My last report on what has been a successful and productive year for the Parish Council! We have achieved and implemented over the last twelve months much from the village plan and additional requests from the community. Some of the priorities of the Council's work can be found in this magazine and on our village web-site, which has been expanded and updated. You will have seen the web-site address on the first page of the magazine.

A new Bus Shelter of oak will be erected in Coronation Road before Christmas. The original bus stop will be moved from the dangerous corner and narrow pavement at the junction of Shiplate Road and Celtic Way to outside the Church rooms. North Somerset Council will then install a raised curb and a no parking zone in the near future.


I should remind you that in the New Year, North Somerset will implement new recycling and collection of our waste. We should all support the environmental benefits of this scheme, details of which will be posted on the North Somerset web-site and which were recently publicised in North Somerset "Life".

North Somerset Council is currently undertaking a district wide review of all village and town boundaries. Bleadon Parish Council contributed by proposing an extension of our boundary to encompass Hillcote. We await the final decision, but have informed the Hillcote residents that we are a proactive Council providing services and facilities that our villagers value. Among the current services are the new website, a police surgery, the Coronation Hall and Youth Club, and the playground. All newcomers are welcomed by Contactus. We employ a part time Ranger and also provide five notice boards for general information and detail of social events; and, last but not least, this magazine is issued quarterly.

Lastly, I must inform you that Councillor Penny Robinson has decided to retire in December after 12 years as a loyal and invaluable member of the Council. She has been a diligent and hard working editor in chief of this village magazine and, under her guidance, it has reached the standard it is today. She has been a conscientious Vice-Chairman and has given me constant support. We have between us heard every Penny joke there is! We all thank her for her service to Bleadon village as a Councillor.

You will have seen that the winter plant-up of the Village tubs has been completed. This year, we are to have a traditional Parish Christmas Tree and lights erected adjacent to the Coronation Hall. May I wish you all a very Happy Christmas and joyful New Year.

Spitfire Crash in Bleadon

Below is a short account of an event, which has recently been brought to my notice. The son of this pilot, one Mr. Frank Barton got in touch with me via the website and I've been able to put him into contact with at least one resident who remembers the event well. Frank now has photos of the hillside as it is today, but wonders if there is anyone else who has memories of the incident or even a picture.

"At 19.57 hrs on June 6th 1941 two Spitfires of a patrol protecting a convoy in the Bristol Channel passed over the barrage area operated by No.955 Squadron at Weston super Mare. The rearmost aircraft, P8143 of 501 Squadron operating from Colerne, hit the cable of the balloon at Site 55/19. The Double Parachute Link fired and the balloon broke away, but the aircraft crashed at Shiplate Court Farm, Hutton. (Editors note - now known to be in Bleadon). The pilot, Sgt. C.J.Barton was killed and the aircraft burnt out."

What it doesn't say in this report is that the pilot was already injured from his encounter with German guns over the Bristol Channel and was doing his best to get back to base when he flew into barrage balloon cable. The balloon was situated near to the Devil's Bridge, Uphill.

Change is on its way - with recycling your waste

You will have read in your North Somerset Life magazine about changes that are happening in March to the way your rubbish and recycling will be collected.

This is such a fundamental sea-change in the way that we must all deal with our rubbish, that it is worth repeating.

From March the new kerbside waste and recycling service will include:

a weekly recycling service using your existing green boxes collecting paper, all types of cardboard including corrugated, plastics, food and drink cartons, tins and cans, glass, textiles, shoes, batteries, mobile phones and spectacles. You will be provided with a free additional green box

a weekly food waste collection using containers. One for your kitchen and a larger lockable one for outside

the green bag waste collection will continue fortnightly. It will NOT now include corrugated cardboard

a wheeled bin for any non-recyclable waste collected fortnightly

Collections on bank holidays throughout the year apart from Christmas and New Year will also be introduced, and collections will start at 7am.

Although the new contracts will take effect from 1 March 2010 more work needs to be done to plan when the changes to collections arrangements will be introduced.

Before the services change in late Spring 2010, you will be written to with details of your specific collection solution, and if this is unsuitable there will be an opportunity for you to contact North Somerset Council to demonstrate that the solution is not suitable for your needs before the collections change.

The good news is that North Somerset Council will be supplying all the necessary new containers.

Plus we will be able to **recycle most** plastics from our own kerbside.

The recycling collection teams will be sorting the green box materials at the kerbside. So be prepared for some delays if you're stuck behind the lorry!





Food waste

Probably the most contentious issue in these changes is the recycling of food waste. Older residents may remember the *pig* or *swill bin*. It looks like it's made a come-back!

Here is what North Somerset have to say on the subject:

Over a third of what's in the average household bin is food waste. By collecting it separately we will significantly reduce the amount of recyclable waste going to landfill, and avoid huge financial penalties.

Food waste is biodegradable and when it rots down releases the major climate change gas methane if it isn't exposed to oxygen. By collecting food waste separately we will significantly reduce the amount of this highly potent greenhouse gas being released.

All food waste, including meat and fish, will be composted at a specialist treatment facility in Gloucestershire. It will be heat-treated to kill any bacteria and ensure compliance with the 2005 Animal By-Products legislation. Once it's ready, the compost will be available to buy from the three Recycling Centres in North Somerset.

Residents will receive a five litre caddy to keep in the kitchen to collect scraps and a 25 litre bin to place the waste outside for collection. The larger food waste bin will have a sealable lid and can be stored indoors or outdoors without risk of it being broken into by pests such as foxes, cats or rats, unlike black sacks that can be easily torn.

Food waste will be collected every week and the council will be providing more information and hints and tips about storing and putting out food waste closer to the introduction of the new scheme.



Remember to compost too!

Most kitchen scraps can be composted. You can purchase a **compost bin for just £15** from North Somerset Council. The

bins include a free kitchen caddy and delivery to your home.

The special discounted bins are only available to North Somerset residents. You can buy one with a debit or credit card by calling the Streets and Open Spaces team on 01934 888 802. It may take a couple of weeks for your compost bin to arrive.

The economic facts behind this change

This year it costs each household in Bleadon an average £48 in Council Tax to put our rubbish into landfill. Each year the government tax on our landfill increases by 8%. Within five years it will be costing us around £73 in Landfill Tax - unless we change now.

Add to that the prospect of huge fines if we fail to meet the reducing annual landfill targets. North Somerset Council estimates that unless we reduce our rubbish going to landfill dramatically it will cost each Bleadon household around £181 in additional taxes within five years.

None of us wants to pay the government more for the escalating cost of landfill, so we are going to have to change the way we deal with our rubbish.

Over the coming months there will be lots more information and guidance coming from North Somerset Council.

Bus shelter on Coronation Road

Around the time that you receive this Village News we should be seeing the erection of a new bus shelter on Coronation Road.

In partnership with North Somerset Council we are moving the bus stop down from the dangerous corner at the Shiplate and Celtic Way junction.

The new stop and shelter will be outside the Church Rooms. As well as a fine, hand-crafted oak shelter we will have a raised kerb to allow easier access to the bus. I'm sure that for all those bus passengers who have had to stand in all weathers the new shelter will be very welcome.

The shelter itself will be completed by 16 December but it is unclear whether North Somerset's groundworks to the pavement will be ready by then.

New road-markings will indicate the bus stop no parking zone and prohibit parking on the dangerous corner outside Newbay Cottage.

After months of lobbying of North Somerset by the parish council it's great to see that we now have bus stop flags at Purn/Bleadon Rd and on the A370 near Bridge Garage.

Let's all now help towards retaining the bus service by using it!

Parish Boundary and Electoral Review

Bleadon may see a change to its parish boundary and possible cuts in the number of its parish councillors as a result of a review now being carried out in North Somerset.

The review by North Somerset Council has looked at parish boundaries and parish council electoral arrangements, as well as the provision of any parish council wards, and allocated numbers of parish councillors. The district council has invited submissions for any changes to, or in support of the retention of, the existing arrangements.

Make Hillcote part of Bleadon

Bleadon Parish Council has asked that its boundary be extended to include Hillcote.

This follows several requests from residents in Hillcote who feel that they are really part of Bleadon, not Weston. Many feel that Hillcote exists in a kind of noman's-land between the two. Certainly, most Hillcote residents enjoy our facilities and feel strong attachment to our village.

The parish chairman has written personally to all Hillcote residents urging them to **vote to transfer to Bleadon** in the current consultation period. We hope they do.

Cutting the size of your parish council

One of the recommendations that has come from your District Councillor Ap Rees is that the number of Bleadon Parish councillors be reduced from nine to seven.

Your parish council is very strongly opposed to this reduction in your democratic representation. Already your nine councillors work very many hours for free on your behalf. Any reduction in numbers would put considerable strain on your grass-roots councillors who are working unpaid to deliver the services Bleadon wants and deserves. Any cut would certainly reduce the council's effectiveness.

If you are happy with the status quo and do not want to see any reduction in your local representation we urge you to tell North Somerset Council so.

Write to the officer who's heading this consultation at the Town Hall telling him how you feel.

Change is on its way - our mobile library under threat

North Somerset Council is reviewing its mobile library service to save £70,000 per annum on operational costs.

A recommendation has been made to the Executive which will have enormous effects on the service that Bleadon will, or will not receive. An extract from the report published on the North Somerset Council website is transcribed below.



"This report recommends that the Council procures a new library vehicle either by lease or purchase and restructures the mobile library routes to ensure that a more cost effective service is provided, which gives priority to households not within 2 miles of a static library and focuses on communities in greatest need. Whilst detailed work will need to be carried out to complete the route rationalisation, the general principles proposed to be adopted are follows:-

- Longer stops (minimum 30 minutes)
- Minimum frequency once every three weeks, but more often where appropriate / possible
- More central, safe and accessible stops and, where possible, associated with other community meeting places / services
- Free reservations
- Significant reduction in stops within 2 miles of a static library
- No multiple stops in one community
- Introduction of a range of new "gateway to council information and services" where practicable"

In effect, the new slim-line mobile library is unlikely to visit communities who live within two miles of a library.

Will that be "crow flying miles"?

We sincerely hope not, because that puts the new library on the Bournville just two miles away from the village cross - as the crow flies! And whilst we have a surfeit of crows in the village none of them uses the mobile library as far as I'm aware!

Note also the limiting of stops within a village. So if we do retain a mobile library it's **likely to stop in just one central spot.** That does little to help the large proportion of elderly and infirm who are the real beneficiaries of this service.

If you wish to retain the mobile library in Bleadon you are urged to WRITE NOW to Councillor Felicity Baker, who is the Executive Member pushing forward these changes at North Somerset.

Bringing our yesterdays to life

Earlier this year the Bleadon History Group started to bring together the elements for an interpretation board outlining some of the present-day features that tell the history of the village. At last our efforts are coming to fruition.

Around the time you first read this our first history board should be in place. The parish council, as always, has been very supportive and will be funding the installation of the board on the little green alongside the youth club in the car park. The £700 cost of the oak framed panel and its full-colour graphics will come out of the windfall income from the recent in-fill development behind Church Cottages.

The new panel illustrates the history of the Church and the Church Cross; Bleadon Man and the presence of Roman traders; the parish water pumps at Well Green and the importance of the river Axe to us. The oak structure has been designed to be double-sided. The History Group is now collating old photographs and maps that help tell the story of Bleadon's past for inclusion on the reverse of the panel. The aim is to get this second panel completed by the early Spring.

Funding permitting, it is hoped that these interpretation panels are just the first of several that will be located around the parish. The aim is to interpret our village environs to help residents and visitors enjoy fully the landscape we live in.

Something to look forward to

In the summer the History Group hopes to organise one or two *Bleadon Discovery Walks*. We shall need to enlist the help of an expert or two, who can help explain what we see along the way and and how it relates to our past.

I'm sure it will be a bit of fun, and maybe we'll discover a thing or two.

As soon as we have any firm details we'll let you know.



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Change is on its way - the digital TV switchover



TV across the UK and the rest of the world is going digital. In Bleadon that changeover will happen in March and April 2010.

If you are not already receiving digital TV you need to be prepared before the **Mendip transmitter** switches BBC1 and BBC2 programmes exclusively to digital on 24 March. All other programmes will switch to digital on 7 April.

Why is it happening?

Switchover is happening so that Freeview services (digital TV through an aerial) can be extended to people who can't currently get them.

How will you be affected?

How the digital TV switchover affects you will depend on what equipment you currently have, or what you are planning to get.

If you have Freeview, BT Vision or Top Up TV you will just need to **retune your digital TV or set-top box.**

If you have Sky TV, Freesat, Virgin Media or Tiscali on all your TVs you need **do nothing**.

If you have Analogue TV (five channels or fewer) you will need to **convert your TV** to continue viewing after switchover.

What do viewers need to do?

Viewers must ensure that their TVs are capable of receiving a digital signal in order to continue receiving television services after March 24th. Virtually any TV, even black and white ones, can be converted with a digital box. Anyone buying new TV equipment should look for the 'digital tick' logo (below) which identifies equipment designed to work before, during and after switchover.


What are the different ways to get digital TV?

There are three main options available to Bleadon residents:

Through an aerial (eg Freeview, Top Up TV, BT Vision), either through a digital box or a television with an integrated digital tuner (an iDTV)

By satellite (eg Sky, or non-subscription freesat from Sky)

Over broadband (eg Tiscali TV)



How much does digital television cost?

Most homes already have digital television on the main set. For those getting digital for the first time or who are converting secondary sets around the home, the cost will vary according to the number of TVs and method of conversion

Some homes (5-10%) in poor reception areas may also require a new aerial to receive digital signals. **Don't accept any doorstep traders telling you that you have to change your aerial.** You probably don't need to change your aerial. A standard new roof aerial normally costs £60-180.

Freeview digital boxes start from less than £25

Integrated digital televisions start from around £100, and seem to be getting cheaper all the time.

Subscription (eg Sky, Virgin, Top Up TV) start from approximately £10 per month

Digital television recorders start from approx £100

What about recorders?

Analogue recorders will still be able to play tapes and discs but will need to be connected to either a digital box or digital television in order to record programmes after switchover. They will only be able to record the digital channel being watched.

Many viewers are swapping their old analogue equipment for a digital TV recorder (DTR) or a digital DVD recorder. These devices can also pause or rewind live TV, and some models feature two tuners allowing you to record one digital channel while watching another.

What channels will viewers get?

Switchover will make Freeview television channels available throughout Bleadon. Viewers choosing to get digital television this way will be able to receive BBC One, BBC Two, ITV1, C4 and Five plus a range of digital channels and services free via an aerial. Bleadon households will be able to receive over 40 Freeview channels plus digital radio channels via their aerial.

The Digital Switchover **Help Scheme** has been established by the BBC to offer practical assistance at the time of switchover to **cover households in which one person or more**:

is aged 75 years or over; or

has a **significant disability** – ie claims disability living allowance, attendance allowance, constant attendance allowance or pensioners' mobility supplement; or


is registered blind or partially sighted

Eligible households may receive the following support:

- equipment to convert one TV set
- · help with installation
- an aerial replacement (if required)
- · follow-up support

There will be a subsidised **fee of £40** for the help.

For eligible claimants who also receive income support, job seeker's allowance or pension credit, the help will be provided free.





As with many services these days, funding is limited and we able to currently operate just one youth evening a week. We'd like to improve on that.

The management committee has welcomed some new bodies to contribute to the efforts of the hardworking and longer serving members and we hope this will breathe fresh enthusiasm into the club. We are more than pleased to have three young members stepping up to a committee role.

The most important task of the committee is to raise the necessary

funds to operate a second night for our young people. £4500 is required to fund a weekly second night but smaller amounts could see us being able to offer some short term project related second sessions.

The committee has to absorb these increases in order that the hire charges do not have to be raised until it becomes absolutely necessary to do so.


It would be of great help therefore if hall users could ensure that there is always a nominated person to check that all the heaters, taps and lights (especially in the toilets), have been switched off before closing up.

I mention this because only recently it was found that a hot water tap had been left running in the ladies' toilet and as this was not discovered for several days, you can imagine the waste of metered water and gas this represented. I will say that most Hall users do already make the checks , which only take a few minutes at the end of the session and we are most appreciative of this, - it's the ones who don't that cost us dear.

The talks on Fridays have been varied and interesting and we look forward to a good programme of events for next year, first of all however after our Christmas break we shall be having our Annual Lunch in January.



Bleadon Photography Group

NORMAN PARKINSON C.B.E. 1913 - 1990





a professorship, one of only a very few to gain this position in photography. I am still in contact with him today after nearly 60 years. Another became assistant to the charming eccentric fashion photographer Norman Parkinson. He would go out on assignments with him and be responsible for the processing and printing of the images taken. N.P would discuss with David, my friend, how he would want the final result to appear and decide on any processing adjustments required to achieve this end. This could necessitate a change in processing time or a particular technique or the paper on which the image was finally printed. Many were the stories David could tell of times spent with this charming and eccentric man.

Norman Parkinson concentrated his work on portrait and fashion photography and was the first to move his sitters out of the studio and into unfamiliar areas to take his shots. He might set a model wearing a glamorous Vogue creation against a background of industrial wasteland in order to emphasise the contrast of the two elements and this proved to be a winning genre. This was a method subsequently used by his contemporary, Cecil Beaton, who was at that time competing for the same commissions and changed the perception of fashion photography. N.P's work was featured in all the fashion magazines of the time such as Harper's Bazaar, Queen, Bystander and of course Vogue.

N.P would never take a photograph without wearing his Kashmiri wedding hat, in fact he would seldom be seen without it. The reason for this was never made clear, maybe it was part of his eccentricity but it did become his identity. His real name was Ronald William Parkinson Smith and received his education at Westminster School. He began his career in 1931 as an apprentice to the court photographers Speaight & Sons and in 1934 opened his own studio with his partner Norman Kibblewhite. During the Second World War he flew as a reconnaissance photographer with the R.A.F. After the war he married the actress and model Wenda Rogerson whilst working as fashion photographer at Vogue magazine. She is featured in many of his works. In 1960 he became Associate Editor of Queen magazine until, in 1963 he moved to Tobago returning frequently to London to honour commissions as a freelance photographer.

My friend David joined him as assistant and processing manager and travelled extensively with him. Throughout his entire working life he remained the foremost British fashion and portrait photographer having photographed all the top models of the day along with many in the arts world such as Vaughn Williams and Kathleen Ferrier. He was also known as unofficial royal photographer having taken many portraits of the Royal family and was invited to take some of the photographs of the wedding of the then Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip, outside Westminster Abbey.

He maintained that he was a craftsman not an artist though there are many who would question this, having seen his images. He once said that "The only thing to get in the way of a good photograph was a camera". He was a man with a great sense of humour which sometimes played a part in his photographs and he often appeared in them himself.

One of his legacies is typical of the man, for in order to preserve the traditional British banger, he produced his own brand of sausage in 1985 and called it the "Porkinson's Banger". It was the preferred sausage to be served on Concorde and was marketed as the first supersonic sausage. It is still available today in supermarkets.

Norman Parkinson died on 15th February 1990 having left this world more appreciative of real glamour.
