

It is difficult to say whether the Covid situation is better or worse than when I wrote my letter for the last issue but at least Village activities are back in operation and we are looking forward to the Village Christmas Market and of course to a nearly normal Christmas.

Looking forward to 2022, the main village activity will be our Jubilee celebrations in the first week of June. As you already know we have begun our planning for this with the Parish Council's plans to re-gild your village clock.

It was last done 60 years ago and badly needs attention. Many newcomers may not realise that although housed on the church tower the clock belongs to you the villagers which is why the Parish Council has chosen to help fund this as their contribution to the Jubilee Celebrations. At the moment we are also thinking about:

- The Bleadon Players are also being invited to take one evening in the hall for a very village based entertainment.
- The Horticultural Society will be organising a Flower Festival/show/ Competition housed in the church and we are hoping that the Art group might also be

able to organise an exhibition of their work.

Bleadon in Bloom will be decorating the village - their chosen theme is Trooping the Colour.

We are also hoping that the WI, the Brownies and the Youth Club and anybody else from the village who would like to join in the organising of the celebrations will come up with their own ideas on what they could contribute.

To this end there will be a village meeting in the Coronation Hall on Monday 17 January at 7.30pm.

All the above groups are invited to send a representative to this meeting in order to begin to finalise arrangements. Individuals with ideas for the celebrations will be warmly welcomed.

The idea is that the next edition of this magazine will be able to update you all with more information.

So, I hope the village will be busy and enjoy the celebrations next June. In the meantime do have a lovely Happy Christmas.

The parish council has now been able to fill the last council vacancy with Sara Garrett having volunteered to become a councillor and then duly elected at the October council meeting.

As she was required she completed the statutory Declaration of Office at the said meeting and subsequently completed the legal Register of Interest.

Speaking of electing councillors next May will see the four yearly cycle come around again. Hopefully the community of Bleadon will be able exercise their democratic right and indeed actually have an election.

Since the fatal motor bike accident at the junction of Bleadon Road and Bridgwater Road the Parish Council has been lobbying North Somerset Highways and its two district council representatives

to lower the speed limit on the A370. Some proposals in concert with Somerset County Highways have now been set in a road order.

The parish council is of the view that the proposals being suggested do not go far enough and has written in strong terms for the current proposals to be reconsider.


Here is to wishing you all a very Happy Christmas and a peaceful 2022.

Budget proposals for the year 2022/2023 are fast approaching whereby the council will initially consider a draft budget culminating in February with the fixing of the budget and thereafter the Precept. Last year a deficit budget was adopted with any deficit difference in the final analysis being supported by reserves.

While the final figures are not known as yet it will be interesting to see at what level the final budget is agreed and ultimately at what level the resulting reserves will be. Over the past few months a group of councillors formed a working party to examine closely how the council might administer received planning applications from North Somerset.

This group have as a result produced a substantial planning protocol initially written by Cllr Ann Davies and overseen by Cllr I D Clarke. On the understanding that it will be formally approved in December and will then be termed as the Parish Council Planning Policy.

Little by little I am hearing news about a wide variety of planned Christmas activities which is always an exciting time more so following the Covid-19 challenges. So here is wishing you all a very Happy Christmas and more importantly a peaceful 2022.

Bleadon Sugarcraft Club was first opened in 2005 and is great for anyone wanting to get creative with sugar.


Our next meeting is at Bleadon Coronation Hall on Thursday 27 January, arrive at 7pm for a 7.30pm start.

Proposal made to reduce A370 speed limit

he Bleadon community have been airing their concerns on the speed limits on the A370 for a good many years. There have been meetings over the years where villagers could consult on the road and until now nothing has happened.

North Somerset Council has issued the following notice of intent to reduce the existing speed limits through the village by 10mph, joining with Somerset who will be doing the same through Lympsham.

NOTICE OF INTENT

Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984

North Somerset Council A370 Bridgwater Road, Bleadon, North Somerset 50mph and 40 mph Speed Limit Order way bridge where the 40mph limit starts is about a mile. 2021

Ref: DB/A370BRSL/2021

Notice is hereby given that The Council of North Somerset (hereinafter referred to as "the Council") in exercise of its powers under sections 84 and Part IV of Schedule 9 to the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 as amended (hereinafter referred to as "the Act of 1984") and of all other enabling powers, the effect of which will be:

- To restrict any vehicle exceeding 40 mph on the lengths of road specified in Schedule 1 to this no-
- 2. To restrict any vehicle exceeding 50 mph on the lengths of road specified in Schedule 2 to this notice.

SCHEDULE 1

A370 Bridgwater Road

From a point 266 metres north-west of its junction with wishing to cross at or near Bridge Road. Some want to Accommodation Road in a south-easterly direction for a catch the 20 bus into Weston, others to walk the footpath distance measured along the said length of road of ap- along the Axe, which is a deservedly popular local ameniproximately 600 metres.

SCHEDULE 2

A370 Bridgwater Road

From the southern boundary with Somerset County Council in a generally north western direction for a distance of approximately 788 metres.

From a point 266 metre north-west of its junction with Accommodation Road in a northerly direction for approximately 770 metres.

The notice of intent was issued on the 21 October

and villagers were given until the 12 November to make their observations and/or objections on the notice.

Through the power of social media, while villagers welcomed a reduction in speed, a number aired their view that the entire stretch of the A370 through our village should be kept at a constant 40mph in the interests of safety for all that use the road.

Bleadon resident Les Masters commented: "I am pleased to see our council is at last going to reduce speed limits on the A370, but I think a more radical approach is needed.

"I write as a Bleadon resident for 34 years, having used that road as a driver, cyclist and pedestrian countless times. Having delivered the village newspapers for 13 of those years, I can assure you I have a very detailed knowledge of the area. I can also do arithmetic.

"From Bleadon Bridge to the point just over the rail-As a driver and tax payer, I find it ridiculous and irritating to have more than one speed limit in such a short distance. Common sense, economy and safety all point to a limit of 40mph throughout.

"Let me demolish straight away the predictable cry of increased journey times; the difference is less than 20 seconds.

"The gains in safety would benefit so many Bleadon people. Consider the entries to and exits from Bridge Road, Bleadon Mill, South Hill Farm, Bleadon Road, Accommodation Road, Riverside Village, The Anchor, Hutton Garage and about twenty private dwellings.


"For far too long, the people of Bleadon have had their lives made more difficult by drivers from elsewhere who almost certainly do not realise how little time they are saving.

"The benefit would be even greater for pedestrians ty. Some are elderly, some are accompanied by children or dogs, but all need to be able to move fast.

"At my age I have had to give up the attempt. Again, there is no good reason why Bleadon residents should be put at risk or inconvenienced in this way, and I have a strong feeling that most of them would support my arguments."

We shall wait and see what the outcome of our observations made are, and hope for a safer journey through our village in whichever mode of transport we are taking in the future.

A new beginning and a first for Secret World!

portacabins and facilities spread around the site to go to a three-storey building has had its challenges – especially with the utilities.

We are still sorting through all the boxes that have been packed and now need to go into the right places but at least we have the winter to get organised ready for the 2022 season. We are looking forward to our open days in 2022 when we will be able to show our friends what we have achieved with all their support.

It's amazing that after 35 years, we have had a 'first' as a casualty at the end of the summer. We had a young puffin, and you can imagine how wonderful it was to see one up close. A young puffin was discovered wrapped in seaweed on the beach at Brean, in Somerset.

It was brought into us very underweight and in poor condition. He adapted to being in captivity well and was soon eating small fish from the local fish shop in Highbridge and putting on weight. He won't be getting his colourful beak until the spring.

It is quite amazing that Puffing Billy survived.

He would have had to have floated from either Skomer Island in Pembrokeshire, or Lundy Island on the Dorset Coast, both are



miles away from Brean. It seemed right to name him after the steam engine called Puffing Billy which used to run long distances connecting the country-side to towns.

A young Puffin is called a Puffling. Adult Puffins migrate to our shores to breeding colonies in March and April. The young are hatched in burrows



to protect them from gulls and other larger sea birds. They usually leave again in mid-August so we

needed to get Puffing Billy up to the right condition ready to start his journey as soon as we could.

Some Puffins remain in the North
Sea at winter, others move further south
to the Bay of Biscay. Once up to the correct weight and the right condition,
Puffing Billy was finally released on the
shore of Pembrokeshire.

Zoe has been working hard to give the café a new look, with comfortable sofas and stunning photos on the wall, as well




as new lick of paint.





Oh yes! I remember them all right. As if we'd not been busy enough that week with people coming and going for the census with Josh and me working day and night, up 'till God knows what time. It was 'specially busy that evening and then I heard more commotion, an argument with some soldiers about taking people in and I knew we didn't have room.

I blame the stupid Romans, getting these folks to gather here from all over; they should have built a camp or something. Now they was worried about getting people off the streets and so we ended up with these two spending the night in the stable!

I didn't take to the Joseph bloke much. Older than her he was and they didn't act like they was married. Promised perhaps, the way he fussed over her, but not married. Yet here she was havin' a baby.

Perhaps it weren't his; he had a family anyway so they say. All a bit funny I thought but Josh and me made 'em as comfortable as we could. Lucky the rest of the cattle were still out in the fields so they 'ad some space and settled in 'long with a pair of our milking cows, and their donkey: ninety miles she'd rode that donkey, all the way from Nazereth and in her condition.

Mary her name was. She was all right and I admit he doted on her, that Joseph. Yes, couldn't do too much for her I must say. She gives birth about midnight. Josh and me were still up of course and I remember going over to see if I could do anything. It was quite light crossing the yard, never seen stars so bright 'fore or since. She'd put the baby in a manger, Jesus they were going to call 'im and he looked really cosy. Next thing, 'fore you knew it, there was these three steaming

great camels being ridden in: milling about in the yard, kicking things over and spitting at everyone.

Josh soon sorted them out, made 'em back up outside. But the riders then all got off and crowded in. Relatives I thought but when they'd got their travelling clothes off they did look a bit special. The quality folks had brought fancy stuff, gifts like, and stayed on late talking to Joseph. They even came out and had a word with Josh. Joseph came over at first light to pay, but Josh wouldn't take anything, said that it wouldn't be right, completely out of character for 'im that was.

Soon they mounted up, camels and donkey, and left together. Josh told me to say nothing to anyone about it. Not that I knew much anyway but sure enough some official-looking folk arrived later that day asking questions. 'You can trust us', they said, 'we've come from the King.'

How could farmers in your parish benefit from new grant scheme

he Farming in Protected Landscapes grants programme is now open to farmers and land managers in this Parish and the wider Mendip Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB).

This is a new grants programme launched by Defra this year, running on a rolling basis until March 2024, and the Mendip Hills AONB Unit have been allocated around £470,000 to award to projects over the next few years.

Projects should produce tangible outcomes under one of the four following categories:

Nature recovery - projects that increase biodiversity, improve connectivity between important habitats, or improve the area of habitat managed for wildlife. Examples could include:

- Linking valuable habitats within the AONB by creating 'habitat corridors' such as drystone walls or mixed-species hedgerows
- Creating new and valuable wildlife habitat such as

reptile hibernacula, or wildflower strips

Restoring abandoned dew ponds.

Mitigation of the impacts of climate change - projects that sequester carbon, or reduce the risk of flooding or drought. Examples could include:

- Clearance of blocked or overgrown swallets to improve water management
- Rewilding an area in increase the volume of carbon removed from the atmosphere by plants.

Improved public access or engagement - projects that engage the public in land management, or provide opportunities for new audiences to enjoy and understand the landscape. Examples could include:

- Improving or establishing appropriate multi-user access paths across the landscape
- Providing facilities to host educational visits on a farm for children, school leavers, or adult learners to discover more about the landscape and farming.

Preservation of the distinctive history and culture of the area - projects that conserve or interpret historical structures and features, projects that enhance the character of the landscape. Examples could include:

 Conserving historic features and working with archaeologists/historians to deliver educational site visits for all ages and demographics.

This flexibility grants programme is designed to empower farmers to help enhance the Mendip Hills Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and leave a legacy for the future, as well as supporting farms in the transition to delivering Public Goods under Defra's upcoming environmental land management scheme.

The programme is not an agri-environment scheme, and is running alongside, not in competition with, existing schemes. Defra have been clear that interaction with this programme will not disadvantage later entry into ELMS, and in fact may help farmers begin to deliver on targets for nature, climate, and people, that will also stand the farm in good stead for future resilience.

With this programme, the Mendip Hills AONB Unit have funded a farming engagement officer to provide free advice and support to develop applications. 
Bleadon Players

A walk in the woods and a view to remember

A four and a half mile/approx. two hour walk taking in Hellenge Hill, Canada Coombe and Bleadon Hill with lots of variety and views.

There are occasionally cattle, don-keys, sheep or horses in the fields. Please follow the country code keeping dogs under control (picking up their poo) and shutting all gates. Equipment: Walking shoes/boots/poles if required. Mostly gentle climb (522' in total), one stone stile, little bit rough under foot and possibly muddy after rain.

Leaving the Coronation car park go through the church yard up Old School Lane, right onto Shiplate Road and take the track left onto Hellenge Hill (as in the previous walk).


Fork right at the information

board and taking the next fork left, walk up the hill to the stone style which you cross, turning to admire the view (1).

Follow the right of way diagonally right across and up the field to the kissing gate in the hedge on the right (2). The path continues up the hill to the right of the house. Stop and admire the views. Turn right onto Roman Road at the gate by the house.

Continue on Roman Road past the picnic area/view point on the left, until you get to the sharp left hand bend down Canada Coombe. Take the bridle way (3) straight on. This track can be muddy after rain.

At the T junction and way mark, turn left and get your first views over the Severn Estuary to Wales (4). At the first gate on your left go down the permitted bridle way past the farm house and descend through














the woods to Canada Coombe.

On reaching the road turn left up the hill (5) and follow the footpath immediately on the right up into Hutton Woods. The footpath now goes through the woods (6) where in the spring you should look out for wild flowers including wild garlic, primroses, bluebells and orchids (7).

It is illegal to disturb! At the far

end of the woods the path continues with paddocks to the left, woods to the right.

Continue across the track, through the paddocks and down the small valley and up the path to Bleadon Hill Golf Course (8).

Cross the golf course on the public right of way with the practice range on your left and views to your right over

Weston to the Welsh mountains. Follow the path out of the course keeping the club house on your right back on to Roman Road where you turn left.

After about 100 yards, on your right there is a kissing gate onto the Hellenge Hill Nature Reserve (9) with an explanation board.

Follow the path down the hill keeping the hedge on your left. Go through the wooden kissing gate ahead. Pause and enjoy the views to the South and West (10).

Follow the path that forks right down the quite steep grassy slope through the gate at the bottom and join Shiplate Road where you started your walk. Turn right back to the village and car park.



Winter is fast approach and 'tis the season to be jolly. So what better way to get into the festive mood than to make some of these delicious dishes?

Porcini-rubbed rib of beef

Ingredients

Dried porcini mushrooms 3kg grass-fed rib of beef (3 bones) 1tbsp smoked sea salt

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Tip the porcini mushrooms into a food processor and blitz to a powder.
- 2. Put the beef in a roasting tin and rub all over with the porcini powder, smoked salt and plenty of freshly ground black pepper, do this at least 24 hours before cooking. Cover

- loosely and place in the fridge overnight.
- 3. Remove the beef from the fridge at least three hours before you want to cook it.
- 4. Heat oven to 140C/120C fan/gas 2.
- 5. Uncover the beef and cook for 1 hour 20 minutes.



- 6. Turn the oven up to 220C/200C/gas 7 and cook for another 25 minutes for medium rare until the fat is blistered and browned.
- 7. If you have a meat thermometer, the core temperature should be 55C for rare, 65C for medium and 75C for well done (bear in mind that the beef will keep cooking and the temperature will continue to rise slightly as
- 8. Leave to rest under a piece of foil for at least 20 minutes and serve.



Jammy star cookies

175g unsalted butter, cubed 250g plain flour 100g golden icing sugar 1tsp vanilla extract 1 egg yolk

For the filling

50g unsalted butter, softened 160g icing sugar 120g seedless raspberry or strawberry jam

Christmas punch

A bunch of red grapes 750ml prosecco 11 cloudy apply juice Ice

250ml sloe gin

50ml herbal liqueur (like Jägermeister) 1 ball stem ginger, finely sliced plus 2tbsp of the syrup

3-4 sprigs rosemary

1 clementine, finely sliced

Method

- 1. The day before you want to service, put the grapes in the freezer for around 12 hours or until frozen.
- 2. Chill the prosecco and apple juice in the
- 3. When you're ready to service, put the frozen grapes and a generous handful of ice in a large 2-3I punch bowl and pour all of the remaining ingredients on top.
- 4. Stir gently to combine, then service.
- 5. Sits well for up to 3hrs before putting the ice.

Method

- 1. Blitz the butter, flour and a pinch of salt in a food processor until it resembles fine breadcrumbs.
- 2. Add the sugar and blitz
- 3. Add the vanilla and egg yolk and blend until balls of dough have formed.
- 4. Tip the dough onto a work surface and knead briefly to make a smooth ball.
- 5. Cut into two equal pieces, pat them into discs, then wrap and chill for at least 30 minutes. Line two baking sheets with baking parchment.
- 6. Remove the dough from the fridge 15 minutes before you roll it out.
- 7. Lightly flour your work sur- 12. Fill the space with jam, face and rolling pin and unwrap one piece of dough and roll it out to the thick-

- ness of a 50p coin. Use a 6cm star cutter to stamp out stars and transfer to a baking sheet.
- 8. Unwrap the other piece of dough and repeat process but stamp holes in the middle of each.
- 9. Heat the oven to 180C/160C/gas 4. Bake for 10-15 minutes (the stars with a hole need less time), cool for five minutes then transfer to a wire rack.
- 10. Meanwhile, make the filling. Whisk the butter, sugar and 50g of the jam with an electric whisk.
- 11. Transfer to a piping bag with a small round nozzle and pipe blobs of the filling around each edge, leaving space in the centre.
- then sandwich a biscuit with a hole cut out on top of each one.


