Graham will be sorely missed by us all.


He was a true and loyal friend to our community.

Annual Report

The Bleadon Annual Parish Meeting was held on the evening of 12th April in the Coronation Hall. This is the annual meeting where Bleadon residents get to find out what's happening in the parish and have their opportunity to air their views and concerns.

The Chairman, Mrs Penny Skelley summarised the past 12 months with the following short report.

I am always the optimist, so once more will boast that all is well in Bleadon. Our **Coronation Hall** is to have a makeover and remains a great asset, well used and well loved by us all.

Our Open Spaces are to be proud of. A **new Parish Ranger**, Peter McHugh, who in spite of not living among us, keeps the appearance of the village to a high standard.

The village **plant-up** will be held later than usual on Saturday 8th May – we always need hands on deck – and the colours are still secret.

More little ones than ever are using the **play park** and one of the wish-list items in the Village Plan is to have more play equipment in the park. The bark and sand are regularly topped up and all equipment is constantly monitored.

Turning to **Planning**, the Council has received 19 planning applications in the past year and North Somerset has upheld all Parish Council decisions. There are two outstanding applications awaiting a decision from North Somerset Council.

On **Allotments**, all the plots are occupied and there is a waiting list of eight. On 28/29 August, during the Scarecrow Festival, we hope that there will be an open day at the allotments.

Our Community Policeman, PC Steve Church, keeps a careful and watchful eye on our village and we are very grateful to him. There is a police surgery every Tuesday afternoon where Steve is always happy to listen to any policing problems.

The **Youth Club** has a new Chairman, Julie Al-Hinai, and a new treasurer, Bob Jordan. I wish the Youth Club Committee a successful year of projects and fundraising, and thank too all the volunteer leaders of the youth organisations in the village.

Bleadon Parish Council is reliant on North Somerset for **road repairs**. After the severe winter these are endless and nationwide, but our pot holes are at least marked up! We are in permanent discussion with North Somerset for road improvement. The **bus service** is running efficiently, although the new buses have a strange sound!

Sadly the promised **Bus Shelter** is still to be erected on its new site and the History Interpretation Board has been delayed. Both are in storage in the village and will be installed as soon as possible in the new financial year. Talking of history, the Bleadon History Group will next meet on the last day of lune.

The Parish Council has reviewed the North Somerset **Draft Core Strategy**

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and our comments have been submitted. You will have seen this in our Village News and on the Parish Council web-site.

Lastly I must tell you that the North Somerset Parish Boundary Review has been published. As a result, in 2011/12, **Hillcote will become a part of Bleadon Village**, so they too will enjoy the facilities and services that we do here and we welcome them.

This is a very brief overview of the Parish year. More in depth information may be found on the Parish Council web-site. I hope you feel that the Parish Council serves you well and works hard on your behalf. The welfare of the village is

paramount to us.

Roads and transport

Bleadon Parish is reliant on North Somerset Council for road repairs, improvements and the subsidy for our bus service. We are grateful for the extensive improvements made to the A370 / Accommodation Road Junction which has resulted in a safer junction.

North Somerset have been responsive to our requests for potholes to be filled in and following the damage caused by the severe winter's weather have inspected our roads and marked repairs to be made when the 2010 budget comes into effect.

Following the demise of ACL and the cessation of our bus service, North Somerset quickly organised a replacement service and , if my memory serves me correctly, we were only without a bus service for one day. Again our thanks to North Somerset Council.

We have discussed improvements to the bus stop at Bleadon Road and Coronation Road with North Somerset Council which have been agreed and will be implemented when money becomes available. Our next ambition is to have the 50 MPH speed limit extended from the Purn Holiday Park south to Bleadon Mill which will assist exit on to the main road. However, the police have objections as long stretches of speed limit causes "bunching" of traffic and makes joining the main road more difficult.


Open spaces

have all been more than up to standard.


Thank you to all who volunteered for the plant-up days and to those who tended them through the year. Thanks also to the many residents who plant their own containers and displays outside their homes.

The area around the telephone box, with the gardens, trellis, timber planters and shrubs, provide both a welcome splash of colour throughout the year and a pleasant backdrop to the tables and seating. As well as being enjoyed by locals, they are often used by the many walking groups who meet in the car park.

We have to thank our new Village Ranger Peter McHugh for his attention to all aspects of village tidiness – e.g. the lay-bys, the Hall car park, the play areas, the pathways and the outer boundaries of Accommodation and Roman Road. Our thanks also to Mark Howe and his team who have continued to cut the grass in the play area and Churchyard.

In September the Chairman and members of the Parish Council welcomed Mrs Pauline Peddlesden and invited her to unveil a plaque in memory of her husband District Councillor Ian Peddlesden, which had been placed on the seat originally donated by her husband in memory of his father. Mrs Peddlesden thanked the Parish Council for their kind gesture in recognising her husband's contribution to the village as District Councillor.

The ongoing problem of irresponsible dog owners who do not clean up after their dogs



remains. It seems that all aspects of this topic have been covered in previous reports including the strategic placing of bins, the possibility of 'naming and shaming' and our Magazine has repeatedly urged owners to behave more responsibly. All this to seemingly no avail. As a last resort, may I as a dog owner/walker myself, plead on your dogs' behalf for them to have a more pleasant environment in which to walk. It is difficult to understand why people would wish to walk their pets in areas that are affected by dog fouling.

Churchyard

There has been the need for the usual remedial work around the churchyard, the cutting back of the undergrowth and the general trimming and tidying. Drastic action had to be taken to clear the Knotweed that was taking over the Bier House.

Unfortunately the plugs of primroses mentioned in last year's report did not survive the winter and the Parish

Council will now have to revisit this initiative.

We continue to receive a small contribution of money each year from the War Graves Commission towards the upkeep of three Military Graves. We are only too pleased to carry on this responsibility.

During a general clear up, our Village Ranger came across a few lost graves. Hidden amongst the weeds was the headstone of Lt. Col. John Sheffield Gilbert Riley who had served with the 5th Bengal Light Cavalry and who died in Bleadon in May 1891, aged 83. These details were posted on the Parish Council website, in the hope that someone may come forward with information about this person – but sadly to no avail thus far.

In her role as editor of our Village magazine Penny Robinson received a letter from a person attempting to trace a deceased relative. A search in the Parish Register revealed 14 unmarked graves in the churchyard. The wording in the Register leads us to believe that these are of people of the Methodist faith.

We have met with members of the Parochial Church Council to agree an additional area of the churchyard to be used for the internment of ashes and placing of memorial stones. The Churchwardens will now be seeking a Faculty from the Diocese to allow this.

During the bad weather the paths and approach to the Church were dangerously slippery and the PCC was extremely grateful for the both speed of response and the work done to clear the paths, by the Village Ranger.



Other repairs and improvements carried out this year have been the erection of a willow hurdle screen to hide the dust-bins and watering cans etc, the repair of the gate and fresh tarmac being laid on the church approach path.

Local democracy

The Government has expressed its desire to encourage the reengagement of the public in the democratic process. There is recognition that parish councillors often live and work within the communities they serve, are highly visible and in touch with the wants and needs of the people they represent. In line with its responsibilities as a Quality Parish Council, we appointed a 'Democracy Champion'.

Under the general heading of representing peoples' wants and needs the Council has participated in relevant consultations so as to ensure that the wishes of the community are reflected. A good example is the recently concluded Community Governance Review (Parish Review) in which we were able to successfully represent the wishes of the residents of Hillcote to be included within the parish boundaries of Bleadon.

Another part of this review included a proposal to reduce the number of parish councillors from nine to seven. We were able to successfully demonstrate the need to maintain the current number of councillors.

Although knowing that it would be outside the remit of this review, we also attempted to achieve a change of the District Ward name. This attempt was unsuccessful. However another review is upcoming, which will allow us to pursue our proposal for the ward to be renamed as *Bleadon, Hutton and Locking,* instead of the present 'Hutton and Locking'.

All parish councillors try to make themselves freely accessible to all residents of our community by being around the village and posting their contact details in the quarterly Village Magazine. These details are also available on the Council's website including access by email. The Parish Council meets monthly with details posted on local notice boards, and the public are welcome to attend.

Bleadon Parish Council welcomes your views, compliments and complaints. We actively seek your suggestions and ideas around your wishes and wants.

Coronation Hall

I am pleased to report that the Independent Examiner, Shirley Campbell, has examined the accounts for the year ended 28 February 2010 and she has confirmed that these have been correctly maintained and there is no matter which gives her cause for concern.

Total Income for the year amounted to £20,544 - down by 3% on last year. However, Expenditure increased by almost 5% to £16,768. As a result, £3,744 was transferred to the General Fund which now stands at £38,002 (money in the bank for the future). Expenditure covers all aspects of maintaining and running the Coronation Hall and Jubilee Room which includes heating and lighting, water and sewerage, insurance, licences, cleaning, general repairs and improvements.

The main income has been from hiring the Hall with fees marginally up on last year. We have seen another year of successful Village Markets which have become regula features in the village.

These functions generate valuable funds for the Coronation Hall and credit for the success of them must go to the many volunteers who assist on these occasions.

The Hall Management Committee would also like to thank the various people and organisations who have kindly made donations or offered their services.

The Hall Management Committee has continued to invest in the Coronation Hall and Jubilee Room with the following improvements made during the past year:

Replacement of electric storage heaters in the Jubilee Room with two Drugasar 10kW gas space heaters

Reconfiguring the mains electricity supply so that one supply now provides electricity to both the Coronation Hall and Jubilee Room.

These two projects address the issue of rising energy costs, particularly



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electricity. Firstly, the two gas space heaters are more economical to run than the previous electric storage heaters; it is expected that the capital cost of the installation will be recovered over five years through annual savings. Secondly, we have eliminated one of the two electricity supplies to the halls by reconfiguring the supply cables thereby saving unnecessary duplicate costs.

In addition, £679 was spent on general maintenance although no major problems have arisen.

Contrary to their previous advice, our insurers (Aon Limited) have confirmed that the Hall insurance policy should be divided into two the buildings element being written in the name of the Parish Council as legal owners of the property and the contents and other matters being in the name of the Hall Management Committee.

Legal advice given by Hall, Ward and Fox is that the Governing Document (the Trust Deed dated 14 January 1938) is ambiguous. Their recommendation was to draft a Protocol to clarify the ambiguities and bring the Governing Document up to date. This has now been completed and the Protocol was signed by Penny Skelley (on behalf of the Parish Council) and Len Chamberlain (on behalf of the Hall Management Committee) at the Annual Parish Meeting on 12 April.

This has been another successful vear for the Coronation Hall and Jubilee Room. The Hall Management Committee would like to thank everyone who has used the Halls for their continuing support, in particular the various organisations who regularly hire the facilities and, of course, supporters of the monthly Village Market.

Dog controls

Dog Control Orders have been issued by North Somerset Council following requests from the parish council.

This means that dogs:

- are excluded from the Play Area
- are excluded from the Well Green
- are excluded from the Church Cross grass
- must be kept on short leads in the Church Grounds and Approach and must not Foul
- must be kept on leads in the Coronation Car Park and around the Youth Centre and Coronation Hall and must not Foul

All these Orders are enforceable by law and will result in fines if ignored by irresponsible dog owners.

Any owner who fails to clean up after their dog fouls any footpath or highway verge is also liable to hefty fines.

Your parish councillors are now Certified!

For the past 12 months your parish councillors have been busy studying in their spare time to gain a better understanding of best practice in local government.

The course is conducted by the University of Gloucester and results in a Certificate of Achievement from the Society of Local Council Clerks.

I'm sure that there isn't one of us who hasn't benefitted immensely from this inspiring and thought provoking course. Hopefully, we will all prove to be better councillors for our community as a result.

Our thanks to Bruce Poole, who mentored and supported us throughout the challenging learning process.

NEWS & gossip

Problems with Bleadon Sluice

Readers may have noticed extremely low water levels in the village rhynes and river Axe. This is partly due to low rainfall in recent months, but is also the result of a problem with the Bleadon Sluice gate on the Axe alongside the A370.

The Environment Agency explains -

The River Axe is usually penned in the summer by Bleadon Sluice to provide water for irrigation.
Unfortunately there is a problem with the sluice and it is presently unsafe to operate. The Environment Agency are currently undertaking emergency works to manage the situation and will closely monitor the potential impact on the environment.

In the meantime, we are planning to use Brean Cross Sluice to provide the summer penned level in the River Axe as a temporary measure. This means that water levels between Bleadon Sluice and Brean Cross Sluice will be higher than normal –

and levels upstream of Bleadon Sluice will be slightly lower than usual.

We are working closely with the Drainage Board to provide summer irrigation, and will look to jointly agree a way of operating over the coming months. This will need to take into account available water (a function of the weather), conditions in the river and any increased flood risk associated with holding levels at Brean Cross. During this time we need the co-operation of those living in the area with regards to expected water levels.



Both the Environment Agency and Bristol Water are committed to securing a long term solution to the problems with Bleadon Sluice – and both parties are working with the Drainage Board to manage the situation.

The Environment Agency will communicate individually with farmers, landowners and fishing interests – to outline any specific issues that may arise due to operational problems with the sluice gate.

Mobile Library changes



From **Monday 2 August** the mobile library service to Bleadon is changing. This is part of District-wide efficiency savings in the service provided by North Somerset Council.

The Library vehicle will now only stop at the **Church stop in Coronation Road**. The good news is that it will be there for two hours from **10.40 to 12.40**.

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There can be little doubt that this is a reduction in service for users who live away from the centre of the village. The Library Service promises to review the new arrangements. If you have a comment to make direct it to: andy.brisley@n-somerset.gov.uk or your District councillors.

Allotment open days



At this time of year our allotments are a picture of bountiful harvests, ripening fruits and swelling vegetables. All our village allotments are fully taken and there's a waiting list I'm afraid. However, the parish council is keen to demonstrate the hard work that our allotment holders put into looking after this idylic spot on the sunny Mendip slopes. During the **Scarecrow Festival on August 28-29** the allotments will be open to visitors.

Waste collection and recycling changes

Few villagers can be unaware of the changes to the waste and recycling collection services that will be coming to Bleadon in September.



The recycling revolution starts in Bleadon with the delivery of the extra recycling box, food waste containers and wheeled bin or plastic sacks to households in August.

But you cannot start using your wheeled bin, plastic sacks or food container until the new service starts in mid September because they will not be picked up.

When your new containers arrive you will receive an

information pack and a new calendar which lets you know when the first collection will be.

Additional recycleable materials, such as plastics and cartons, also won't be recycled until the new service starts in September.

Remember that when the new service starts **all cardboard** will be collected in green **recycling boxes**, and not the green waste bag. **www.n-somerset.gov.uk/revolution**

Bringing our yesterdays to life

A photo of an apple cheeked choirboy prompted District Councillor Elfan Ap-Rees to look back at his early years here in Bleadon.

The picture published back in the Christmas 2009 issue of Bleadon Village News brought back more than a few memories for me, although truth to tell I couldn't name any of the other members of the church choir shown (perhaps other readers can?).

Some may wonder how it was that your District Councillor was in the choir so long ago. After all, with a name like mine I couldn't possibly be "local" could I? Ah well, don't judge a book by its cover. However, my Welsh ancestry might give readers a clue.....Oh yes. I could sing "Wings of a Dove" with the best of them, before my voice broke!

It was actually my father who encouraged me to join the choir, probably around 1953 and soon after we had moved to the area, no...not from Wales but from Wiltshire! At that time we lived in Christon, from whence I roamed Bleadon Hill at will, usually alone and sometimes as a cowboy or occasionally as a "Red Indian", depending on mood and the availability of blackberry juice warpaint. (No...I wasn't an only one but my older sisters didn't actually share my interests so I grew up with a vivid imagination). I suppose today I would have been arrested, either for carrying a replica gun or dissing Native Americans but it was a more carefree world then. As a family we also used to visit the Bleadon Hill Sports and join in with the Loxton farmers at hay-making times, me riding on the back of the tractor or atop the trailer load of hay, something else banned today!

However, I digress...this is supposed to be about why I was in the choir. Truth to tell my family were not regular church goers but, whilst my

mother was kept busy raising six children and numerous animals, my father did like a pint. I suspect that escaping his share in the family chores was not easy but his idea that he encouraged my singing by way of my joining the church choir was probably seen by mother as a good way to get rid of both of us from under her feet.

Anyway his "encouragement " was to drive me to Bleadon in time for rehearsals and services, and then to disappear to the "Queens" for a few drinks whilst waiting for me to reappear. After the service I would then trot over to the pub, where father would buy me an orange and a packet of crisps and have me sit in the car until he was ready to go home. That often took some time.

I never knew him to overdo the drinking and he appears to have built up quite a friendship with the then landlord and landlady. On one occasion he took home the pub sign and repainted it before it was rehung, and I seem to recall him helping out in other ways from time to time too. For my part I more than enjoyed myself for a while, both in singing my heart out and watching

watching I

the to-ing and fro-ing at the pub from the driver's seat in our old Ford.

It didn't last...I grew older, my voice broke and I became a disgruntled teenager. We moved from Christon and Father lost the excuse, but...Happy Days.



This school year we have been celebrating the centenary of girl guiding.





You will find us a very friendly lot eager to learn, wanting to show the sort of work we are producing and above all not taking things too seriously. The group have visiting speakers, internal and external competitions and workshops to improve our knowledge of working in digital and we certainly are not stuck in the mud, we keep up with developments within the sphere of general photography. What better way of passing some of the dreary evenings of winter, than to pass them with friends and at the same time learn a bit more. None of us can be so

overloaded with knowledge that we can't receive a little more. It is often said of photographers that they see things that others pass by or just accept, like shall we say, a wreck of an old car, but in that pile of junk there are shapes and colours and light and shade all just waiting to be recorded and turned into a stunning picture. There are shapes in the sand (and we have plenty of that in Weston) where light plays a big part in turning just sand into emotional images which disappear with the turn of the tide and you can capture these images and they can never be repeated, so that image becomes unique to you. And what about the beautiful countryside which abounds in our vicinity especially at certain times of the day when the light plays tricks, casting shadows which amplify the beauty of the place and the shapes in the landscape. Cameras these days are capable of astonishing functions but how many of us just point and shoot without knowing what the camera can do if we only knew. You know what is said " when all else fails, read the instructions" and this is a good starting point by way of improving our photographs. Bleadon remains one of the lowest crime areas in North Somerset. Let's work to keep it safe for all. Here are some tips on beating crime from our Neighbourhood Watch team.

Strangers at the door

Do NOT deal with door to door callers or respond to leaflet dropping unless you are absolutely sure who you are dealing with.

Things TO do:

- Keep your front door shut and talk through it.
- · Lock doors both front and back.
- Fix security chain on door bar and use it!
- You do not have to let people into your home if you do not feel comfortable. If the caller is genuine they will come back or make an appointment.
- Do not keep large amounts of cash at home.

Things NOT to do:

- Don't believe everything you are told by callers however plausible (tarmac left over, water or gas leak, etc.)
- Don't be intimidated into making a decision or agreeing to work without a second opinion or quotes.
- Watch out for anyone who says they are in a hurry - if in doubt call a neighbour or friend.
- When checking ID don't always rely on a callers card for phone numbers you could be calling their partner look up the phone number in your phone directory.
- Don't leave keys in doors or windows.

 Don't assume the caller is genuine because they are smartly dressed or wearing a uniform.

PASSWORD SCHEME:

The gas, water and electricity companies, and some councils, now have a password system for older and vulnerable customers. Customers give the company a word which is confidential to them and the company. When a representative calls, they will be expected to tell the customer the password to prove they are genuine.

Wheely bin burglers

The new wheely bins that you will be getting from North Somerset Council in August can provide a perfect step-up for opportunist burglers to get through windows and over fences.

Keep your bin well away from open windows and think about how easy it would be to get into your home. Try and keep your bin out of sight or secured so that it can only be moved easily by you.

Vehicle theft

There has recently been a small number of thefts from cars and garages in the Hutton area. Don't leave valuables in vehicles. If you hear or see suspicious strangers out and about at night give us a call please. If you don't want the officers calling at your house just say so and we will make other arrangements if we need to see you.
