Chairman's Report

At the beginning of the year, the Parish Council with its usual enthusiasm will be meeting the targets and aspirations that the community has set. As we look to the coming months, we will do our utmost to deal with the issues that concern us all. The way to help the Council to hear and know your views is to attend the Annual Parish Meeting in the Coronation Hall on 12 April 2010. This is your meeting, we will cover the precept, the village plan, the recycling revolution and propose a new format for this Village magazine. Parishioners, local organisations and clubs are welcome; please come along and enjoy the evening and a glass of wine.

The Parish Council recently welcomed a **new Councillor** to the team. **Trevor Marshall** will broaden our knowledge and insight of the work we undertake on your behalf and we will once again be up to full strength. We also welcome the new Chairman and Treasurer of the Youth Club. We thank them and their Committee for all that they do to help our young people.

The North Somerset boundary review will soon be published and we shall then know if **Hillcote** will be included within the Bleadon boundary, enabling them to enjoy the facilities and services that we value here. Much other work is ongoing with North Somerset on planning issues and the draft Core Strategy. The Parish Council apologises for the **new bus shelter** not being erected in December 2009 as expected. North Somerset were unable to undertake the necessary groundwork,

which will now be completed in the Spring. Until then, the bus shelter remains in storage.

We have had many complaints on the problems of litter and dog fouling. Bins are available for both; please use them and help us to keep our village as clean and tidy as we would all wish it to be. We understand that new Dog Control Orders will be issued shortly. We have also received many complaints of cars speeding and inconsiderate and unsafe parking on our village roads. We have passed the complaints to our Community Police Team, who intend to make these issues a "Police Priority".

The **Scarecrow Festival** will be held again in August. This two day event entitled "Weird and Wonderful" will begin on Saturday 28 August, with a pork roast lunch and Live music. Cream teas will be available on Sunday 29 August. Hopefully, all parts of the village, including the allotments, will have Scarecrows - just maybe even a Maize Maze to enjoy. A Contactus Party will be held in the Village Hall on 16 June to welcome all new villagers who have arrived over the last year. The **History Group** will meet on the last day of June, when archived material will be on view. All these events are sponsored by the Parish Council.

Due to the long cold winter, the **Spring Plant Up** of the tubs will be later than usual on **Saturday 8 May**. The colour scheme is still a secret!! Thank you for your continuing encouragement and support of your Parish Council.

In the last Village News I promised that a new bus shelter would be installed in Coronation Road by early 2010. Fear not! The bus shelter is made and awaits delivery. Unfortunately, changing budget priorities at North Somerset Council mean that they have had to delay the pavement improvements until the new financial year after April 1st.

Whilst we wait for the widening and raising of the pavement outside the Church Rooms I'm afraid that bus passengers will have to brave the elements on that narrow pavement outside Newbay Cottage. Sorry about that.

And what about our new Bleadon history panel?

I also promised the installation of a Bleadon history interpretation panel on the little green in front of the toilets. That too has been delayed by the hold on delivering the bus shelter. As both oak structures are coming from the same craftsman in Hampshire it makes sense to keep delivery costs down by having both delivered together. So Bleadon's history is having to wait a little I'm afraid.

Welcome to our new Bleadon Parish Councillor

After the resignation of Penny Robinson from the parish council in December we are pleased to welcome Trevor Marshall onto the council.

Trevor and his family have lived in Bleadon Mill since it was first built. In fact, he was involved in the building of the development and he liked Bleadon so much he decided to stay.

With his surveying and project management background we are hoping that Trevor can bring additional professional skills to our already wellrounded council.

Parish Precept for 2010-11

The Parish Council has managed to hold down its portion of the Council Tax to a small **1% increase** for the coming year. After last year's zero increase it was agreed that the average £1.30 per household increase on the Bleadon Precept was necessary if we are to continue delivering quality services.

We will be drawing £15,800 from our parish reserves to pay for various major village improvements. These include a bus shelter and improvements at the junction of Bleadon Road and Purn Way, tree planting on the A370, more interpretation panels, completion of the dry-stone walling on Roman Road and making safe the low stone wall by the Play Area.

Housing Development for North Somerset through to 2026

North Somerset Council has been working on their new **Core Strategy** which, when adopted in 2012, will inform the Local Development Framework and planning policies for the district through to 2026.

The process started with the publication of the Regional Spatial Strategy by central government that prescribes the size and key locations of future housing and associated developments. Many authorities have been unhappy with this top down approach and the lack of local democratic involvement. Some authorities have felt so strongly that they have challenged the process through legal review and indeed a number have won their case. North Somerset has taken a non-compliant approach by removing a 9000 housing development in countryside southwest of Bristol from the 26,750 new homes identified in the North Somerset Regional Spatial Strategy.

Of the remaining 17,750 new homes for North Somerset, 9000 new homes and an associated 42 hectares of employment land is identified for the Weston-super-Mare Urban Extension. Much of that development is located in the triangle formed by the M5, the A370 and the A371 and abuts Locking.

The strategic approach taken by North Somerset Council is to establish three different types of development areas, Urban, Service Villages and Minor Settlements. The Urban areas are Weston-super-Mare, Clevedon, Nailsea and Portishead and quite obviously

represent areas with substantial populations.. The **Service Villages** are Backwell, Banwell, Congesbury, Churchill, Hutton, Locking, Long Ashton, Pill/Easton-in-Gordano, Uphill, Winscombe, Wrington and Yatton and have populations in the 2000 to 5000 range. **Other villages, including Bleadon, are categorised as Minor Settlements.**

Service Villages will have planning policies that will be focussed on the vision of development for self containment in housing and employment. Minor Settlements will focus any development on agriculture and associated activities.

The process is now at a key consultation stage and accordingly your council has reviewed the draft Core Strategy document in detail and has submitted it's comments to North Somerset District Council. Your council's primary concern is that the step between Service Village and Minor Settlement and the associated planning policy is too large. Even though Bleadon, with approximately 1000 inhabitants, is significantly smaller than the 2000 to 5000 for the service villages and even though this is reflected in the parish's infrastructure your council does not believe that a "farming hamlet" approach will suffice for the future well-being of the parish.

Your council has suggested to the North Somerset Council that they either include an additional category to cover villages of a similar size to Bleadon or

take an alternative approach that gives a roadmap for the sustainable future of Bleadon. Your Council's comments to the North Somerset Council are shown below.

Bleadon Parish Council comments

The council's detailed comments will predominately be reserved to those areas of the Core Strategy Consultation Draft that have direct or indirect effects or implications on our parish.

Bleadon Parish Council's primary issue of concern and comment is the proposed categorisation of the villages in the District. Bleadon Parish Council concurs with the Core Strategy Consultation Draft in that it does not consider itself to be a "service village". However, the extreme jump in associated planning policy from "service village" to "smaller settlement" is considered to be too big a step to deal properly with the future needs of Bleadon. The council requests a mechanism is found to address this issue. Some suggestions are made later in this document.

On the areas of the Core Strategy Consultation Draft that specifically impact on other areas of North Somerset, the council would like to offer its support to the stand taken by North Somerset relative to the Regional Spatial Strategy development proposals for a major development south west of Bristol. More broadly, the stand made to protect the countryside is absolutely key to the protection of one of the most important assets of North Somerset which contributes so much to the character of the District.

Bleadon Parish

Bleadon Parish stretches from the Bleadon Levels, close to the coast, to the Mendip Hills and enjoys outstanding countryside, including an AONB. Bleadon parish and in particular Bleadon village is adjacent to the Somerset border.

The parish has a population of approximately 1000 inhabitants living in just under 500 dwellings. The demographic distribution is significantly older than average.

Whilst there has been some historical development away from the centre of the village, the bulk of the dwellings in the parish are clustered in one area just off the A370. The village is very much concentrated here together with all of the key facilities and services. The sense of community is very much "alive and well" and is strongly focussed on the village hall. Over twenty social, educational, fitness and general interest organisations utilise the facility and help to support its viability through a very high level of usage.

The Bleadon Village Plan calls for the protection of the character of the village and hence implies tightly controlled development.

History and Vision

Under the current planning policies the Settlement Boundary has given residents, the council and developers a clear framework for development. This

has worked very well for Bleadon with some well controlled small developments and infill adding to sustainability whilst protecting the character of the village.

One specific potential project that has been part of a possible future vision for the council has been the development of a non operational Quarry close to the centre of the village. Whilst no specific proposal has been made in the past, a general vision that would see some housing and employment development of the quarry at the end of its current use has existed and, indeed, may explain why the quarry is included within the settlement boundary.

As part of the vision for a potential quarry development the council has linked a redevelopment of the parish's community centre as well as other recreation facility improvements. These, together with an associated redesign and construction of the link road to the A370, are all focussed on improving the facilities and services available to the community and its parishioners.

Possible solutions

Bleadon Parish Council would strongly suggest that the deep step between "service village" and "smaller settlement" categories be addressed to ensure that villages similar to Bleadon who are not appropriate for service village designation but are too large to be just an agricultural hamlet have enough development room to keep the village fresh and progressive within the constraint of protecting the character of the village and the expectations of the parishioners. For Bleadon a continuation of the settlement boundary and tight controlling policies may offer the best solution.

If, however, the view is that another category of village is not deemed possible, then the council would request a mechanism that protects its vision either by specific inclusion or an enabling definition. As far as the council is concerned, the potential quarry development is very much linked to the facilities and infrastructure within the parish and hence may afford the opportunity for a tight but generic definition such as a community led project.

Under either policy the Parish Council would require that any future development be balanced to meet local needs such as affordable and sheltered housing, small scale employment opportunities for local people and very importantly improvements to community facilities and infrastructure.

Here's a warning from Emma, our village Police Community Support Officer. If you have information about any crime, phone the police on **0845 456 7000**.

Visa and Mastercard phone scam

This very convincing scam has been passed on via the Fraud Department In Wiltshire Constabulary.

This scam is pretty slick since they provide YOU with all the information, except the one piece they want. **Note, the callers do not ask for your card number; they already have it.**

The scam works like this:

Person calling says, "This is (name), and I'm calling from the Security and Fraud Department at VISA. My badge number is 12460. Your card has been flagged for an unusual purchase pattern, and I'm calling to verify. This would be on your VISA card which was issued by (name of bank) did you purchase an Anti-Telemarketing Device for £497.99 from a Marketing company based in London?" When you say "No", the caller continues, "Then we will be issuing a credit to your account. This is a company we have been watching and the charges range just under the £500 purchase pattern that flags most cards. Before your next statement, the credit will be sent to (gives you your address), is that correct?" You say "yes". The caller continues - "I will be starting a fraud investigation. If you have any questions, you should call the 0800 number listed on the back of your card (0800-VISA) and ask for Security. You will need to refer to this Control Number. The caller then gives you a 6 digit number. "Do you need me to read it again?"

Here's the IMPORTANT part the caller then says, "I need to verify you are in possession of your card." He'll ask you to "turn your card over and look for some numbers." There are 7 numbers; the first 4 are part of your card number, the next 3 are the security numbers that verify you are the possessor of the card.

These are the numbers you sometimes use to make Internet purchases to prove you have the card. The caller will ask you to read the 3 numbers to him. After you tell the caller the 3 numbers, he'll say, "That is correct, I just needed to verify that the card has not been lost or stolen, and that you still have your card. Do you have any other questions?" After you say, "No," the caller then thanks you and states, "Don't hesitate to call back if you do", and hangs up. You actually say very little, and they never ask for or tell you the Card number.

After we were called we called back within 20 minutes to ask a question. Are we glad we did! The REAL VISA Security Department told us it was a scam and in the last 15 minutes a new purchase of £497.99 was charged to our card. We made a real fraud report and closed the VISA account. What the scammers want is the 3-digit PIN number on the back of the card. Don't give it to them. Instead, tell them you'll call VISA or MasterCard directly for verification of their conversation.

The real VISA told us that they will never ask for anything on the card as they already know the information since they issued the card!

Supplying the rural community

A recycling revolution for North Somerset

Over the next six months residents in Bleadon will see some major changes to their recycling and waste collections, as North Somerset Council introduces its recycling revolution.

The new services include a weekly recycling collection of a much wider range of materials including plastics, food and drink cartons and all types of cardboard.

What's already happened? March 2009: property survey

The council surveyed every property in North Somerset to assess the storage space available. Properties were divided into three categories:

Type 1 enough space for a wheeled bin Type 2 not enough space for a wheeled bin

Type 3 flats of four or more households - changes to collections will be introduced separately.

March 2010: new contracts began

The council's new recycling and waste collection contractors May Gurney took over the existing collection services on 1 March. Services continue as at present for now.

What's going to happen? March and April 2010: letter to type 1 and 2 properties

The letter outlines the council's proposed new service for that household. Residents will have up to three weeks to respond if this is not correct for their property type. A

council officer will visit these properties to reassess the storage space.

April 2010: new calendars

New collection calendars for Monday 3 May onwards will be delivered to all North Somerset homes as collection days will be changing in May. New services at Recycling Centres begin too.

May 2010: new collection days

From Monday 3 May collection days in North Somerset will change. Collection will begin at 7am from now on and recycling and waste will be collected on all Bank Holidays, apart from Christmas Day and New Year's Day.

The council will be introducing the changes to recycling and waste collections for type 1 and 2 properties in two stages: half in July, the other half in September. Everyone will find out which stage they are in well before any changes to collections begin.

June 2010: new containers delivered to stage one areas (bins or plastic sacks depending on whether you live in a type 1 or 2 property) to approximately half the households in North Somerset.

July 2010: new services begin in stage one areas. Households that got new bins in June will receive their new collections from mid-July.

August 2010: new containers delivered to stage two areas in the remaining half of the households in North Somerset.

September 2010: new services begin in stage two areas. Households that got new bins in August will receive their new recycling and waste collections from mid-September.



The long awaited digital changeover to our TVs is happening in Bleadon on 24 March and 7 April. No doubt, by now all of you are prepared. But just in case, here's a gentle reminder.

If you are not already receiving digital TV you need to be prepared before the **Mendip transmitter** switches BBC1 and BBC2 programmes exclusively to digital on 24 March. All other programmes will switch to digital on 7 April.

Why is it happening?

Switchover is happening so that Freeview services (digital TV through an aerial) can be extended to people who can't currently get them.

What do viewers need to do?

Viewers must ensure that their TVs are capable of receiving a digital signal in order to continue receiving television services after March 24th. Virtually any TV, even black and white ones, can be converted with a digital box. Anyone buying new TV equipment should look for the 'digital tick' logo (above) which identifies equipment designed to work before, during and after switchover.

Mobile library

There has been no further news on the future of our mobile library service. The current timetable brings the library to Bleadon on alternate Mondays between 11am and 2.55pm. In March it's scheduled to call here on the 15th and 29th. I urge you to use it. Listen out for the distinctive "ice cream" chimes.

Bus services

I hear that North Somerset Council has agreed a contract with Webber Bus for the **83 service between Bleadon and Weston, starting on 4 April.** It's excellent news for the many people who use this invaluable service. Thank you North Somerset for supporting our community in this way. Unfortunately, we are losing the early 07.26 service because of poor usage.



As a reminder, here are the **times of the new service from the Bleadon Road stop** at the top of Bridge Road: Monday to Friday at: 07.56, 09.01, 10.06 and continues at 6 mins past the hour until 18.06.

On Saturdays the service starts at 09.01; then continues at 6 mins past the hour until 18.06.

No service on Sundays.

Bleadon Photographic Group

Having made mentioned **Cecil Beaton** in my last article, I thought that I would extend give more details of this significantly talented precocious man. So here is some background to a 20th century master of the arts.

He was born in Hampstead in 1904 one of four siblings, to a prosperous timber merchant Ernest and his wife Etty. Early in his school days his artistic talents were recognised both for his art and his singing. His nanny fired his interest in photography by showing him how to use her Kodak box camera and develop and print a film. He perfected his abilities in it's use by using his two pretty sisters as models. Beaton was never au fait with the technicalities of photography and for years used a simple Kodak folding camera to produce many of his fashion shots until he eventually moved to using a Rollieflex or large format camera for his studio work

He was educated at Harrow school and then at St. John's College Cambridge where he studied architecture art and history but he had no interest in academia and left Cambridge in 1925 without a degree. He maintained and fostered his growing interest in photography during his time at Cambridge and on leaving tried unsuccessfully to start his own fashion photographic company. His failure lead him to concentrate his artistic abilities on designing book jackets and stage sets whilst at the same time improving his photographic skills at the studio of Paul Tanquary until he was employed



on a regular basis by Vogue magazine in 1927.

He had an inbuilt appreciation of beauty and he was able to capitalise on this in the early 1920's and 30's with the emergence of magazine publishing and a craze for postcards. In 1926 he was invited to photograph the eccentric and talented Sitwell family and this started the career of this star struck bohemian.

Always immaculately dressed he was known as the "Dandy Photographer" and his audaciousness, determination and admiration of the socialites and stars of both theatre and screen propelled him into the world of fashion and glamour and was soon to be in demand by the top magazines of the day. His career took off in the 1930's and he remained at the top of the genre for the rest of his working life.

Beaton photographed society, theatre personalities, royalty, and the giants of the art world from Lilian Gish to Marilyn Monroe, from Winston Churchill to Jacqueline Kennedy and Princess Margaret to Queen Elizabeth. The list is endless, composers, pop stars, bankers and artists but always

people he admired for one reason or another.

He had a relationship with many women, amongst them Greta Garbo whom he adored but also with several men. He claimed to have had an affair with his very close friend Gary Cooper. Beaton was influenced by the work of Angus McBean a theatre and portrait photographer and friend who was arguably the finest portrait photographer of his day.

During the war he worked for the Ministry of Information producing images of war torn Britain mainly for propaganda purposes. After the war his career took a diversion when he began designing sets, costumes and lighting for the Broadway theatres beginning with "Lady Windermere's Fan" in which he took a part. This was in 1946 but his most renowned achievements were in the settings and costumes for "My Fair Lady" and "Gigi", both earning him Academy Awards. He went on designing many Broadway shows winning four Tony awards on the way. Two years after suffering a stroke in 1970, he was knighted but the effects of the stroke left him permanently paralysed down his right side but this did not deter him and he learned to write and draw with his left hand and had his cameras modified for left hand use. Cecil Beaton's health deteriorated and aged him and he passed away during the night at his home in Broad Chalke, Wiltshire at the age of 76 in January 1980.

The year's rainfall on Bleadon Hill

Regular readers of the Village News will know that I have been keeping an eye on precipitation (rain, sleet, hail or melted snow) in my back garden here on Bleadon Hill since 1981 when we moved from the Crescent which is now in Lympsham parish.

I measure the rain etc. collected in a rain gauge twice a day at 8am and 8pm. A "rain day" is one when at least 0.2mm of precipitation is recorded in a 24 hour period. One inch of rain is equivalent to 25.4mm (for those who still measure in real money). I am indebted to my neighbour Rex who takes over when we are away.

I haven't got room here to publish all the monthly totals, but here's a taste of the **results from Bleadon Hill**:

2009 Rainfall total = 975mm Average rainfall 1981-2008 = 973mm 2009 Number of dry days = 189 Average dry days 1981- 2008 = 183 Best month for dry days was September Wettest month in 2009 was November with 194mm of rain.

July ran a very reasonable **2nd wettest** with 146mm.

Driest month was April.

As you can see 2009 turned out to be an average year with the distribution of rain being all over the place.

A story of our times?

Llab the Impaler, King of Ellovera, is dead. He expires not in the way fervently wished by most of his subjects, that of being slowly drawn over one of his own surgically sharpened shafts, but by dying peacefully in bed. The event is not even prefaced by a decently severe illness. His successor, Llab the Second, a supposedly sickly youth who owes his survival to spending much time abroad, is proclaimed 'King in Absence'. But the Barons of Ellovera are gathering in opposition, long suffering the murderous whimsies of Old Llab they are seeking this chance to seize power. King Llab the Second is thought to be travelling in the Far West, last heard of visiting the land of the Angry Saxons together with a bodyguard of Dwarvian archers and his personal physician Pirouette, known in court as the Spin Doctor. However, Pirouette is wise in the ways of Barons and has for some time secreted the sometime King nearby in an adjacent country. Within days, to the dismay and discomfort of the Barons, the new King arrives in the Capital of Ellovera. Surprisingly the new King is not sickly at all, but is tall, slimhipped and heart-flutteringly handsome. He is followed everywhere by his tiny bodyguard and the faithful Pirouette and he soon gets to work "Summon all the Barons in the land," says the King, and this is soon done because they are already gathered for reasons of their own. "Chose three among them so we may discuss matters and have them meet me atop the castle watchtower." And three are chosen.



First, and acknowledged leader of the Barons, is Earl Woodwedge Bendo, wild-eyed and insane but immensely rich. Then comes his young cousin the relatively poor Lord Downat Heeley and lastly the peoples' favourite the famous General de la Billionaire, an army leader and faithful servant of the late King. The General did long command the King's armies and has made much money since, writing of it. Llab the Second, fit and lightly dressed, soon makes it to the top of the tower followed slowly by the three heavily cloaked and armoured Barons. They find the King at the parapet alone and defenceless, his back to them, his arms raised to encompass a view across the city rooftops and out beyond the seemingly limitless steppes of central Ellovera. He starts to gush on about his plans for the future and how he wishes to take the Barons on board.

With a glance at his cousin, Earl Woodwedge quietly eases his sword from its scabbard and moves silently but swiftly forward, intent on doing the King a mischief. However, gravel has been scattered on the floor behind Llab and as soon he hears a step thereon he ducks aside. A portion of the parapet has also been removed and Woodwedge tumbles headfirst through it and soon rejoins the assembled Barons in the courtyard below. Downat

Healey now draws *his* sword, the King remains unarmed and doesn't look the warrior type anyway, but a volley of arrows from a small turret nearby immediately drops Downat. He'd forgotten the dwarfs.

Crafty old Pirouette is pleased with the results; two of the leading Barons gone and in a touching ceremony on the castle rooftop the old General has pledged allegiance.

"The people will be with us now," the physician assures Llab, "and more importantly the Army. We will also gain the riches of Earl Woodwedge Bendo and can lay claim to his estates." Soon returning down in the courtyard the King addresses the assembly of Barons, outlining his plans - shortly to be published in a green paper - for the future of Ellovera. There is some muttering over the proposed ban on hunting, establishment of animal sanctuaries and the preservation of woodlands. The Vassal added Tax (VAT) on servants is also greeted glumly. In the back row one or two hands are reaching for weapons when an armed guard appears and surrounds the area. King Llab the Second prepares to take his leave.

"Just impale two or three of them," he says quietly to the guard Captain, "so that they get the point and no new shafts to be used either, resharpen some of the old ones."

The trees of Ellovera, at least, have found their saviour.

But soon there is going to be trouble in New Llab's Kingdom; the northern forest folk are suffering the financial consequences of new rules safeguarding trees. Safe from the axe and the plough the forests flourish and the wild life gets wilder but the peasants are revolting. It's a cold inhospitable region at best but gathering timber to heat their hovels is now strictly controlled and to obtain warmth many peasants are forced to live with their animals causing them much discontent, the peasants also. The upper classes are cutting back on employees because of VAT and things are getting grim. The peasants' leader is one Artful Scarface, self-proclaimed King of the charcoal burners, who speaks loudly for them all.

"We knew were we were under Old Llab Brothers. Only the landowners and Barons got impaled then. Now, under New Llab, we're all being shafted." New Llab is beset from all sides. Artful Scarface is threatening with weapons of mass disruption and rumour is that formidable Baroness Moggie Scratcher is about to leave the Abbey where she was forcibly confined by Old Llab. Given the chance, she will put some backbone into the Barons.

One of Pirouette's plans is to go and start a war somewhere. That will take people's mind off things. General de la Billionaire has been told to draw up a list. To improve things at home the migrant Dwarvian folk are being retrained as doctors and nurses and are going to staff a National Elf Service. Everyone out of work will be given a mobility allowance that will allow them to go and look for work elsewhere. Yes things are coming to a head in Ellovera, soon there will be a battle between Peasants and Barons. Watch this space.
