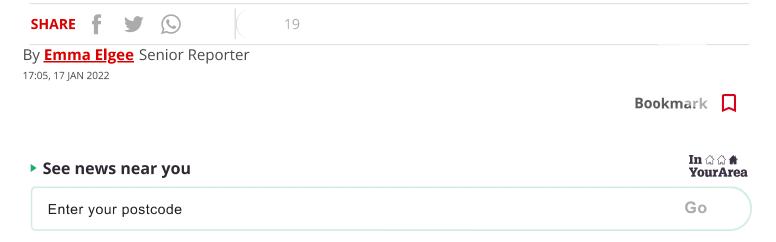


Bath locals say new traffic management plans would be 'commercial suicide'

Some said the plan would kill off the city centre and hurt businesses







Bath locals have had a thing or two to say about the council's new "journey to net zero" consultation.

It has proposed, among other things, that th<mark>e city would be split in<mark>to four cells'</mark> a<mark>nd</mark> that there would be no through traific in the city centre.</mark>

There will only be one of the local points on each of the outer boundaries for vehicles a they will be prevented from passing from one cell to another, although movement for pedestrians, cyclists and public transport will be unrestricted.

viable and sustainable.

The consultation also says the council will consider demand management measures such as a congestion charge, public transport discounts, a workplace parking levy and staggered start times for business and schools.

And it proposes moving freight by bike, train and even buses to cut the number of HGVs and says the city's park and rides will be upgraded into transport interchanges, an idea that has already been floated.

<u>Bath Live</u> readers have shared their thoughts on the proposals on our Facebook page and some of them are truly shocked.

Many expressed confusion about why Ghent was being used as a model when it is so different to Bath - it's not hilly and has much better transport with ring roads and a tram system.

Other's said that Bath's roads need a lot of work before a model like that could work and some suggested it will harm businesses and be "commercial suicide" to the city centre.

Andrew Wetherill said: "Note, Ghent...a largely FLAT city!!!"

Jane Wilkins said: "Does Ghent have hills?"

John Chapman went further and said the plan was full of "obvious flaws".

He said: "So Bath is now flat, with inner and outer ring roads and a high quality tram system?

"The plan is very amateurish, started with the solution and made the challenges fit, and its full of contradictions/ obvious flaws.

"For a start, Bath's 'arterial' roads are mostly residential and quite narrow.

"So those roads get a cycle lane, displaced traffic and this fantasy mass transit (bus?) system. So the buses get stuck in the traffic and inevitable chaos around the centre?"

He suggested they look elsewhere for inspiration.

Mike Earle said: "So those south of the river will access the M4 motorway how? Ghent has an inner and outer ring road. Bath doesn't have an viable east-west, north-south routes that avoid the city centre."

Others said that the design would kill of the city centre as businesses would struggle with the new plan.

David Wilson said: "How do they think bars and restaurants will get their delivery without a HGV?"

Brenda Kurle said: "Bath council just doesn't want anyone to visit."



Richard Healey said it would be "commercial suicide" for the city.

He said: "Yet another council planning it's own city centre commercial suicide. Unfortunately this is on my doorstep. With Bristol's funeral service scheduled for this summer with the introduction of the CAZ (M&S made a well-timed exit), it's difficult to think of where I would go for my non bicycle-friendly shopping. Hmmm - out of town retail parks? Oh yes, there's always Amazon of course!"

Many said that before Bath could even think of following such a design it would need a ring road.

Chris Scource said: "Bath best spend some money and build a sensible ring road around the hole then."

Rob Hughes said: "Before they can implement this they need to construct a ring road first, just think of all the extra pollution and congestion on surrounding routes."

George Hunt said: "Considering the difficulties First Bus has getting along the bus routes, the roads around Bath need sorting first.

"Great to get buses out of the centre quickly, only to get held up by traffic congestion outside the city.

"Then we get the smug ones telling us how bad the bus company is."

Adam Matthew said: "If there is one sure thing, it's that Bath's road infrastructure needs something radical."

Edd Stacey said: "Build a ring road/bypass so us people that need to head down the A36 can avoid Bath. Do us all a favour."

Michael Button said: "Reinstitute the trams, with main stations at the park and ride, and centre of town. If you build it, they will come. Make it a heritage style and tourists subsidise it."

Charlotte Hanna said she thought public transport needed to be better first.

She said: "It's not just about safe cycle routes. The hills around Bath make cycling quite difficult, even for the most fit people. With current bus services unreliable and insufficient people are forced to use a car. '

"Invest in public transport, improve options for school pupils and students, extend bus services and cut the cost of bus travel, then deter commuters from driving into the city. There must be a carrot as well as a stick."

Another person said that little thought was being given to the impact the plans would have on surrounding villages - especially Westbury.

Shirley Paget said: "Very nice to hear about BANES thoughts for the traffic going through Bath but they have no concern whatsoever about some of their decisions that resulted in heavy vehicle diversions causing havoc through already overrun villages and towns in Wiltshire.

"The people in Westbury were already choking on vehicle fumes - thank you BANES for making it worse. I believe they are meant to be co-operating with Wiltshire Council to help on this but obviously only talk not action type of co-operation."

The council is asking residents to give their views on the proposals it believes are needed to effect a shift to public transport, walking and travel by bike that will be needed to deliver its net zero ambition.

Councillor Warren, the cabinet member for sustainable travel, said: "This is a pivotal moment in our journey to net zero, and I think everyone who travels around our area will be interested in these ideas and want to have their say on them.



"We have introduced the first charging clean air zone outside of London and are currently working with local communities on our liveable neighbourhoods programme. But to go further we need your help with a more fundamental rethink of how we get around our area - and the big changes we will need to make to our transport system to get to carbon neutrality by 2030.

"We know that large numbers of people currently have no choice but to use their cars as they don't have safe cycle routes that they can use away from traffic or don't have a reliable or frequent enough bus service.

"Reductions in car use can only come if we start providing more cycle facilities, better public transport facilities and a safer transport network.

"Together we have the power to turn the climate emergency around but it's going to require all of us to make a change in the way we travel, which could be made possible through Journey to Net Zero."
