

I must apologise for not having an article in the last issue of the Village News, but due to a very heavy work load I simply did not have the time to write one. I normally try to cover a number of subjects when writing a piece but on this occasion I intend to deal with just the one topic.

Many of you will be aware that three Parishioners have made claims that the present Bleadon Parish Council is illegal, an allegation strongly repudiated by your Council. They initially objected to the Audit for the year ending March 1991, seeming oblivious to the fact that the objections related to the year when two of them were the leaders of Bleadon Parish Council. This year the same three announced that they intended to object to the Audit for the year ending March 1992, even before the books were open to public inspection. Their reasons were, that as the Council was illegal, all action taken by the Council were also illegal. Both audits were completed without any problems.

Mr and Mrs Corder duly lodged an objection to the audit for year ending March 1992, this despite a letter from the District Auditor which warned them of "the additional costs that had already been, and would continue to be, involved whilst the questioning and objecting process continued", and despite letters from Woodspring District Council and the Department of the Environment stating that Bleadon Village Council is in fact legal. After reviewing the audit and taking legal advice, the District Auditor (Ernst and Young) confirmed this verdict.

I fully support the right of any individual to question decisions made by Council, but surely it is time to stop when proved wrong. It is the Council, not the complainant, which has to pay the bill.

Your Council constantly strives to keep the precept as low as possible, but these objections are costing the Parish a great deal of public money. It is quite possible that the precept will have to be increased next year to redress the wasted expenditure thus caused. I do hope that we have finally heard the last of these unnecessary and time wasting complaints.

To end on a much happier note, Judith and I wish you all a Very Merry Christmas and a Happy, Healthy and Prosperous New Year.

BLEADON CORONATION HALL

Fund raising events have included the Autumn Jumble Sale which raised £110, and the well attended and very convivial Christmas Coffee Morning which increased the Hall's funds by nearly another £170. The Hall was particularly welcoming with its Christmas decorations and background seasonal music, and some most attractive stalls provided variety to the coffee and chat. Thank you all for your support.

Thanks also to Les Masters and the cast of the Charity Variety Show in early October, for they donated a very useful £212 to the Hall's funds. I understand an equal sum was given to the Guides/Scouts Building Fund. True charity, voluntarily produced.

The joint venture between the Guides/Scouts and the Hall to develop their properties has progressed to planning applications and costings. However, further progress depends heavily on the funds becoming available to the Guides/Scouts, whose part of the project must be the first to commence. The Hall Committee has agreed in principle to their part once that stage is near.

The Committee has become conscious of a potential danger to Hall users from window breakage caused by footballs 'straying' from over-exuberance in the play area, and secondary glazing with shatterproof material will shortly be fitted to the car park side windows.

Hall hiring fees have been slightly increased (+5%) from January.

BACK TO SOMERSET

The Government has set up a Commission to review the structure of local government throughout England, and two of its members, Miss Mary Leigh and Mr Ken Ennals, are currently listening to local opinion prior to making recommendations for Avon, Somerset and Gloucestershire. Many people will have views about the efficiency of the present structure at county(Avon) and district (Woodspring) levels, and the Commissioners want to hear those views before coming back with draft proposals next June. We will then have two months to react and respond to their proposals before they harden up their recommendations, and present them to the Minister for the Environment.

The Back to Somerset Campaign is hoping to achieve the restoration of the traditional county boundaries on the shirt-tail of this review. Although we are supported by some people who would like to see a return to Somerset County Council administration from Taunton, it would seem that the majority want a more local form of government, based perhaps on Woodspring. All audits have shown that almost any change will be less expensive to operate than the present two-tier system, even if the changeover itself inevitably results in additional costs to local charge payers. People need to identify with their local government structure, and if Woodspring achieves Unitary Status, it is intended that it will be renamed to reflect its Somerset connection.

I feel very optimistic that we shall recover our Somerset identity in the very near future. When that happens it will be an occasion for quiet satisfaction - and an excuse for a boisterous celebration!




