Chairman's Report - 2010/11

At the Annual Parish Meeting held in the Coronation Hall on 11 April the Parish Council Chairman gave this report to the assembled parishioners.

My report is fairly brief – more in depth information may be found on the Village website (and the following pages). All Parish Councils go through peaks and troughs. Luckily Bleadon Parish Council seems to be permanently on a small peak. As you will have realised, we have regained **Quality Council** status – a great asset in the scheme of things, especially a smaller Parish Council like ours.

We have kept the **precept** as low as possible with only minor adjustments. We must allow that in the future, in the current climate, there will be more for us to fund.

The **Coronation Hall**, one of the stars of the show, is a very successful, well managed and vibrant village hall. Although the buildings are held in trust by the Parish Council on behalf of us all, the daily management and running of the facility is entrusted to the Hall Management Committee, and is separate from the Parish Council itself.

The **play park** has an excellent reputation with all the families who constantly use it. If finances allow, there will be new equipment in this area over the coming year.

A new **Ranger** is to be appointed; one of the main duties of a Ranger is keeping the village to the high standard that we have all come to accept. We too must be diligent with litter picking and not walk past that dropped crisp packet! The dog bins are now being emptied weekly.

Turning to **Planning**, reforms are ongoing and regulations being

revised. The Parish Council has had 29 site visits, more than ever over the past 12 months. All our recommendations have been endorsed by North Somerset; there were two appeals. The **allotment** holders after a long hard winter are to be congratulated as the whole area is bursting with new growth. We have a waiting list of six.

Our community policeman has a surgery every Tuesday afternoon in the Church Rooms. We shall continue to recommend the **policing priorities** that we have set out. We thank Steve Church and Emma Wright for their services to the village.

Potholes are the bain of everybody's life. However, our potholes are marked up and North Somerset advise us that both Shiplate Road and Bleadon Road will be resurfaced in the new financial year. The road markings at Bleadon Mill will be repainted and "keep clear" markings introduced on the bend of Shiplate and Bleadon Road.

The **Youth Club** has a new Chairman, Keith Pyke. We are very grateful for the continuing support and commitment from North Somerset for this essential service for the youth of our village. The Parish Council will continue to help with funding for this thriving club, which is amongst the best attended in North Somerset.

The new waste collections have caused some problems, largely due to the winter weather, but the Parish Council has been aware of this and has constantly informed North Somerset of any difficulties.



Wessex Water are upgrading and developing the existing sewage treatment works on the levels just within our boundary. We have a written undertaking that they will carry out any remedial repairs to the surface of Accommodation Road during this construction work. We have asked North Somerset Highways to consider a traffic control system at the A370 junction during this work.

Two **plant-ups** are planned this season, in red white and blue of course, just before Easter and for the grand village Royal Wedding party on 29th April. Many villagers talk fondly of past village celebrations. This I know will equal any from the past and be enjoyable and memorable for us all. The second plant up is Saturday, 14th May – volunteers are always welcome.

A huge heart felt welcome to **Hillcote**. After the boundary review, Hillcote is now included within the Bleadon Parish Council boundary. A later review will renew the ward *Hutton and Locking* to **Bleadon**, **Hutton and Locking**.

The Parish Council embraces progress and will continue the democratic process and decision making for our community. We are glad of your support and encouragement and will continue to work hard on your behalf.

Remember, I care as much as you do – Thank you.

Annual report

Democracy

Successive governments have expressed their wishes to involve the public in the democratic process and decision making. They also have recognised that parish councillors usually live and / or work within the communities they serve and so are highly visible and in touch with the wants, needs and aspirations of the people they represent. As a Quality Status Parish Council we felt it would be both helpful and responsible to appoint a 'Democracy Champion'.

In representing people's wants, needs and aspirations, the Council has participated in relevant consultation, so hopefully reflecting the wishes of residents. In this past year we have submitted comments and suggestions on the following:

- North Somerset Council Core Strategy of the Local Development Framework
- North Somerset Council Housing Settlement Strategy
- North Somerset Partnership –
 Older People's Strategy 2011 –
 2016
- North Somerset Council Draft Housing Strategy

Last year we made a submission to the Community Governance Review in response to the request by the residents of Hillcote to be included in the parish boundaries of Bleadon. We were successful and so as from April 2011 Hillcote residents are 'Villagers'.

Another Review is planned and we will endeavour to pursue our proposal for the District Council ward to be renamed 'Bleadon, Hutton and Locking', a change from the present 'Hutton and Locking'.

We were encouraged that several villagers asked to address our monthly parish meeting – some of the areas of concerns they raised were the need of pruning/pollarding overgrown trees, duties of the Village Ranger, parking problems and the need for more grit bins.

As parish councillors, we try to make ourselves freely accessible to all residents by being around the village and posting our contact details in the quarterly Village News. These details are also available on the Council's website including access by e-mail. The Parish Council meets monthly and details are posted on local notice boards and the public are both invited and welcome to attend. Bleadon Parish Council welcomes your views, complaints, and compliments. We actively seek to hear your suggestions, ideas, wishes and wants.

Youth Centre

The **Youth Club leaders** report that attendance at the Thursday Club is regularly a healthy 23 or so youngsters. That's good news for a thriving club and puts us amongst the best attended in North Somerset. Overall registered membership at the club is 21 females and 33 males (on 13 January).

The young people now run the tuck shop themselves, allowing the three leaders to concentrate on working with the young people. Organised activities have included multi-sport coaching, ice skating, street dancing and lots of cooking. Made possible by the regular funding for programmed activities now provided by the Management Committee.

North Somerset Council Youth Service provides the funding for the three Youth Leaders who regularly attend the Thursday evening club session. The forthcoming budget cuts may well mean a reduction in the service and funding currently provided by NSC.

Whilst the club is, thankfully, assured of NSC funding for the current financial year there is little doubt that over the next few years we will experience robust repositioning and targeting of the Youth Service provided by NSC.

Bleadon Parish Council continues to support the Youth Centre and has granted £500 towards new equipment and £150 towards electricity.

The building is approaching 50 years old and is showing signs of its age. The Management Committee is investigating the possibility of replacing the dilapidated suspended ceiling in the main hall with a new plasterboard ceiling. This would also allow them to install modern efficient lighting and insulation. With an estimated cost of £8000+ the Management Committee are looking at grant funding opportunities.

I take this opportunity to thank the volunteers on the management committee for the time and work they put into helping to ensure that the Youth Centre remains a thriving and welcoming space for our young people.

Open Spaces

The **Play Area** continues to be well used and remains a popular and safe place for youngsters and families.

The regular safety checks by the Ranger and RoSPA have identified some corrosion on the climbing frame and the swings which may give us cause for concern in the future. We are looking at replacing this equipment in the near future and maybe linking it to the climbing and slide equipment we installed 20 months ago.

This may also help to alleviate the recurring problem of ground erosion from young footballers using the climbing frame as goalposts.

Unfortunately, we've lost two of our trees in the Play Area over the last 12 months. An Oak which has been in for ten years, and the more recently planted Whitebeam. Once we know where the new replacement play equipment is to be located we will look to replace the two trees in a more suitable location.

We replaced several of the old **oak tubs** around the village last May. Thanks to all the volunteers who turn up twice a year to **help plant up** our village tubs.

Annual report

The little green beside the Youth Centre is proving to be a useful space for community events like the May Fayre and Scarecrow Fest. Now blessed with the added bonus of our first **History interpretation panel**. Fully illustrated and packed with historical tit-bits about our parish.

Churchyard

As usual there has been the need for the routine remedial work around the churchyard, the cutting back of the undergrowth and the general trimming and tidying.

The Parish Council continues to receive an annual grant from the War Graves Commission towards the upkeep of the military graves within our churchyard. We feel it is our privileged to carry out this work.

Pruning and pollarding has been carried on the lime trees along the south wall and steps are presently being undertaking to investigate the crack that has appeared on the Mulberry Lane side of the South wall.

Marshalls kindly donated a large amount of gravel chippings which John Hurcombe and our Village Ranger distributed across many of the older graves where the gravel had long disappeared. It certainly improved the look of the churchyard and we hope pleased surviving relatives.

We continue to give the Parochial Church Council the sum of £100 towards the maintenance of the church clock and £150 towards the cost of the external lighting.

'The Case of the Dripping Tap' – over the past year Wessex Water, local tradesmen and the Village Ranger have pitted their wits in solving the mystery of the dripping tap. We are now pleased to say that it appears to have been solved, so fingers crossed.

We offer our thanks to Mark Howe and his team for their work in maintaining the grassy areas.

Our sincere thanks to those who when walking through the churchyard take the trouble to pick up the litter, remove dead flowers,

stand up overturned pots and vases and other general tidying up tasks. It is both noticed and appreciated.

Transport

We have been fortunate that our bus service has not been hit by the North Somerset funding cuts. The little green bus ploughs back and forth to Weston hourly and the operators should be congratulated for the service they provided during the year end bad weather and in spite of the un-gritted roads!

The service is convenient and easy to use for shopping trips to Weston and it saddens me to see it being under used and empty buses travelling along the road. If you haven't tried the bus please do...if we don't use it we may lose it!

Roads

After a harsh winter our roads like others across the country are quite badly potholed. Fortunately help is at hand! Residents will see that North Somerset has now numbered all our potholes. This is a good sign and we have been told that Shiplate Road and the A370 Bridgwater Road are in line for significant patching repair and surface dressing hopefully, soon. We have also been advised that Bleadon Road will be patched and surface dressed as part of the ongoing road repair programme.

Coronation Hall



The Independent Examiner, Shirley Campbell, has examined the accounts for the year ended 28 February 2011 and she has confirmed that these have been correctly maintained and there is no matter which gives her cause for concern.

The salient points from the Hall accounts are as follows:

(Figures in brackets are those of the previous year for comparative purposes)

2010/2011

Income £16,205 (20,544) Expenditure £13,870 (16,768) Net Surplus £2,335 (3,744)

Net Assets £40,337 (38,002)

Total Income comprises Hall and Table Hire £14,226 (£14,956), Fund Raising Events £1754 (£2,159), Guides and Brownies Contribution £120 (£120), Deposit Interest £85 (£85) and Donations £20 (£3,224).

The main income has been from hiring the Hall with income some 9% down compared with last year although this was offset by an increase of 14% in market table hire. We have seen another year of successful Village Markets for which credit must again go to the many volunteers who assist on these occasions.

I would now like to explain the reason for the significant drop in donations during the past year and hence the apparent drop of around 10% in our Total Income. The sale of Peter Lindsay's Village Maps continues and we are grateful to him for his continued support. However, the major reduction in donations is because Hall insurance is being managed in a different way. Previously, one insurance policy covered Buildings and Contents and this was written in the name of the Hall Committee. The Parish Council then contributed an amount equivalent to the Buildings element of the policy by way of donation. Following professional advice, that arrangement was cancelled and two separate policies created – one for the Buildings in the name of the Parish Council as legal owner and the other for the Contents in the name of the Hall Committee. As a result, the donation from the Parish Council for this item, which last year amounted to £2,464, has ceased.

Annual report (cont)

The Total Expenditure of £13,870 (£16,800) covers all aspects of maintaining and running the Coronation Hall and Jubilee Room which includes heating and lighting, water and sewerage, insurance, licences, cleaning, general repairs and improvements. Energy costs remain a concern but steps have been taken to reduce these as much as possible.

Major items of expenditure were:

Gas/Electricity £2,037 (£2,848) Cleaning £2,576 (£2,743) Insurance £434 (£2,898)*

*see explanation above

General Maintenance £428 (£679) Hall Improvements £5,106 (£3,868)

The following Hall improvements were completed during the year to address rising energy costs:

- Replacement of two unreliable gas heaters with two new Drugasar gas units in the Coronation Hall
- Installation of cavity wall insulation in both Halls

 Additional loft insulation in the Jubilee Room

The Coronation Hall and Jubilee Room continue to be popular village venues that are now used by a wide range of people in the community for family events, group meetings, craft meetings, exercise classes, dancing and so on. This all demands continuing investment and I am pleased to report that we have again been able to increase our overall assets to £42,110 (£40,335) which includes deposits of £658 (£658) at the Nationwide Building Society and £36,353 (£33,768) at the Coventry Building Society. After taking into account our current liabilities, the Net Current Assets amount to £40,337 (£38,002).

One issue of concern is the continuing very poor rate of interest we are receiving on our bank deposits which is currently a miserly 0.25%. However, we have to bear in mind the restrictions that are placed upon us regarding the security of investments which is limiting our

flexibility. Nevertheless, it is something which we should keep under constant review to enable us to maximise the interest whenever possible.

Following legal advice obtained last year from Hall, Ward & Fox, I can confirm that the recommended Protocol was agreed with the Parish Council and signed on their behalf on 12 April 2010 by Penny Skelley (Chairman of the Parish Council) and by Len Chamberlain (Chairman of Bleadon Coronation Hall Management Committee). This legal document now supplements our Governing Document, the Trust Deed of 14 January 1938, to which it should be attached and read in conjunction with it.

This has been another successful year for the Coronation Hall and I would like to thank all members of the Management Committee for their help and support.

Tree warden wanted for Bleadon

The tree warden scheme helps people to look after their local trees and woods. It is run nationally by the Tree Council charity and co-ordinated locally in North Somerset by a management committee, which includes North Somerset Council's tree officers.

Tree wardens are volunteers who are passionate about trees, their local environment and local community. Tree wardens are supported by the committee, and will be provided with advice and guidance, information and training.

The tree warden will:

- be the eyes and ears for Bleadon's trees;
- play an active role in protecting and improving our local trees;
- report to the parish council;
- provide a link with North Somerset Council tree officers;
- engage their local community, neighbours, and other groups to plant and care for trees;
- work in whatever way they choose, and fit the work they do within their abilities and around their other commitments;
- not need to be an expert as they will be provided with support and training;
- need to be passionate about trees, their local environment and local community.

Trees are a precious part of Bleadon's natural heritage and landscape. If future generations are to enjoy their beauty and variety we must care for those we have and find ways to plant more. Bleadon has everything to gain from protecting and improving our surroundings, and a tree warden can help make this happen.

Work starts on Roman Road dry-stone walling

The parish council set aside funds last year to enable the rebuilding of the collapsed dry-stone wall opposite the lay-bye on Roman Road.

Until recently the work of restoring our Mendip walls has been undertaken by the West Mendip AONB and much of the work had been done. Sadly, severe cutbacks in funding of the AONB means that there remains a 60metre length of unrestored wall opposite the lower (George Wall) lay-bye/viewpoint on Roman Road.

Tina Bath kindly offered the council her help in completing the work which she had started when employed by the AONB. With help from Avon Wildlife Trust volunteers, ex Mendip Ranger Andy Eddy and the services of stonewalling professional Phil Smith it is hoped that the work can be completed over the next six weeks. Our thanks to all the volunteers involved, and to local Roman Road resident Terry Vincent for his assistance in moving the piles of stone needed.



Road dosures planned for pot hole repairs and road resurfacing

Drivers and cyclists have spent the first half of this year trying to avoid the many potholes on Shiplate Road and throughout the village marked up earlier this year by North Somerset Council.

We welcome the good news that these are scheduled to be **repaired** in July. We have received notification of road closures with effect from 6 July.

We don't have specific dates but it looks like Bleadon Road and Coronation Road will be closed for three days followed by **Shiplate** Road for four days. Traffic diversions will be put in place.



Thanks to those villagers who helped plant up our village tubs with right royal colour in April and May.

In preparation for the Bleadon Royal Do a team from the Bleadon WI turned out in April to help plant up the tubs around the Coronation car park and youth centre. Despite having many other things to do in preparation for the big party they still found time to help plant our flowers.

In May the usual green-fingered band of volunteers planted out the remaining tubs throughout the rest of the village.

Thanks too, to the merry band of communityminded folk who cleared the rubbish and weeds from around the Coronation Hall.

Parking problems persist

Inconsiderate parking continues to be a problem on roads through the village. The police treat this as one of the parish council's policing priorities and are taking action against offenders.

In the meantime we ask all road users to park considerately. Please make use of the FREE parking provided in the Coronation car park.

Bus service 83 to the Veale to stop on 25 July

We are saddened and dissappointed to hear that the already limited bus service to the Veale is to be stopped entirely in late July.

This means that villagers in Shiplate Road and the Veale will need to walk down to the new Coronation Road bus shelter to catch the hourly bus to and from Weston.

Since the 83 bus bus service is heavily reliant on funding support from the District Council we sought clarification of what is happening.

Village News has obtained the following explanation from North Somerset Council.

"I regret that the route of the bus service 83 has been revised in Bleadon village and will no longer serve The Veale, the remainder of the route remains unchanged in the village. The change takes place from 25th July, and I apologise that you have been contacted by residents regarding this before we discussed the details with you (Bleadon Parish Council). I believe that some bus drivers have passed information on to passengers rather sooner than we had intended.

There are several reasons why the route has been revised which are as follows, the bus service 83 has not been keeping to time and has often been running late which could result in the bus operator being fined by the Traffic Commissioner. This is something we cannot allow to happen on a supported bus service, as the operator is running the timetable supplied to them with the Council contract. It takes time serving The Veale and surveys have shown low usage on this part of the route. The most important factor however is the need for the bus to

undertake the reversing and turning manoeuvre at the end of the village. This is something which should not be undertaken when operating a public service vehicle with passengers on board in service. Drivers being instructed in public service vehicle operation are instructed not to do this.

The bus operator has complained on many occasions that with the size of vehicles this is dangerous and they should not be undertaking this, and with speeding traffic there is an accident waiting to happen. In light of this we felt we had no real options other then to make this route change.

I appreciate that the bus has served this area for many years, but prior to the Webber Bus contract the vehicle sizes were smaller, and regulations and safety concerns have tightened in recent years. I understand that First Bus would no longer entertain this (reversing procedure) on any scheduled bus services they operate."

Editor's note

For many years bus drivers and NSC staff have expressed concerns about buses turning around on the Veale route. We used to have a similar problem at the Purn stop when the bus used to turn round there. Indeed, I saw one of our residents knocked down by a reversing bus there a few years ago.

In the past NSC has chosen to overlook these safety issues in order to maintain the service. Webber Bus are no longer allowing North Somerset to ignore the issue.

Parish council not giving up

One of the aims of the Bleadon Parish Plan is to see an improved bus service to the Veale. The parish council will be talking to North Somerset Council to try and find a solution that will allow a service to the Veale to continue. We will try to find alternative solutions to the problems of caused by the timetable and turning the bus.

Wednesday bus service continues from the Veale to Weston and back

It can't make up for the regular weekday bus service we have enjoyed from the Veale, but this once weekly service into Weston on a Wednesday morning may help those who can't make it down to the Coronation Road bus stop.

Wednesdays only (Coombs Travel) **09.46 from the Veale** - arrives Weston,
High Street at 10.01

Returns at:

13.28 from Regent Street Tesco, Stop EE **13.30 from High Street**, Weston arrives back at The Veale, Bleadon at 13.45

This offers the opportunity for villagers to enjoy over three hours in Weston for shopping and refreshment. With the added bonus of a pick up right outside Tesco.

Clock work

It won't have gone un-noticed that the church tower clock has recently stopped working.

Attempts to get it ticking along properly have had only temporary

success. It seems that only a radical dismantling of the clock will reveal the cause of the problem.

This will require removal of the clockface from the outside of the tower and extraction of the clock works. At the moment the most economic solution appears to be for technicians to absail down the tower to remove the clockface. Other options include scaffolding or a cherry-picker, but these look to be more expensive.

The Parochial Church Council and the Parish Council will be working together to raise the very considerable funds for the repairs. In the meantime we are stuck at a perpetual 6.27.

Villagers say NO to development on Sanders' field

Village Consultation May 28th 2011

Following discussion last year with the Parish Council to consider how the Sanders land in the centre of Bleadon might be best developed, Chris and Mike Sanders invited everyone who lives in Bleadon to give them their views on a scheme to create a village green along with new leisure facilities funded by housing built towards the Bridgwater Road end of the field.

Participants were asked to indicate their views on the statements below:

If the proposed scheme is built, the multi-purpose village hall, sports field and facilities would be gifted to the villagers of Bleadon for their use and for the use of future generations.

In all a total of 283 consultation forms were filled in.

Whilst there is a clear element of support for a village green and new sports facilities/playing fields for the village, it is clear that the scheme presented has not won popular support, so Chris and Mike will pursue it no further.

Around 300 villagers visited the Coronation Hall to view Mike and Chris Sanders' proposals for development of their field alongside Bridge Road.

Stirred up by some mischievious and misleading flyposting and leaflet drops throughout the village it was clear before the event that feelings over the proposed new homes and recreation facilities were running high.

Sadly, most visitors seemed to have made up their minds before seeing what was on offer. Despite the temptations of new recreation, health and community facilities those opinions couldn't be swayed.











Some tough challenges ahead

There will be some difficult and expensive decisions ahead for the volunteers that manage our village halls and youth centre.

Both the Coronation Halls and the Youth Centre need some serious upgrading and improvement if they are to continue to offer quality facilities. The rejection by many residents of the Sanders' proposals for new community facilities will mean that the management committees of these village assets now need to focus on a viable way forward. Both organisations are clear about what they want and need to achieve The challenge is in finding the

what they want and need to achieve. The challenge is in finding the funding to pay for the badly needed improvements to the structure of all three buildings.

Whilst the Coronation Halls have the benefit of substantial funds in reserve, the cost of improvements is likely to be many times more than is currently available.

The Youth Centre is in a far less comfortable position and will have to work very hard to raise the necessary funds. No doubt a lot of grant application forms lie ahead!

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



Prior to 1981 the bells had not been rung for many years and it is the present band's sincere hope this can be avoided again. Once the bells stop ringing it is very difficult to get them going again.

If you have ever thought you would like to find out more about bellringing – this is your chance.

Anyone of any age can learn provided they can reach the rope. Don't be put off because you think you are too old – if you can scale the spiral staircase to the ringing chamber, you will certainly be able to ring.

So on 17 July during the cream tea at *Rookery Nook* the bells will be ringing to mark the 300th anniversary. The tower door will be open, and the Ringers will be pleased to welcome anyone who wishes to see how we ring, and perhaps consider joining us, so that this truly English Village sound can continue here in Bleadon.

Pulling Sally in the church tower

The bells of Bleadon's Parish Church are about to celebrate their 300th anniversary. In celebration of this historic event the Village News went to meet Peter Maffey, to discover some background and find out

more about our bells and their ringers.

Peter was waiting for me at the bottom of the tower. We climbed the 39 stone steps as they spiralled tightly up to the ringing room and then paused to get our breath back.

Tell us a little bit about you, Jill and bellringing.

When did you move to Bleadon? We moved to Bleadon from Hampshire in June 1972. We both have childhood connections with Somerset. So it was rather like coming home.

How long have you been involved with the bellringing here? Since 1981, then Tower Captain from 1984. The bells had been silent for around 20 years and a move was afoot to ring them again. Somebody got to know that Jill had been a bell ringer and she was keen to take it up again after a break of 10 years, so, if you can't beat them join them is what I did

What's involved in being a bellringer?


Do you have to be musical? - No. But a good sense of rhythm can help.

Do you need to be strong and fit? - If you can mount the 39 steps of the spiral staircase and reach the rope you can ring.

How much time does it take up? - A ringer will normally attend an evening practice once a week and ring for Sunday Services, special feasts and weddings. It requires a certain amount of commitment to the tower, but this is insignificant compared with the enjoyment and friendship to be found.

How many people are in the team? - Six usually, but we need to recruit more ringers right now.





How long before a beginner reaches a suitable standard to participate?

Campanology is a peculiarly British activity that has been developed over the past three to four hundred years. It can take

anything from two to six months to learn to handle a bell rope competently and a lifetime to master the intricacies of the mathematical patterns which make up the sound of a peal of bells.



How many? There are six bells

Presumably, each carries a different note - Normally tuned to the Tenor, here at Bleadon in G. Tuning each bell used to be done haphazardly at the casting stage by chipping a piece off the bell from the rim until the correct note was achieved. Now of course, tuning is done electronically and with precision machining equipment when the bell is cast.


What are they made of and how heavy is each bell? - 77% copper 23% tin. Tenor the (6th) heaviest at 10 cwt the others are lighter.

Are all six bells 300 years old? - only five bells are that old - the 2^{nd} to 6^{th} . The Treble was added in 1925

Would there have been bells when the tower first went up around

1400? - No. The oakframe has a date of 1627 carved on a 'King' post. But there may have been four bells before 1711 as there are four old unused rope holes in the ringing room ceiling.

Have they rung regularly since they went in? - I don't know, but quite possibly because local farming and



How do you maintain them? - Now the bells are on ball bearings. Just requiring routine checks and periodic checks by a Professional bellhanger.



The tower of SS. Peter and Paul is set against the backdrop of the Mendip Hills. Forming a highly visible landmark in the centre of the village. Built during the best and most magnificent period of English church architecture: it carries the stamp of the Perpendicular Gothic style. Although the oldest part of the church was dedicated in 1317, the tower was raised a little later - in about 1400.

Towers in Somerset tend to belong to geographical groups. Bleadon's tower is typical of the West Mendip group. Features include the quatre-foil parapet, the three window sound outlet and the turret staircase, surmounted by a spirelet.
