What Does Your Parish Council Do For You?

I know what you're thinking – 'Not a lot!' And I'd be fibbing if I said that I hadn't thought exactly the same about my District and County Councils when receiving my Council Tax demand – and I spent 25 years working in Local Government. However, I also know that the 'not a lot' statement isn't true and I thought it might be helpful to give a quick overview of the Parish Council's responsibilities.

There are some things the Parish Council must do and quite a lot of things the Council may do. These are set out in lots of different Acts of Parliament, some of which are a couple of hundred years old and some of which have only come into force in the last few years. In the case of Bleadon, some things which the Parish Council is responsible for include:

- Allotments and community polytunnel
- The public toilets, Purn Quarry and 2 laybys
- The church graveyard, walls and church tower clock
- Litter picking and Dog, Grit & Litter bins
- Benches and seating
- 5 Parish Noticeboards and 3 Bus Stops
- Planters at various locations around the Parish
- Defibrillator
- Grass cutting on land owned / controlled by the Council.
- Trustee of Playground, Carpark, Halls & Youth Club land

The Parish Council is also a statutory consultee in relation to any planning applications within the Parish and also has a host of responsibilities as landowner for land and property within its ownership. Like any 'business' it must also comply with a raft of legislation relating to health and safety, employment issues, use of data,

etc. There are also strict rules and regulations regarding the way in which the Council must conduct its business and many will be familiar with the concept of Parish Council meetings. Whilst it's true that these can appear bureaucratic, it is right that there are robust governance arrangements – as the Council is overseeing the spending of your money.

There are some things which the Parish Council isn't responsible for, which are areas which sometimes can be frustrating for residents. In the main, these are issues to do with highways (including footpaths and Public Rights of Way), traffic management and bus services. These are the responsibility of North Somerset Council and North Somerset Council has an on-line process for logging concerns and complaints which can be accessed by using the following link https://n-somerset.gov.uk/council-democracy/complaints-feedback/complaints-about-council-services.

However, just because the Council doesn't have a legal responsibility, doesn't mean that it doesn't have a voice and if there are issues which are potentially concerning or detrimental to the Parish, then the Council can and will use its voice to help parishioners.

Councillors' Public Engagement

As well as listening to residents and volunteering their time to attend monthly council meetings, councillors have also committed to personal training and attending parish, local, district and regional meetings at their own expense.

Recent topics have included planning, finance, Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, Corporate Plan, Biodiversity, Rural Strategy, Local Plan, Avon Local Council's Association, Avon & Somerset Police & Crime Commissioner Councillor Forum, along with Open Spaces, Parish News and Allotment working group meetings.

Public Consultations & Resident Meeting

Councillors also spend time responding to consultations such as North Somerset Council's (NSC) <u>Corporate Plan & Budget Development</u> in October, and its <u>Biodiversity Supplementary Planning Guidance</u> in November. BPC's responses can be found on the website.

NSC's Local Plan 2023 Consultation opens soon with a six week chance to send in your views, with the Rural Strategy Consultation to follow. The resulting policies will have generational consequences for the residents and families of Bleadon, and the environment that we live in. Bleadon Parish Council (BPC) is committed to supporting all residents, groups and businesses within our community, including our farmers that have helped keep Bleadon rural, provided our food security, and offered opportunities to future generations and local businesses since the Bronze Age!

As agreed at the Annual Residents' Meeting in April, BPC will be hosting a **Residents' Meeting on the Local Plan Consultation,** potentially in **December**. This will be an open meeting for everyone to discuss their concerns and share comments with other residents. Following the meeting BPC will take issues raised into consideration when it compiles a community response to North Somerset. As you will all be well aware, fly tipping is a major issue for every community within North Somerset. It causes harm to the environment, is a health hazard.

is unsightly and costs the tax payer money to clear. Every householder has a duty of care to make sure that when they hand over their waste to another person, that waste is going to be disposed of in the correct manner.

Evidence has been found within fly tips in the form of packaging labels, envelopes, etc giving the name and addresses of people who have paid for "the man in a van" to collect their waste expecting it to be legally disposed of. It is an offence for householders to fail to take certain steps to ensure that their waste is correctly disposed of that can ultimately end up with a hefty fine and it is quite evident that not everyone is aware of this.

Annual Governance & Accountability Return (AGAR)

The <u>External Auditor</u> has reported on the 2022-23 AGAR and previous resident requests for investigation, that were upheld for 2020-22.

The Council has responded with a number of positive actions including increased best practice with greater openness, transparency and timely access to information. The Agenda now automatically contains all related non-confidential documentation in the appendices, including background information on decision making and spending on contracts, budgets, trusts, assets and reserves, and working group minutes. Also, increased financial compliance and governance. All available on the BPC website

The External Auditor has also clarified the governance, control and accounting for trust funds and assets held by the Council, stating "The Council holds the play area as a charity (Bleadon Children's Playground (the Trust) – Charity number 304491) of which it is sole trustee with the dayto-day management being undertaken by the Council... The Council is also custodian trustee of the Coronation Hall. The Trust Deed declares that the Council holds the land on trust for the charity. The relevant property is therefore held by the charity and is not an asset of the Council. The Council has informed us that a management agreement (dated 2010) exists for the Coronation Hall, which the Council and the management committee have been following. It incorrectly identified that the Council should be undertaking all external maintenance and meeting the cost of the building's insurance. Whilst it is possible that the Council and the charity can enter into any arrangement that they consider to be in the interests of the charity, any expenditure incurred by the Council is in effect a grant to the charity." The Management Committee operates as a Charity (No. 1042602). The council is also Custodial Trustee for the Youth Club land (with the Youth Club being an independent Charity (No. 304492). BPC owns the Coronation Halls Car Park. BPC's financial information and Assets Register can be found on BPC website on the 'Financial & AGAR' and 'What We Do -Policies' pages.

Parish Council Grants

The Council can and does provide funding to community organisations where there is a proven benefit to parishioners. There are some limits to what the Council can fund, even if it is a really good idea. For instance, it can't fund individuals (and we can only fund organisations which have a bank account in the name of the organisation and are properly constituted) and it can't fund things which don't directly benefit Bleadon parishioners.

There is also a legal limit as to how much the Council can spend on things which are outside of its legal duties and responsibilities. This has the appropriately bureaucratic descriptor of 'Section 137' expenditure and most grant requests would fall within this legal limit. That said, the Council plans to establish a Grant Funding budget for the 2024/5 financial year (which starts on 1st April 2024) and there is also a small amount of funding available in the current year. So if you have a good idea which relates to the themes below, then we would love to hear from you, with proposals which:

- support and promote a 'rural' character
- improve the physical appearance of the Parish
- help make the Parish of Bleadon a happier and safer place to live

We understand that creating a properly constituted organisation can be a daunting task and we're happy to help where we can.

One final thing – if you have a great idea, please talk to us at the start of your journey. Please don't come to us to 'plug a hole' at the end of your journey if your idea is short of funding, as we probably won't then be able to help – and we want to help.

The Asian Hornet – a non-native threat to Bleadon

The Asian Hornet is a predator of honeybees and other pollinators such as bumblebees, hoverflies and halictids. The Asian hornet is native to South East Asia and was likely introduced into Europe by accident in plant pots imported from China. It was discovered in France in 2004 before spreading to the UK. The Asian hornet is not generally aggressive towards people but the venom from its sting, as well as its bite, can cause severe allergic reactions.

The Asian hornet hunts honey bees. Each one can hunt down and eat 30-50 bees per day and their habit of hovering outside the hive stops the bees from collecting nectar and pollen to feed themselves. Pollinators, including honey bees, contribute an estimated £22 billion each year to European agriculture and pollinate over 80% of the continent's crops and wild plants.

So far, the only method proven to slow the spread and reduce environmental impacts is destroying the nests. Asian hornet colonies build two nests over the year, primary nests in the spring/April and secondary nests later. The papery nests are often difficult to spot because hornets build them among the vegetation or high in tree canopies. Most hornet nests are discovered during late autumn when trees have shed their leaves. If uninterrupted Asian hornets can expand their territory at a rate of 60-100km per year, with 70 nests discovered this year.

How to identify an Asian hornet: it is very black, has a wide orange stripe on 4th segment of abdomen and its legs look as if they have been dipped in yellow paint. If you think you've spotted an Asian hornet then please take a picture (carefully) and report via the "Asian Hornet Watch" app or email alertnonnative@ceh.ac.uk. The app has useful identification pictures and more information is available on the British Beekeepers Association website.

A Brief View of an Annual Farming Schedule



Jan/Feb/Mar – getting ready for lambing.

March/Apr - Newborn lambs go out into the field with their ewes. Cattle are turned out after 6 months in the shed, happy to run around again. Drilling with spring crops such as spring barley, maize, pumpkins.

June - Haymaking in the village, silaging (forage grass that's chopped and stored for use as animal feed) and helping local farmers gather in the crops when the weather allows. It's a busy time of year especially when the weather is constantly on the turn but with

some big machinery and plenty of late nights, we can eventually get all of the grass cut and gathered in ready to be fed in the winter.

July/August/September Combining the crops, starting with the winter barley that has been in the longest, followed by the oilseed rape, wheat and spring barley that was sown later in the year. Baling and hauling straw for the cattle and sheep to use in winter.

The type of soil you have dictates the type of vegetables grown. Cereals or grass are sown around the Bleadon area. Vegetables like light free draining soil, but it's mainly heavy clay around here, whereas Taunton is known for its potatoes.

October/November - The sheep and cattle are brought in for the winter. It can be a tense time of year as we never know if we've managed to make enough feed for the winter, it can vary massively with the weather and can become very expensive if additional feed is going to have to be brought in. Harvesting of the maize, ensiling (the forage preservation method above) ready to feed the animals in winter. Preparing and cultivating the ground for the drilling of

winter barley, wheat and oilseed rape. The crops have to be sown when they can, when the conditions are good. The roads may get a bit muddy at this time of year, but it's kept as clean and tidy as respectfully possible.

December/January/February - The daily winter routine of checking on the animals, alongside field maintenance, hedge cutting and, fence mending. The hedges get trimmed every year to help thicken them out making habits for a diverse range of species. It encourages birds to nest, to protect themselves and their young, as well as creating bat corridors. If hedges are left uncut for more than three years, they become woody and open. Muck spreading the land with organic matter starts. This can create a few countryside smells but it helps to minimise artificial fertilizer usage as farming is heavily regulated, with rules not to pollute watercourses.

Land is set aside around some fields to allow wildlife habitat to flourish around the edges, commonly called rewilding, and is only cut once a year. That way the grass margins and hedges remain protected. Farmers need to work with nature and the environment to make sure their animals and crops are well looked after. Farmers also help to maintain Bleadon's rural parish and village aesthetic, as well as cutting verges for of pedestrian safety.

Newsletter Survey Responses

Thank you for the 50 responses received from the last edition's survey. Although not a statistically significant return, it did broadly reflect wider views.

- Q1. How do you currently receive news and updates from Bleadon Parish Council? Select all that apply: The multiple ways residents receive BPC news and updates are via the <u>Parish News</u> (82%), Noticeboards (40%), <u>BPC facebook page</u> (34%) and <u>BPC website</u> (30%).
- **Q2.** Do you read the printed village newsletter that is distributed to houses across Bleadon? 80% read the newsletter, with 16% saying they 'don't get a copy'. BPC is aiming for 100% on this edition so if you, or someone you know didn't receive a copy, please let me know.
- Q3. The printed village newsletter is issued once a quarter. How often would you like to receive it? 84% quarterly, 8% more than every quarter.
- **Q4.** Please check all the topics you currently read in the village newsletter. Select 'other' to make a new suggestion: The top topics were BPC updates (94%), What's on locally/Community News (92%) and Bleadon History (85%).
- Q5. Currently, the Village newsletter costs approximately £6000 of the Parish Council precept with a current income of £2000. How do you think we could save costs? Select all that apply: Apart from advertising, the top three ideas were to reduce paper quality (56%), reduce size to A5 (42%) and to reduce printing quality (38%).
- **Q6.** Would you support the Parish Council in producing a digital E-Newsletter? The majority of respondents agreed (64 %) with 44% saying 'Yes' with 20% said they 'preferred digital with the option to request a hard copy), 18% said 'Maybe' and only 18% said 'No'. A quarterly to six-monthly frequency was preferred (61%).

Rural Bleadon

Bleadon's rural status will become increasingly under threat over the next few years as Weston-super-Mare expands into the second largest settlement after Bristol - as stated by Mike Bell in relation to North Somerset Council's Corporate Plan! So, I thought I'd list just a few of Bleadon's abundant rural attributes that need protecting (See NSC mapping at https://map.n-somerset.gov.uk/dande.html):

- Arable and pastoral farming, and related farm services "There is evidence of agricultural use of the land in the medieval period and probably from at least the Bronze Age" that was 3300 BCE 1200 BCE (Wiki)
- 20 Public Rights of Way including part of the Mendip Way
- Part located in Mendip Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty
- 7 SNCIs (Site of Nature Conservation Interest) including Hellenge Hill to Loxton Wood, South Hill, Bleadon Hill fields, Purn Hill, part Bleadon levels
- 4 wildlife sites Avon Wildlife Trust on Hellenge Hill and Purn Hill, Wessex and AWT Walborough Reserves on the Bleadon Levels
- 4 SSSIs (Site of Special Scientific Interest) On the Bleadon Levels, Purn Hill, off Roman Road and Shiplate Slait
- 5 listed buildings & monuments (Purn House Farmhouse, Bleadon Church, Village Cross and Well, Hillside Farmhouse)
- 1 regionally important geographical site Purn Quarry
- 1 scheduled monument a bowl barrow on Shiplate Slait
- A Natural England Ancient Woodland Shiplate Wood
- Several TPOs (Tree Preservation Orders)
- Environment Agency (Water) Source Protection Area
- Bat SAC (Special Area of Conservation)

Some current North Somerset Council policy <u>consultations</u>, as seen on their website, will affect Bleadon's rural status up until 2038 and beyond, so please take the time to attend any Bleadon public meetings (e.g. Local Plan in Dec/Jan) and respond to consultations to help protect Bleadon's rural status and community way of life - **Cllr Jo Gower-Crane** (Climate & Biodiversity)

Churchyard

BPC is responsible for the maintenance of the churchyard and its retaining walls. A meeting has been held with the rector and several suggestions and ideas are to be put before the Parochial Church Commission regarding the full maintenance of the churchyard.

Currently the council ensures that the grass is cut and mulched 20 times throughout the year, using a mulching mower, that keeps debris to a minimum and helps put moisture back into the soil. An all-year-round wildlife corridor for wildlife and plants is located by the Bier House behind the church. This is maintained by the church and is trimmed by hand by volunteers, to cause minimum disturbance.

So ... What Next for Bleadon Parish Council?

So, now you're probably thinking "But what are you actually going to do for Bleadon?"

A fair question and whilst it may not be obvious, we have been busy and the early results of our work should start to become visible as the Autumn progresses. What follows are a few examples:

- The pathway outside the front of the Coronation Halls is being resurfaced, with lighting and better access for those with mobility problems.
- A number of streetlights will be replaced.
- The Jubilee Gardens and Pea Green planting areas are to be tidied up and emptied to allow for walls to be structurally checked and with a view to replanting next year.

Of course, not all we have been doing involves physical work and we have also had to devote quite a lot of time to some of our processes and the way in which we conduct our business. We've also had to spend some time changing arrangements in relation to our allotments in readiness for the new allotment year (which starts in October of each year). We know that this hasn't been an easy time for many of our allotment holders and we thank them for their patience and forbearance.

We also shouldn't forget that the very thing you are now reading has required a lot of work from all involved as we move to a format and approach which will save the Council at least £1,600 per year.

However, we are not stopping there. We have also been spending time thinking about priorities for the next 3 years and how this relates to the funding we have available and, crucially, how this relates to future Council precepts. More detail will be available as the budget process develops.

Planning Overview

Bleadon Parish stretches from the Bleadon Levels near Brean in the West to Loxton in the East, and from Hutton and Canada Coombe in the North to the Somerset border in the South. According to the 2021 Census Bleadon has 540 households. Roughly two-thirds of those, 350, are within the Village Settlement Boundary (see the back cover illustration of the Parish News for a boundary map). All Planning applications can be found on the North Somerset Council website.

Quarry Development Update




Bleadon is now in the process of increasing its housing by 8%, by building an additional 42 dwellings on the former Marshalls Quarry site. This development aims to house up to 189 new residents, with a possible 13 affordable houses, along with a number of employment buildings. However, before that can be completed, we appreciate that residents are undergoing a difficult time with noise and vibration disturbances, especially those closest to the development work.

With residents, Bleadon Parish Council has been discussing with the developers a number of measures to try and mitigate these disruptions including quiet days, acoustic fencing and the use of different tools. Other issues being discussed include access along Mulberry Lane, public open space and the street name for the development, with a final

decision on the naming resting with North Somerset Council. We will keep you posted.

It is worth noting that there will also be some wider benefits to the Parish arising from the development. For example, in the Spring of next year, the developer will undertake a series of upgrades to the public right of way (PROW) running from the village centre to Southridge Heights. The image below shows the extent of the public right of way in question.

The Council will also be able to access funds through a scheme known as the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL). There are some restrictions regarding the use of these funds, but - as part of its wider budget setting process the Council would welcome areas for consideration.

Playground Trust (Charity No. 304491)

Bleadon Parish Council is the Trustee of the parish playground, located outside the Coronation Halls. It owns the land and the playground equipment and is responsible for its maintenance, and health and safety issues. It has an allocated budget and any expenditure can be found in the monthly agenda appendices, relating to finance. For 2023/24 a budget of £2,300 was allocated, with £1,500 for general maintenance, £500 for equipment and £300 for the year's inspections.

Following a post implementation inspection, parts of the new wooden equipment were temporarily put out of action. The ropes have been replaced and additional repairs undertaken at a cost of £200. The broken rocker was also repaired at a cost of £525. The grass is cut every two weeks from April to October. The sycamore overhanging the carpark and picnic table were also pruned.

Budget and Precept Setting

In November councillors started reviewing its projects, finances and reserves, as part of its budget setting process for 2024. Please let us know of any project, grant, or associated financial requirements you feel that we should consider, ideally before 11th December for full council. This financial process must be finished by January 2024.

The precept (Bleadon tax) is calculated as part of the parish council's budget, to fund its administration, duties, responsibilities and the activities it wants to undertake on behalf of residents. The precept fills the gap between the parish council's planned expenditure and its estimated income. BPC's inherited planned spend for 2023/24 was £85,454. This includes the precept (£64,653) and other income/use of reserves. The amount you pay as a resident can be found on your North Somerset Council Tax bill. BPC financial information can be found under 'Financial & AGAR' on the BPC website.
