Your guide to council tax

This leaflet provides information about the budgets for local public services for the year ahead and explains your council tax bill.

Depending on your household income, you may be eligible for help with paying your bill (please turn to page 11 for more information).

With the ongoing reduction to public spending, North Somerset Council continues to work hard to save money and rise to the most significant financial challenge it has ever faced.

The council remains committed to providing excellent value for money through the services it delivers, and to maintaining an affordable level of council tax.

What is council tax?

It's a local property tax levied by councils to top up central government funding of the local services they provide.

What does it pay for?

North Somerset Council provides a wide range of services, including education, planning, transport, highways, social services, libraries, leisure and recreation, recycling and waste collection, environmental health and trading standards among many others.

The money you pay also funds the police and fire and rescue service, as well as supporting work in your local parish or town.

Parish and town councils raise their money primarily from a levy called a precept. We collect the precept on behalf of town and parish councils and pass it on to them.

Who decides how much I have to pay?

Council tax is based on property value. Every property is put into a banding and charged accordingly after certain other factors are taken into account.

Budgeting for the future

Budgeting is a year-round process and the ability to balance the books is becoming increasingly difficult in a climate of continued reduction of grants from central government.

Current estimates indicate that over the next three years we will need to identify and save a further £37m as the austerity pressures continue.

So, the focus for the next three years will be on service and organisational change, so that we can continue to invest in priority areas including the care of older people, children and investing in the roads network.

Council tax support changes

The minimum charge for all working age applicants will be 24.5 per cent.

This will apply to all applicants of working age. The bill you receive shows how much support you will receive. Please note that you do not have the right to appeal against the fact that you have to pay something, or an increased amount towards your council tax simply because of this scheme. However, your rights of appeal if you think we have not applied this scheme properly (for example, your income, capital or household details are not accurate) still remain and you should write to us with evidence of your correct details as soon as possible. Please note: This scheme does not apply to retirement age pensioners who will continue to receive the same level of assistance they would have received had the council tax benefit scheme continued.

Council tax and housing benefits have gone digital

The council tax and benefit service is now an online service. To access these services you must register and create an account. Registration is quick, easy and secure and will allow you to apply for benefits, discounts and exemptions. You can also let us know about a change of circumstances or a change of address, set up a direct debit or just view your account balance.

Going digital means we can process many of your requests earlier and provided any additional documents are submitted with your application, you may receive your benefit earlier.

Help with your bill

Council tax support

If you are on a low income and currently pay council tax, you may be eligible for council tax support even if you receive other benefits or council tax discounts.

Please visit our website to register for self-serve and make your application online. If you are unable to get online or have additional needs please visit us at the Town Hall, Weston-super-Mare or call us on **01934 888 144** and one of our customer service advisers will assist you.

You can also visit any of our libraries and use one of the public access computers to make your application.

More help with your bill

Even if you are not eligible for council tax support based on your income and savings there are other ways to reduce your bill:

Exemptions

Some properties will be exempt from council tax altogether, for example if you are living elsewhere to receive personal care, or if you have gone to live in a care home.

Disability reduction scheme

Your property may be placed in a lower band if it has features such as extra space for a wheelchair.

Discounts

Some bills can be reduced by up to 50 per cent. There is a 25 per cent discount for all properties where only one person is liable to pay council tax.

Despite the financial challenges crime and risk of crime continues to fall. Satisfaction levels amongst victims has increased to the highest level ever recorded in Avon and Somerset and the risk of domestic burglary is now one of lowest in the country.

There is still much more work to do. Domestic and sexual violence, exploitation and hate crime remain significantly under-reported. 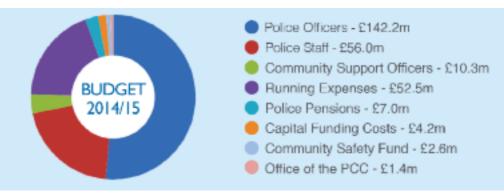
CHANGES IN SPENDING

The net expenditure for the Police will be £4 million lower in 2014/15 compared to 2013/14 following a 4.5% reduction in central government funding. The PCC has taken the decision to increase the policing part of the council tax by £3.34 a year for the average band D household. This follows extensive consultation with over 3,000 residents. Although inflation and other unavoidable spending pressures will increase costs by £8 million, spending will be reduced to balance the budget. This means that the average band D precept will be £171.37.

Your fire and rescue service

Avon Fire & Rescue Service (AF&RS) protects the communities of Bath & North East Somerset, Bristol, North Somerset and South Gloucestershire.

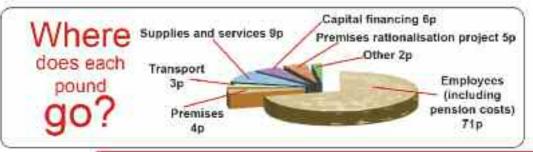
This service costs the average Band D household £65.30 a year – or £1.26 a week.

Since 2010 our overall budget has been decreasing and in January 2014 we announced plans that will help us achieve £4.5million of annual savings.

The 'Investing for the Future' programme proposes the building of three new fire stations, the relocation of Headquarters to Keynsham town centre and the major expansion of an existing fire station. The plans will also see the closure of five fire stations, with their resources amalgamated at the new fire stations.

Despite the changes, we have made a commitment that our emergency response standards will remain unchanged in areas affected. You can read more about the plans at www. avonfire.gov.uk/investing-for-the-future.

Annual budget

Avon Fire Authority has set its net budget for 2014/15 at £44.332 million. This represents a Council Tax level of £65.30 a year for a Band D property, an increase of just below 2%.

The Government has restated the 2013/14 grant settlement, rolling in a number of previously separately identified specific grants, to provide a start-up funding assessment for comparison purposes. The funding assessment for 2014/15 is £22.056m, a reduction of £1.795m (7.53%) compared to the restated start-up funding assessment of £23.851m for 2013/14.
