Mum. Actually I thought that helping ladies who'd injured themselves in falls, whilst

puzzling, presented a kindly aspect to his character.

I soon discovered the General's particular pottiness was the prophetic significance of the Great Egyptian Pyramid of Khufu at Gizeh. He was a pyramidologist he told me and Dad bid me look it up in the dictionary. The General, I discovered, was someone who drew mystical conclusions from the height, shape, placement and measurement of pyramids. The internal dimensions of the structure at Gizeh also conveyed the secrets of the universe. Apparently those who understood these things could use them as an immense stone almanac.

Dad laughed when I told him, "Like most almanacs, great for telling you the dates of things that have already happened but a bit hazy about the future."

One day the General showed me some diagrams, unrolling the large stiff parchments across his kitchen table. "It's coming m'boy," he warned sternly, gripping my arm fiercely, his eyes popping, "yes its coming again, set in stone for all to see. Hope your generation rises to the challenge as we did."

He became a difficult neighbour, at loggerheads from the beginning with the adjoining Misses Farrant and their many cats and eventually even complaining of our playing French cricket in the garden on Sundays. A churchwarden now, he spoke to the Vicar about it and he poor soul, had been ordered to 'have a word in our ears'. The General's sport was county cricket, 'the summer game' he called it though it was not the game it used to be of course. His cricket reminiscences were peopled with characters with improbable names: HGD Leaveson-Gower, W Barrington-Dalby, Dredge, Lobb and Yapp. Highlight

of his year was the local cricket festival that always featured one first-class game. Naturally he was on the Committee and once took friend Andrew and me to the big match, it was Somerset v Derbyshire I think but I'll never forget the journey.

He owned a pre-war Lanchester car,

funereal black with a shed-like interior and unyielding leather seats.

"Now, no talking while I'm driving," he growled as we settled in the back. He drove quite slowly, constantly sounded his horn, not only as a warning but also as a rebuke to other drivers; practically all of whom he considered were driving with criminal recklessness. Invariably he complained of approaching vehicles

encroaching on his road space and would lower his window to imperiously wave them over and sometimes shout as they passed. "Get over blast you", or, "hell d'you think you're doing?" He had a reserved parking space at the ground and we prayed for fear of the consequences that it would be unoccupied when we arrived and luckily it was.

Sadly it was my interest in sport, football in this case, that proved the General's downfall - well that and the cat. Pride of the Farrants' feline family was an overweight specimen named Posy. Too fat and slow to chase anything, Posy often lurked near the General's cold frames to snatch up unwary birds.
